## Brownfield Citizen Says Ft. Worth to Plains R. R. Should Come Via Tahoka and Brownfield---50 Miles Shorter

Route Would Run Through Mineral Wells, Breckenridge, Stamford, Hamlin, Rotan, Tahoka, Brownfield, Plains, Tatum and Roswell, N. M.

The following letter was received the past week by the secretary of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce from J. E. Shelton, of the Shelton-Cook Land Co., of Brownfield relative to the Ft. Worth to Plains railroad, which is to be built into this section. We reproduce the letter for the information of News readers in Lynn county who will be interested in the proposition:

Brownfield, Texas, Jan. 4 1922

Secretary of Chamber of Commerce, Tahoka, Texas.

Dear Sir:-

You have no doubt noticed from the daily papers that there is a great deal of talk with regard to the construction of a railway line from Ft. Worth, to some point on the Plains and maybe to Roswell. Now what is the matter with Tahoka and Brownfield lining up in an effort to secure this line. Several towns are using considerable space in an effort to secure the attention of the promoters and show them that they are on the logical line that should be constructed. The writer believes that Tahoka and Brownfield should be placed in nomination and has mapped out the following route for your consideration. From Ft. Worth to Mineral Wells, over the Texas & Pacific tracks, and from there to Brownfield via the following towns, Breckenridge, Stamford, Hamlin, Rotan, using the M. K. & T. tracks from Stamford to Rotan, Tahoka, Brownfield, Plains, Tatum, New Mexico and Roswell. This is almost an air line from Ft. Worth and fully fifty miles shorter than anything else that has been offered, besides having some track already built to order. The writer understands that a survey was made several years ago coming out of Moores draw and that the top could be reached much easier than the Santa Fe, came out of Post City. I have written a letter to all of the towns effected and would suggest that you do the same thing and it may be that we will get something started.

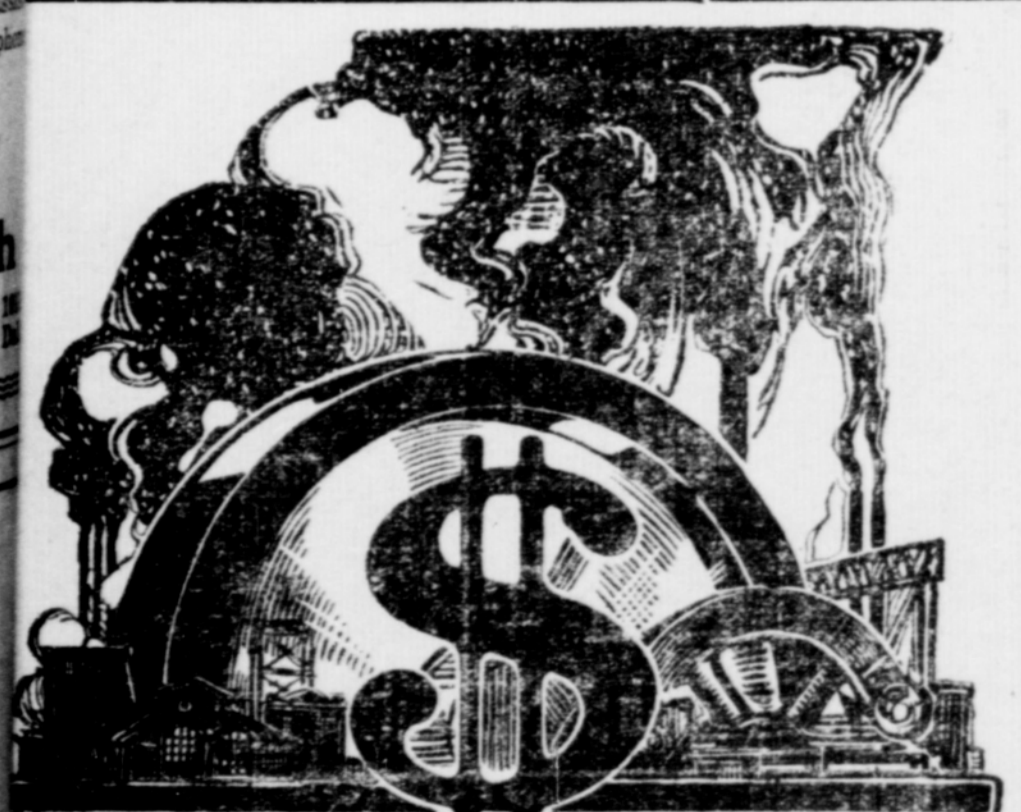

### LESSON FOR JANUARY 15

#### ELIJAH'S CHALLENGE OF BAAL WORSHIP.

LESSON TEXT—1 Kings 18:4-18.  
GOLDEN TEXT—This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith.—1 John 5:4.  
REFERENCE MATERIAL—Josh. 24:14-18; 24:22-24; 24:26-27.  
PRIMARY TOPIC—God Answers Elijah's Prayer.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—One Man Against Four Hundred and Fifty.  
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Isaiah's Victorious Challenge.  
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Modern Evil; How to Fight Them.

