The Schools but Remember the Amendment. For Justice of the Peace Precinct

Tuesday, November 3rd is general election day, not only for the country at large, but there are several matters of local importance to the people of Lynn county. The Democrats should remember that the county's representation in conventions is based on Tuesday's vote.

Last Thursday was a sort of "red letter day in railway circles in Graham Chief Engineer Berry, of the Rock Island, came up Wednesday night and was met here by Messrs. Swenson and Andrews, of Staniford, and the party left early Thursday morning over the lower Bock leiand survey, by way o. Elineville towards Stamford, to which place, it is understood that the Rock leland is to be extended.
