It seems that great men think alike, since the Lymn County News, the Lubbock Avalanche and the Big Springs Heraid all got after their citizens about fire protection on the same day. The only difference is that the Big Springs people are doing something about it, while Tahoka and Lubbock haven't yet decided what to do. S'pose we do something before something happens to make us regret our negiigence.

Every one who has lived in a negro country seems to agree with us on the proposition that West Texas be forever kept in a coonless condition. One the Abilene papers recently came out in favor of negro importation, but the farmers are not pleased because the Stamford commercial club is encouraging negro importation. They say that plenty of white cotton pickers may be had from the drouth and floodstricken sections of the State. What shall it profit a county to gain a thousand bales of cotton and lose its freedom from the negro curse?

## The Real Thing Soon.

It has been known for some years that the Texas Central would some day build to Roswell, New Mexico. Now we learn that the Gould interests will soon build a line from Roscoe to Snyder and thence to Portales, to serve as a cut-off between the numerous Gould lines in Colorado and those in 'Texas.
These two roads are neitner land boom schemes nor surveying school practice expeditions; they are simply extensions of sure-enough railroads already in actual operation within 100 miles of Tahoka, and will have to be built soon or the railroad systems in question will lose a pile of money: The direct between the known terminals of these roads fall about six miles north and south of Tahoka. The extensions will be made in the next two years, no matter if there is not a ton of freight nor a dollar of bonus in sight.
Now here is the point. Both of these roads will pass through and cross somewhere in Lynn county and at that crossing will be the biggest town between Amarillo and big Springs and between Stamford and Roswell. It will mean the making or breaking of Tahoka. To go ahead and pull for both of these roads will make a city of Tahoka in a few years, while to faiter or treat the matter lightly may put us in the same class with Buffalo Gap and Runnels City.
It is time that the citizens of Lynn county and Tahoka began to think seriously about the railroad question. We will soon have a railroad proposition to consider that will mean everything for the growth and future welfare of our town. Let us get ready for something to happen.
