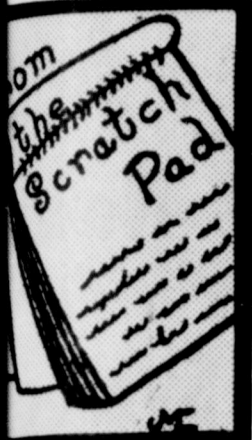

Bus-Truck Wreck Injures Students

Two Wilson school students were hospitalized in Slaton Mercy Hospital last Friday morning after a Wilson School bus was involved in a wreck near New Lynn on E-880 with a Texas Highway maintenance truck. The accident occurred, according to WHS Supt. Mitchell, approximately at 8 a. m. when bus driver, Jackie Bishop pulled onto the highway, not realizing it at the time, in the thick fog which engulfed the area that day. The bus was hit broadside, on the drivers side, turning it completely upside down on impact. 7 or 8 children were aboard at the time and 8 escaped through a broken windshield. All were taken to Tahoka Clinic for a checkup and treatment for minor injuries with two being hospitalized in Slaton. They were Connie Moore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Zollie Moore,

a 7th grader and Sherry Edwards, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Edwards, a freshman at Wilson High. Other children were from the Trevine and Torrez families. The bus driver suffered an injured foot in the mishap. Driver of the truck was from Post, and was not injured. Texas Patrolman Henry Hardin of Post investigated the accident. Both Connie and Sherry were dismissed from the hospital on Sunday.

O.B. Russell To Move To Midland

O. B. Russell, engineer for the local Soil Conservation Service work unit has received notice of transfer, and will leave Tahoka September 22 for Midland. He will work out of the Midland office, providing engineering assistance to work units at Midland, Andrews, and Odessa.

Mr. Russell has been with the Tahoka work unit for two years, beginning in December 1966. He came to Tahoka from Panhandle and has been affiliated with the Soil Conservation Service since April, 1937. According to Allen Shepard, work unit conservationist, Mr. Russell will be greatly missed by the local office. He has been doing engineering and design work in waterways, diversions, and terracing.

Mr. Russell was an active member of the Tahoka Rotary Club and was serving on the official board of the Methodist Church.

New Residents Must Apply For Election Ballot

New residents of Texas, wishing to vote in the presidential election this year can do so by applying for a ballot at the county clerk's office by September 20.

Residents who have lived in Texas more than 60 days but less than a year by General Election time, must apply for a ballot, meet all voter qualifications, except normal residence requirements, and was a qualified voter in another state before moving to Texas, or was considered eligible to vote in the presidential election of his home state.

Certificates of registration or other proof from his former residence are necessary when applying for a ballot. Applicants will be notified of acceptance and will vote at the clerk's office between October 21 and November 1, on the office of President and Vice-president.

Deadline to register for the General Election will be October 5.

Damage Estimates Are High In Tuesday Fires

Local firemen were kept busy Tuesday, answering alarms in the morning and afternoon. Both fires were costly, with damage estimates running into the thousands.

The first alarm was answered at 10:30 with three units being dispatched to an oil truck and tank fire north of Tahoka on Highway 87. When firemen arrived upon the scene, they found an oil distributor truck and a transport tank enmeshed in flames.

Workmen were transferring oil from the tanker in preparation of mixing road asphalt when the fire broke out. Both pieces of equipment kept spilling out oil, feeding the flames.

Black smoke and flame billowed several hundred feet into the air and could be seen for miles. Traffic along Highway 87 was re-routed for fear of the tanks exploding.

Firemen remained at the scene until all oil had been

burned and proceeded to cool down the equipment and extinguish grass fires in the immediate area.

No damage estimate was available at press time but the distributor was considered a total loss. The tank trailer may be salvaged in part.

A second alarm was answered shortly after 1:00 Tuesday afternoon and three units were dispatched to the Finis Botkin farm, three miles east of Tahoka on the Post highway.

