U. S. Newsmen Tells Of Capture By Spanish Fascists; Given Courteous Treatment After Identity Is Known

The following vivid account of his capture by the nationalist soldiers in the Spanish civil war is the first word directly from Henry T. Gorrell, of the United Press staff stationed at Madrid after he was taken prisoner Sunday.

in different sectors. The others are James Minifie, of the New York Herald Tribune, and Danis Weaver, of the London News-Chronicle. After we were identified, we became guests of the nationalist high command here.

Two Others Taken

Likewise here are Capt. F. O. Lance, acting British military attaché in Madrid, and William Hall, sub-director of the Anglo-South American Bank in the capital.

I fell into the hands of the nationalists south of Valdemoro while proceeding toward Aranjuez Sunday noon in a United Press automobile driven by Navarro. Minifie and Weaver also were heading for Aranjuez seeking accurate information on the progress of the troops converging on the railroad from Madrid to the sea.

They were captured at 4 p. m. Sunday, three hours after I was taken. Lance and Hall were detained by rebels at 5:30 p. m.

Our presence with the rebels here is partly due to indiscretion but largely to the confusion created among the Madrid defense forces by the swift nationalist advance. It had become impossible to determine the exact position of the rebels, so swift was their progress.

I left Madrid at 11 a. m. last Sunday with Navarro and drove southward to Torrejon de Calzada which I found was quiet. We followed a side road east to Valdemoro and continued south on the Madrid-Aranjuez road seeking to determine the exact status of the road and railway there.

Traveled At Our Risk

A Madrid militia officer told us we could continue for some 18 miles tranquilly—but after that it was at our own risk, inasmuch as the nationalists occupied Sevensa and appeared to be advancing although they did not know in which direction.

Our motor car, bearing a United States flag, halted at the designated mark. Navarro and I looked and listened, but as we waited we

Farmers Surprised By Govt. Checks; Official Says Money Is For Drouth Relief And Denies Politics Involved

heard only faint machine gun fire from the vicinity of Sevensa.

Within 10 minutes an automobile filled with loyalist militiamen whizzed by, heading toward Aranjuez. I signaled Navarro to follow.

We sped along without incident for about two or three miles. Suddenly the air was filled with whine of machine gun bullets striking all around our car. Navarro halted the car. We both ducked. The first bullet hit my head.

I raised my head and looked ahead long enough to see that the automobile we had been following was now upside down on the road, the wheels still spinning. Later I saw the bodies of four of its occupants sprawled on the roadside, riddled with bullets.

Bullets All Around

The fire increased in intensity. I believed it would be safe to abandon the car and shouted to Navarro to descend. At the same time I opened the car's door and rolled into a ditch alongside.

I lay on my face with bullets striking all around, unable to lift my head or move my arms or feet. I called to Navarro. He did not answer. Then I took a chance and lifted my head a minute. I saw him still in the automobile. The motor was roaring. He apparently had decided if he joined me he would be killed anyway and had taken a desperate chance, and turned the car around to face northward.

I heard Navarro shouting excitedly, "hang on!" and at the same time waving his arms. It was impossible for me to move because of the hail of bullets and I shouted to him to pull out of danger. He sped away.

I squirmed around to change my position and looked behind me in time to see an armored car racing in my direction, machine guns popping away furiously. Had I seen it before I believe I would have tried to join Navarro regardless of the consequences.

Feeling that I would be crushed if I remained in the ditch, I crawled toward a field and hurled myself headlong into a culvert.

Surrenders

The shooting subsided but I was dazed by my fall. I saw a helmeted driver who approached, halted and ordered me to hold up my hands.

I obeyed and was marched to the road where we met a score of others with guns ready. One leveled a gun at me but was prevented from shooting by the driver. Soon an officer arrived on horseback and I explained I was a newspaperman.

I was taken before the colonel who treated me courteously and ordered an escort for me to Sevensa.

At Sevensa four hours later I met Minifie and Weaver. We proceeded under escort to Talavera, where we were taken into the presence of Gen. Jose Varela. Again we explained that we were newspapermen and not connected in any way with either side in this war.