1. Elijah Meets Ahab (vv. 17-19).  
At the Lord's command, Elijah shows himself to Ahab. When Elijah was last seen by Ahab, he announced that rain would only be given by his word (17:1). In connection with the Prophet's appearing before the king, rain was promised.

1. Ahab's question—"Art thou he that troubleth Israel?" (v. 17). Ahab's aim was to intimidate Elijah—to awe him into submission.  
2. Elijah's answer (v. 18). He denied the charge and boldly declared that the calamity which had befallen the nation was caused by the idolatry of Ahab and his family.

11. Elijah's Challenge (vv. 19-24).  
1. The people assembled (vv. 19, 20). The king convened the people at the urgent request of Elijah.  
2. Elijah's ringing call to decision (vv. 21-24). (1) The question asked—Who is your God, Baal or the Lord? (v. 21). Many of the people had not wholly forsaken God. They attempted to worship both God and Baal. Many today are halting between two opinions; they are halting between self and God—in and holiness—mammon and God. But the question must be settled sooner or later. In fact, the decision is being made every day. (2) The silence of the people (v. 21). This may have been because of fear of the king or ignorance, for many were of the opinion that to be religious was the only thing necessary, irrespective of the being worshipped. (3) The method of decision (vv. 22-24). Two sacrifices were to be provided, each to be offered to Baal, the other to God. The god who answered by fire was to be the God. The people consented that this was a fair test.

111. The Test Applied (vv. 25-39).  
1. The offering by the prophets of Baal (vv. 25-29). Elijah gave a fair test, even placed the advantage on the other side. He gave the prophets of Baal the first opportunity to prove to the people as to whether Baal was a real god. Elijah taunted them, and they more earnestly cried to Baal, but no answer came.  
2. The offering by Elijah (vv. 30-39). (1) The people invited near (v. 30). His object was for them to see the entire proceedings in order to fully grasp the seriousness of the test. (2) The altar repaired (vv. 30-32). Before there can be the power of God manifested, the altar must be repaired. Elijah took twelve stones, representing the united nation. God is one, and His people is one. (3) The offering on the altar (vv. 33-35). After the bull-ox was in place, he had four barrels of water three times emptied upon the sacrifices and the wood so as to fill the trench about the altar. So sure was Elijah that God's power was sufficient, that he heaped difficulty upon difficulty. (4) Elijah's prayer (vv. 36-37). (a) It was based upon covenants (v. 36). The foundation upon which all real prayer rests is covenant relationship. (b) Its object was God's exaltation (v. 36). Elijah was jealous for God's glory—his supreme desire was to honor and magnify the Lord. The only thing that he asked for himself was to be known as God's servant. (c) It was for the salvation of the people (v. 37). His heart yearned after Israel. He was most desirous that they should come to know God. (5) The result (vv. 38-39). (a) The fire of the Lord fell and consumed not only the sacrifice, but the wood, stones and dust, even licking up the water in the trench. (b) The people fell on their faces and confessed that the Lord was the God.

1V. The Execution of Baal's Prophets (v. 40).  
The reason for this drastic action was that Israel's government was a theocracy—God was their King. Idolatry was treason against the King. These false prophets were traitors to God and therefore should die.

V. God's Prophets Vindicated (vv. 41-49).  
The proof that Elijah was God's prophet was complete till rain came Israel under his ministry had now turned back to God, and God made known to them His graciousness.

