A Pathetic Love Story.

Before the empress, who was Princess Dagmar of Denmark, married Alexander III, she was engaged to his elder brother, the czarowitz. In 1865 at Nice the Grand Duke Nicholas fell from his horse and was so badly injured that his life was despaired of. His fiancée hastened to him and never left his side till he breathed his last. The succession to the throne devolved on the Grand Duke Alexander. He stood by the deathbed of the czarowitz, who in the presence of the emperor and empress placed the hand of the weeping princess into his, saying to her with almost his last words, "Marry my brother; he is true as crystal, and I wish it." Enforced by political reasons, this bequest was law to the bereaved girl.