General Varela questioned us, and after satisfying himself that we were neutrals, declared: "I shall be in Madrid!" From what I saw yesterday, I believe he is right.

HASKELL, Okla., Oct. 29 (UP)—Four score farmers near Haskell expressed surprise today when the mail brought them government checks ranging from \$5 to \$20 but inquiry at regional resettlement administration headquarters at Dallas revealed the payments were from Oklahoma's allotment for drouth relief.

D. P. Trent, regional administrator for the rural resettlement administration at Dallas, said that the surprise of the recipients probably was due to their lack of understanding of handling the drouth relief program.

He said also that this apparent misunderstanding might have been used by politicians to discredit the work of the R.A.

The farmers who received the checks had not applied for aid on relief rolls, but inquiry revealed that they had sought drouth relief. Trent explained that Oklahoma was given an allotment of 40,000 WPA jobs for farmers in need of drouth relief but that there were twice as many applicants as there were jobs available.

"County supervisors recommended to the county social relief boards the names of those who should be given jobs and the county boards in turn recommended applicants to the WPA," Trent explained in Dallas.

"Where no jobs were available, emergency funds were given families who could not be given employment. Those checks were sent out by the resettlement administration as drouth relief and vary from \$5 to \$20 a month, according to the circumstances. Where such checks are paid, they are entirely in the nature of drouth relief, as they were intended to be."

Trent said he would check the records of payments to the farmers in this county and in the Choctaw vicinity in adjoining Mayes county, where receipt of numerous similar government checks had been reported during the past month.

Several of the farmers here said that when they applied for drouth relief they were told they had too much land to be eligible.

Trent said further that W. E. West of Oklahoma City, state R.A. director in Oklahoma, had assured him that no farmer in the state had been recommended to the R.A. for a loan or grant except where the farmer had applied for such aid, either in the form of WPA employment, direct drouth relief or a feed and seed loan.

"There were 70,000 applicants for WPA employment in Oklahoma," Trent explained, "and the WPA had jobs for only 40,000. Many of those who could not be given employment were certified to the resettlement administration for subsistence grants for food, clothing and the actual needs of the family."

"We were given funds by congress to relieve distress among farm people in the drouth areas. Anyone who tries to say we have administered these funds for political reasons, to try to influence farmers in the way they vote, is 'all wet.'"

Flow From Springs

Moffett Cites Leaders Back Of Amendment Of Amendment

Proposal Would Limit Representation Of Counties In Legislature

Support of wide political interests was claimed for Amendment No. 6 in a last minute appeal by the author, George Moffett of Chillicothe, to voters in the general election, November 3. While the call was general to all Texans, it has particular import for West Texas, who reside in 65 per cent of the state's territory, pay 45 per cent of all money going into the state treasury, and yet have only 35 per cent of the 150 members of the lower house at Austin.

"Among the active supporters working for its passage," said Moffett, "are the following: Coke R. Stevenson, speaker of the house; Sen. Clint Small of Amarillo; Rep. Jack Padgett, Austin member of the house; and Jim Ferguson, former governor and known as the 'killer' of more amendments than any other Texan. All four have come out in the open for the measure, which provides for equalization of legislative representation on a basis of geography as well as population in the laying out of legislative districts."

Not 'Agin' This One

Ferguson, whose well-known "I'm 'Agin' It" has meant the death knell for many a proposal, disclaims the provisions of this one: "Amendment No. 6 provides a limitation on the number of legislators that can be elected from any one county. The amendment proposes to restrict the number of representatives from any county to seven, unless a county has more than 700,000 people, and then one additional member to each additional 100,000 population. The object of this amendment is to prevent concentration of legislative power in the large cities. If the six large cities of the state should reach an average of one-half million each, they could elect enough members of the legislature in the house and senate to absolutely control all legislation, and we would see six counties controlling the remaining 248 counties. I think this is an important amendment and should be adopted."