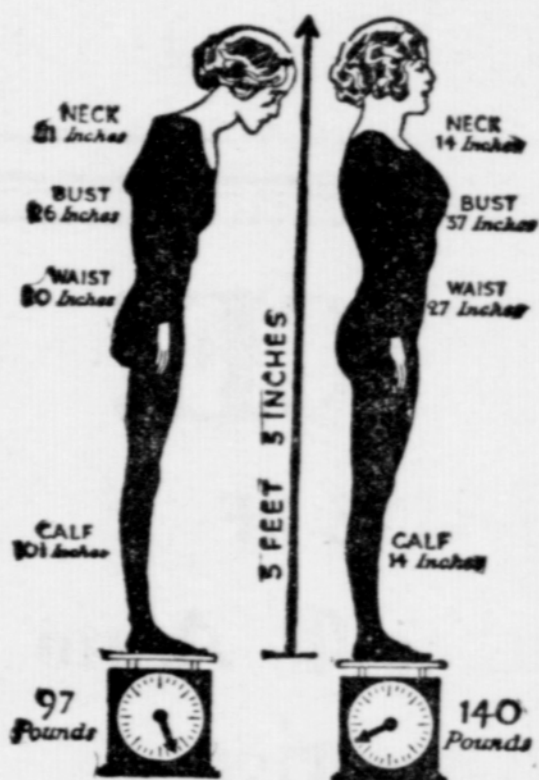

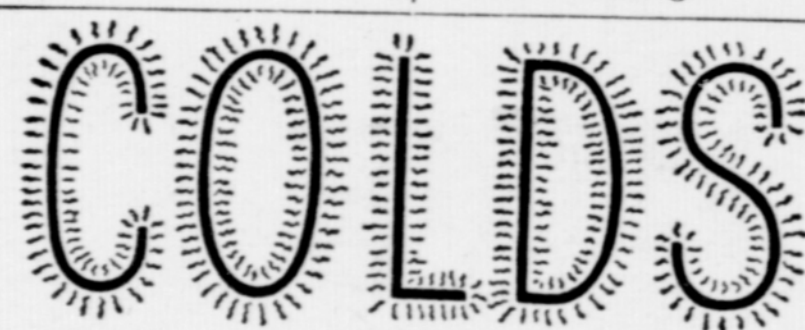

## U. S. PLAN ACCEPTED IN PRINCIPLE BY FRANCE

BARNS SUB USE AGAINST MERCHANT VESSELS; BRITISH HAVE ACCEPTED.

Washington.—The American proposal to prohibit use of submarines against merchant vessels, now the predominant issue of the arms negotiations, has been accepted in principle by France, but her delegates have reserved final approval pending a discussion of the precise language of the declaration.

British acceptance previously has been given, and although neither the Italians nor the Japanese had received final instructions there are indications that neither Rome nor Tokio would interpose serious objections if the proposal received France's full approval.

The exact nature of the French reservation was not revealed, but the impression was gathered in some quarters that it might concern such a definition of the terms of the declaration as would make it clear just what conduct would be expected from merchantmen in view of their immunity from submarine attack.

Should that point be raised, an interesting and many-sided discussion might result.

The French delegation, however, in making known their acceptance in principle, has emphasized that they not only agree to the original proposal of Elihu Root that the new prohibition on submarine warfare become effective when all nations have agreed to it, but also to the amendment of Arthur J. Balfour which would make the prohibition immediately effective as between the five great powers.

At the same time the French have accepted the additional Root declaration under which any submarine commander violating the rules of international law would be liable to trial for an act of piracy.

## M'CURBER TO HEAD FINANCE COMMITTEE

UNDER SENIORITY RULE, SUCCESSION WILL BE PRACTICALLY AUTOMATIC.

Washington.—Senator Porter J. McCumber of North Dakota will succeed the late Senator Boies Penrose of Pennsylvania as chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee. The succession will practically be automatic under the Senate rules of seniority. McCumber has served continuously in the Senate since 1918.

It will be his task to guide the permanent tariff bill through the upper chamber. The Finance Committee is at work on the measure now, and expects to report it out shortly after Congress reassembles Tuesday. McCumber also will have chief responsibility in connection with changes in the new revenue law which President Harding will recommend when he considers the time opportune.

The death of Penrose will not materially alter the policies of the committee. Penrose was regarded as a "protectionist" and a "standpatter." So is McCumber. Their views have been in accord on all principal matters that have come before the committee. In addition McCumber has been taking an increasingly prominent part in the activities of the committee because of the weakened physical condition of Penrose. It was McCumber who had charge of the soldier bonus bill, which was shelved at the request of President Harding.

The change does mean, however, that the chairmanship of the committee passed from an industrial to an agricultural State. McCumber, however, is not an active member of the agricultural bloc, although he has been active in promoting legislation in behalf of the farmers.

## BIG SUM FOR ROAD BUILDING AVAILABLE

Washington.—To relieve the unemployment situation, the Bureau of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture is prepared to do everything possible to expedite Federal-aid road-building projects that can provide work or that will shorten the winter season of inactivity in road building in the Northern States. Projects will be approved without delay for the building of roads which the States and the district engineers of the department agree will come within the Federal aid program.