At the scene, fire engulfed a small storage shed and a large combined granary and workshop. According to Mr. V. L. Botkin, buildings and contents were considered a

total loss with damage estimated at \$10 to \$12 thousand dollars.

A grain truck was in the building at the time and was pulled out of the building. It too received heavy damage.

Firemen were hampered by fallen metal sheeting, making access to several fire areas almost impossible. All three units were depleted of their water supply.

One truck returned and several firemen remained at the scene to continue extinguishing spot fires throughout the debris.

Cause of the blaze was unknown, but it is supposed that weed burning operations near the buildings was the source.

Game time for the opener will be 8 p. m. at the Buffalo Stadium, and all fans are urged to attend and support the team.

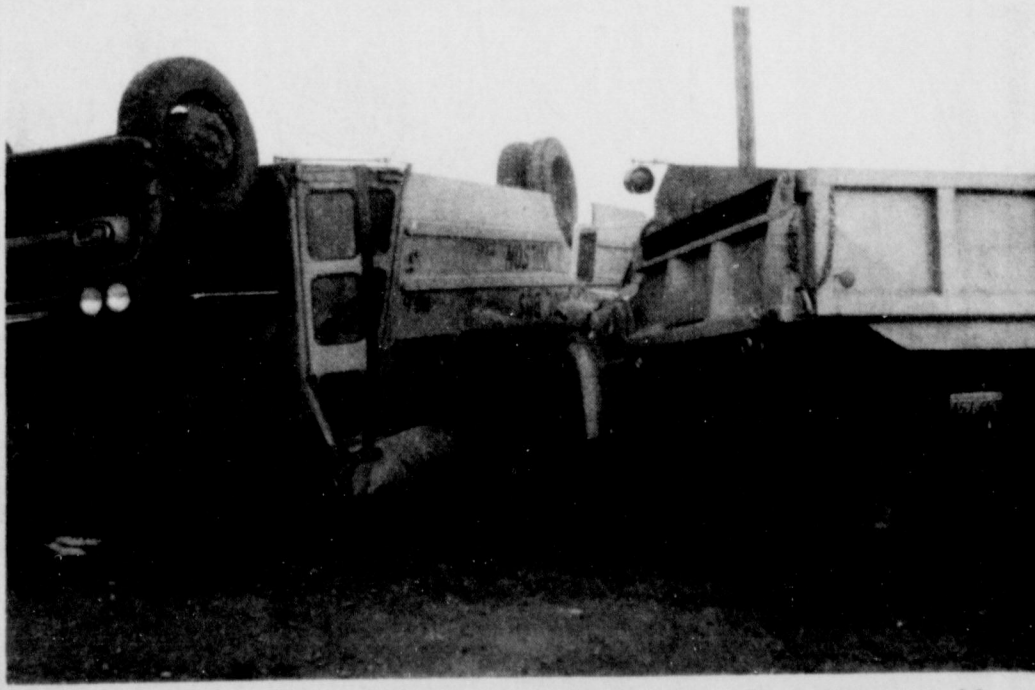
The first home game for the Varsity will be the following Friday, September 20, with the Bulldogs hosts to Crosbyton. Game time will a-

Quail Hunters Apprehended
Rumors soared last week as reports of numerous cases of quail hunters being apprehended circulated.

Some said there were three separate incidents and the amount of out-of-season birds grew by leaps and bounds each time the story was told.

To set the record straight, and as a matter of public record, I can report the following facts to you.

The true McGee, to some extent. Two different parties were caught possessing quail mixed in with dove bags.

One party consisting of two men and two women from Lubbock County had four illegal birds, and the other group two couples from Hockley County, had one quail in their possession.

At this writing, only one fine has been paid, that being by the man who had four birds in his possession. The minimum fine for such an offense is \$25 and his fine ran well in excess of the minimum.

The second case is still pending.

The biggest offense committed by hunters during this dove season is not excessive possession of dove, but shooting from a public road. The sportsman is warned not to shoot from public roads but must be off the road and out of the right-of-way to be legal.

