Cow, Sow and Hen Train Here March 24th

Amarillo, Texas, Jan. 29, 1923.—Farmers and others interested in dairying, hog growing, and poultry raising will be invited to attend demonstrations to be given in Northwest Texas towns by the Texas State Agricultural College in cooperation with the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway at the company's stations in 45 towns from Sweetwater to Shattuck, Okla.

The cow, sow and hen train, as it is known, will be financed by the Santa Fe railway. The Agricultural College will provide the speakers and the exhibits of livestock necessary to make the demonstration. The Santa Fe is co-operating with the College because the vitally important message which this great educational institution has for the farmers of the state, can be delivered promptly in no other way.

A survey of the state's industrial conditions shows that during the depression of the last year or two, farmers who kept a few milk cows, some brood sows and a bunch of chickens, did not feel the hardship so keenly as did those who confined their operations mainly to crop growing. Farmers are urged to come to the train prepared to ask questions.

The speakers from the Agricultural College will be leaders in their respective departments.—Prof. Evans, Dairying; Prof. Ward, hog raising; Prof. Edson, poultry raising.

T. B. Gallacher, general freight and

passenger agent, will be in charge of the enterprise, and J. F. Jarrell, manager of the company's agricultural development department, and A. M. Hove, assistant editor of the Earth, the company's agricultural and industrial paper will accompany the train.

The train will be on time and meetings will start promptly on arrival. In addition to the regular program of lectures on dairying, hog raising and poultry raising, there will be a meeting for boys and girls.

A special invitation is extended to the farm women to attend the demonstrations, as the speakers will have something particularly important to say to them.

Clovis, N. M., and Shattuck, Okla., are shown on the schedule. As it is necessary to include these towns in the schedule for operating purposes, and as farmers there requested meetings, the agricultural colleges authorities kindly consented to give the program. New Mexico conditions near Clovis, and Oklahoma conditions near Shattuck are similar to the conditions in Texas localities to be visited by the train.

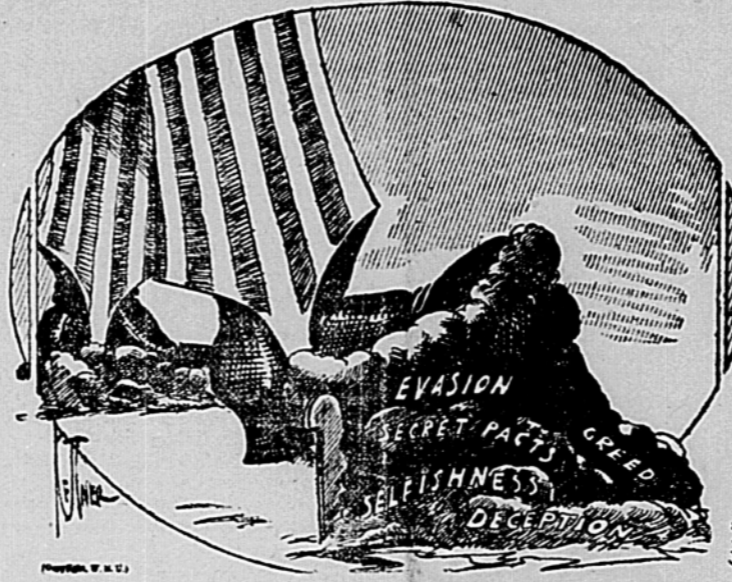

One way to get what you want in this world is to make up your mind that you already have it and then go to work to prove it by getting it. The Palo Duro Park idea is a reality. There it is, a great gorge with steep walls and rocky hills, almost sixty miles in length and varying from a few feet to more than 1500 feet in depth, and at its lowest points where it is ten miles in width, with all the coloring and verdure and music of nature going to waste year after year except what the white-faced cattle of the Plains are able to enjoy. Did you ever feel like you just wanted to get away from everything and everybody in the world for a little while until you could get your nerve back and your mind rested and forget every worry and just live and breathe and eat and sleep and do as you please and act natural for one whole day or a week or a month, as your case demanded? The Palo Duro Park is the place for you. It is full of hiding places for just such folks as that.

Eclipse Frightened Greek Army.
The ancient Greeks and Romans believed firmly in signs and portents, and they regarded an eclipse of the sun or moon as an evil omen. When the Athenian general, was so terrified by an eclipse of the moon that he dared not defend himself from the Syracusans, in consequence of which his whole army was cut to pieces and he himself was put to death. The Romans would never hold a public assembly during an eclipse. A very general notion obtained among barbarians that the sun or moon when in eclipse has been devoured by some monster, and hence the custom of beating drums and brass kettles to scare away the monster. The notion of the ancient Mexicans was that eclipses were caused by sun and moon quarrels, in which one of the combatants was beaten black and blue.

Tree Stumps Centuries Old.
Stumps, said by the geological survey to be 10,000 years old, have been excavated from a depth of 40 feet below the present surface of the ground at Washington, D. C. It is said that they have probably been immersed in water ever since some stupendous convulsion buried them. Kept constantly wet, they would be preserved indefinitely.

Four of these stumps were more than 14 feet in diameter and 54 feet in girth. The bureau of standards asserts that they are the remnants of trees of tropical growth, indicating that the site of Washington was, in the long ago, a tropical location.

No portions of the tree trunks belonging to these stumps were found in the excavations excepting the short portions attached to the root.

PAY DOCTOR TO KEEP YOU WELL RATHER THAN TO GET YOU WELL

Austin, Texas, Jan. 30.—"The time is now a hand when every person in Texas should have an inspection of their physical machinery," said D. E. Breed, executive secretary, Texas Health Association.

A periodic physical examination by your physician at least once a year is one of the best methods of combating tuberculosis and other preventable diseases. At these examinations one is enabled to have located minor defects and have them corrected before they become serious. Out of the average group of men, women and children, 70 per cent will have various defects and impairments of the body, ranging from minor infection of the teeth or serious condition of the lungs or heart.

If an inspection of your body reveals some slight impairment that can be remedied at a very little expense, think what a saving would be accomplished if it was remedied at once. If allowed to develop it might develop into tuberculosis or some other disease that would take hundreds of dollars to cure or treat. The time to prevent disease from sapping your vitality is before it gets a foothold. You will find it much better to pay a doctor to keep you well rather than to pay him to get you well.

Crosses on Lithuanian High Roads.

One thing that particularly attracts the attention of the traveler in Lithuania are the crosses on the high roads. Mostly in carved wood, they are of gigantic dimensions. In some provinces there is a cross for every mile of highway, in addition to a number of crosses on the fields or in the corners of streets in villages. In every cross there is a deep niche containing one or more lemons and perpetually burning oil lamps, the flame of which is kept alive through a vow taken by some family from time immemorial. As the roads are not lighted, the lights on the crosses serve the same purpose to the winter traveler, when the roads are buried in deep snow, that does the lighthouse to a ship.

These crosses are said to contain the complete history of Lithuania from the early part of the Fourteenth century, when it accepted Christianity.