There is available at the present time an unexpended balance from the old Federal aid appropriation of \$53,702,000 in Federal aid funds yet to be apportioned among the States in addition, under the law passed Nov. 9 last, the sum of \$24,375,000 became available Jan. 1, \$48,750,000, a total of \$126,827,000.

In approving projects under the recent law the department will keep uppermost in mind the provision of the 1921 law which states that "the Secretary of Agriculture shall give preference to such projects as will expedite the completion of an adequate and connected system of highways, interstate in character."

## YOUNG WOMAN HORRIBLY MANGLED BY SPEED DEMON

Dallas.—Miss Lucille Cowser, 23 years old, 1604 Lenway avenue, was struck and fatally injured by an automobile about 2:30 a. m. Sunday, midway on the viaduct. The young woman, with a companion, Thomas M. Holliday, 4825 East Side avenue, had stopped a car driven by Stanley F. Orloop, 2708 Fairmount, and were requesting a ride to an all-night filling station to secure gasoline for the car in which they were riding, with several companions, when the accident occurred.

The car which struck Miss Cowser came from behind the one driven by Mr. Orloop, which was facing toward the Dallas end of the viaduct. Eyewitnesses say it was traveling at a high rate of speed.

Miss Cowser, who was standing back of Mr. Holliday, was preparing to enter the rear seat of Mr. Orloop's automobile when the speeding car struck her. She was hurled about forty feet, falling on her face. The driver did not stop.

Miss Cowser was taken to the Emergency Hospital and from there to St. Paul Sanitarium, where she died shortly after arriving. In addition to a blow over the right temple, she sustained broken bones in both legs and arms and a broken nose.

Miss Cowser is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Cowser of Kaufman.

## TEXAS FARMERS IN MEETING AT DALLAS

Dallas.—Hundreds of Texas farmers and many from other States are in Dallas attending the second annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation. Delegates began arriving Tuesday and there were many callers during the day at the headquarters of the federation in the Farm Bureau Building.

The general cotton situation, progress of the co-operative marketing movement, proposals from other cities seeking to secure the headquarters of the organization and general business matters were discussed by directors of the Cotton Growers' Exchange at an executive session. The question of a permanent location for the headquarters is expected to be settled during the meeting of the Farm Bureau Federation.

**Jury Told To Investigate Mob.** Waco, Texas.—In his charge to the grand jury Tuesday morning in the Fifty-Fourth District Court, Judge Richard I. Munroe called special attention to acts of mob violence in McLennan County. Speaking extemporaneously, he declared that "every mob that takes the law into its own hands and lynches a person, whether that party be guilty or not, is guilty of murder."

**Los Angeles Bandits Get \$10,000.** Los Angeles, Cal.—Three bandits, armed with sawed off shotguns, held up three collectors for the Owl Drug Company in its store at Sixth and Broadway and escaped in an automobile with about \$10,000.

**German Flag Files in New York.** New York.—Germany's flag has reappeared among those of other nations which fly from the tall buildings of New York's financial and shipping districts.

**New School At Arlington.** Arlington, Texas.—The \$100,000 bond issue, which will be used for erecting the new high school, has been sold and work will begin in the near future. The bonds were sold at par.

## "BOSS" OF OLD GUARD DIES WITH THE OLD YEAR

Washington.—Senator Boies Penrose of Pennsylvania died here after a brief illness on the dawn of the new year.

Senator Penrose, who was 61 years of age, had been complaining for some days, but it was stated repeatedly by his friends that his condition was improving and that he would be able to resume his duties in the Senate this week. His recent work as chairman of the Finance Committee in handling tax and tariff legislation was a greater physical hardship, his friends said, than he himself realized.

United States Senator Boies Penrose of Pennsylvania, one of the most interesting personalities in the upper house, which he entered in 1897 as the successor to the late Senator J. Donald Cameron, was one of the wealthiest bachelors in the Senate. An "old guard" Republican, he was a member of four important Senate committees, namely, the Finance Committee, of which he was the chairman, Banking and Currency, Immigration and Naval Affairs. He was born in Philadelphia on Nov. 1, 1860.

**Dry Agents Arrested 200.** Chicago Ill.—More than 200 persons were arrested Saturday night and Sunday by the police and prohibition agents in their campaign to make Chicago dry at the opening of the new year.

**Negroes Get \$15,000 in Holdup.** Kansas City, Mo.—Four negroes obtained money and jewelry valued at \$15,000 when they held up an East Eighteenth street pawn shop Monday.

**Financiers To Visit New York.** Mexico City.—Financial circles of this city show signs of optimism over negotiations which have been underway between the Secretary of the Treasury and representatives of American banking houses.