Carpet styles, include need-punch to produce a flat, felted texture that's easy to clean and easy to walk on; tufted with looped or cut-and-looped pile that resembles conventional indoor carpeting in texture; or tufted with a curly, grass like pile of single filament yarns.

While green is a popular color for outdoor use, most manufacturers offer solids, tweeds and even printed styles in variations of blue, red, yellow, brown, and black.

Outdoor carpets are all man-made fibers and backing materials, including olefin, acrylic, nylon, and polyester, explains Linda. Resistance to mildew, sunlight, moisture, and harsh chemicals makes them ideal for patios, steps, and porches, decks, poolside, and for work areas inside the home.

Installation can be quick and simple. Often outdoor carpets are cut to fit rather than installed. They may be taped or cemented in place for a more permanent installation.

One manufacturer is promoting outdoor-in-door carpet in 12 inch squares which can be easily installed by the home handyman. Striped, checkerboard and random patterned designs in an assortment of colors can be used to suit the individual decor. Tiles can be applied indoors over a floor surface, and can be used above, on or below grade.

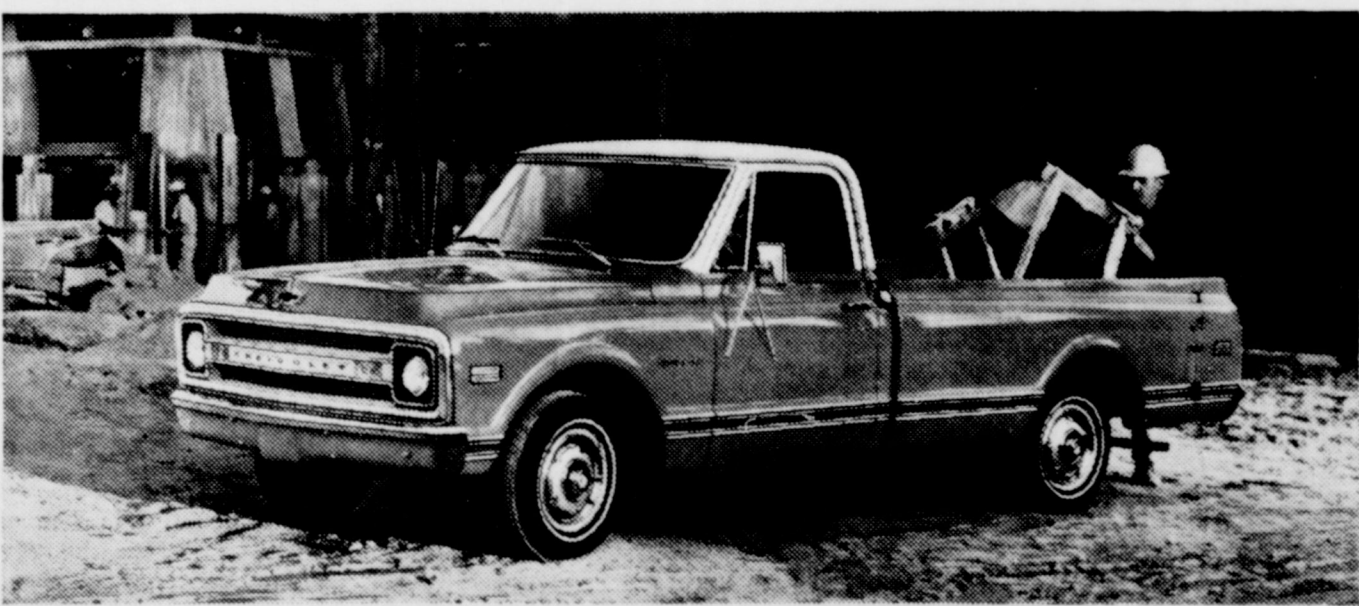

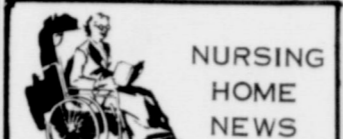