Stevenson's View

Another politician with long experience is Speaker Stevenson: "My experience in the legislature has been that a small group can, by effective cooperation, become the deciding factor in legislation. Members elected from a few densely populated counties are far more

likely to work together than members elected from scattered areas. For this reason, Amendment No. 6 seems to be a desirable balance wheel. Furthermore, a county with 500,000 people is not likely to have any greater variety of interests than a county with 100,000 people and, therefore, there is not the need for an increase in members in such a county.

"Furthermore, our federal constitution in many ways reflects the principle that geography as well as population should be considered in our legislative set-up, and the supreme court of the United States has upheld this contention."

The tendency toward centralization has gone too far already to insure the perpetuation of a healthy

condition, declares Senator Small. "Representation in the legislature should be well diffused over the entire state, just as are the base industries. The products of the range, the farm, the forest, the mine or the oil or gas well—there are things that have made Texas. But unless our constitution is amended, concentration and centralization of legislative power will continue. I honestly believe the adoption of this amendment is necessary to insure the continued prosperity and proper development of our state."

HAWKS READY FOR FLIGHT IN NEW PLANE DESIGNED TO SET WORLD RECORD OF 400 M. P. H.

EAST HARTFORD, Conn., Oct. 28. (UP)—Before November ends, Lieut. Commander Frank Hawks expects to smash the world's land airspeed record here with his new mystery ship, Time Files which he believes will attain a speed close to 400 miles an hour.

Hawks gave the sleek, snow-white, completely streamlined plane its first workout here Oct. 15 and said he was well pleased with results. "It's a swell job," he said, "and there is no doubt in my mind that it will do between 350 and 400 miles an hour."

If it does, Time Files stands a good chance of exceeding the present world speed mark of 332.33 miles an hour established by Howard Hughes at Santa Ana, Calif., a year ago.

Time Files, in truth, is a mystery ship. Hawks had trouble extracting himself from the cockpit when he landed the plane here for the first time. The pilot's seat can be raised and lowered by a hand-operated hydraulic jack, and the mechanism proved so mysterious to Hawks he had trouble getting out for a while.

In flight, Hawks can lower the seat, thus automatically dropping the top window light to enclose the pilot's compartment. When this is done, the plane is completely streamlined, one of the few speed craft, if not the only one, which has been so constructed.

Designed and built by Hawks himself at Springfield, Mass., Time Files is believed to have a cruising speed of about 330 to 340 miles an hour. "That is the speed," said Hawks, "at which it is most economical to operate. But in the first test flights I am going to fly at minimum speeds. That's all I am interested in now."

"The plane feels very stable on the ground," Hawks said after landing it for the first time. "It feels just like a transport ship. It has a three-degree twist in the wings, and good lateral control."

"I won't open up the throttle for a while," he continued, "but when I do, just watch it go. I believe I'll make a try at the record before winter comes, maybe before the end of November."

ney Wasp engine capable of developing 1,150 horsepower. Hawks said the plane "can handle up to 2,000 horsepower structurally." It has a fuselage 22 feet long, and a wing spread of 31 feet. Special wing flaps permit a landing speed of 65 to 68 miles an hour. While idling along, Hawks raises the pilot's seat and operates the plane behind a "windshield." In a speed attempt, however, he said he will lower the seat, thereby lowering the top window light, and fly "blind." The ship has retractable landing lights and gear. Parachute Use Possible The propeller is a Hamilton Standard three-bladed, constant speed design, and is 10 feet, six inches in diameter. The cabin has a slide door through which Hawks enters and leaves. If he has to use a parachute, a trip control pulls the hinges on the door, which drops away, leaving an opening. Hawks has also developed an automatic pilot, with which he will experiment before a speed attempt is made. The ship has a two-way radio

Campaign Is Yet Without A Real Issue

Patriotism, Self-Interest May Be The Deciding Factors

The presidential campaign drives toward its ending amid a confusion of tongues more suggestive of bedlam than of ordered clarification of the issues.

The "clear-cut" question remains elusive. Opposing campaign orators speak of many things but seldom of the same thing, in a direct meeting of minds. Qualifications and reservations clutter the political landscape.

To the historian of future times this may well appear a remarkable and unexplainable characteristic of the great political battle of 1936. At a time when questions of future policy are of vital interest, words without end are spent upon the past. The members of the Hoover administration are explored diligently, and each party nominee is confronted daily with some quotation of what he said on previous occasions. Questions about the detail of what is to be done henceforth go unanswered.

Even as regards the current physical facts of the case, there is no common meeting ground. Mr. Roosevelt is accused of making the grossest misstatements about the condition of the treasury, and Mr. Landon is charged with telling outright untruths about present market prices and trade conditions. It is an extraordinary situation.

Two Factors Involved
The wires of argumentation being tangled as they are, what will decide the election? There are two sorts of indications.

No one can disregard the evidence that some on both sides are fired by a deep-seated, even a zealous, conviction that victory for their candidate is absolutely essential in the national interest. This type of conviction developed early in the campaign, and apparently no arguments have shaken it.

At the same time, other large groups of voters are showing unmistakable signs of disregarding all of the forensic pros and cons as to national policy, and casting their ballots in accordance with what they conceive to be their own individual interests.

There are those who feel that they have derived and will derive much betterment of their lot from the act of the present administration. They are preparing to vote for Mr. Roosevelt.

There are those who feel that their security in their customary possessions and pursuits has been damaged and will be menaced hereafter by the current course of events at Washington. They are preparing to vote against Mr. Roosevelt.

It would be too delicate an operation to attempt to sort out self-interest and patriotic conviction in specific cases, or to compute which would be more powerful this year. That both are present in the situation, however, and that both are of a type against which arguments are not likely to prevail, is evident to all.

Argument Wasted On Many
It may be that a recognition of this condition, and an outstanding

of the stubbornness of the forces with which both sides were dealing, has had its effect on the character of the debate, right up to the end. When a voter is imbued in advance with an overpowering hatred, whether the roots lie in abstract social considerations or a desire for self-protection, it doesn't do much good to talk with him on that particular subject. Speeches about shoes and ships and sealing wax may be, in fact, more diplomatic and just as effective. For there are some differences of opinion which simply are past arguing about.

Dan Bulger, although not the favorite, was heavily bet, both separately by those who compiled him in a "double" with Pat, winner of the Cesarewitch a week ago.

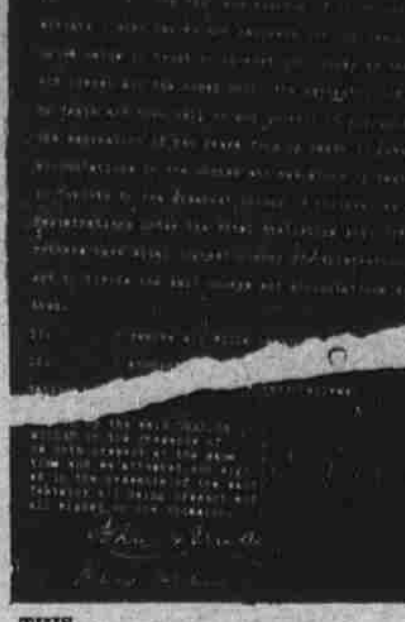

to prohibit dog-race betting and the legislature had not defined dog racing as a nuisance which could be stopped by an injunction.

"This court is fully conscious of the pernicious and unwholesome effects upon society of betting on dog races and keeping premises for dog racing where betting is allowed," the opinion by Associate Justice S. H. Gorman said, "but the proper agency for the suppression of those wrongs is the legislature, and until it sees proper to further legislate in the matter, the courts are without power to suppress these evils by injunction."

"We conclude there is no statutory authority for an injunction in the matter of operating and conducting dog racing, or permitting betting and wagering thereon, upon the premises in question."

An injunction obtained by Sheriff R. A. (Smoot) Schmid in Dallas county against Oak Downs, Inc., was dissolved, and writs of habeas corpus were granted Winfield Morton, D. E. Hamer, O. M. Carmichael and W. M. Cox, who had been held in contempt of a Dallas district court.

It ruled that a suit for injunction by Oak Downs, Inc., against District Attorney Robert L. Hurt was moot in view of the decision on dog race wagering in general.

The Austin court of civil appeals, passing on the case of A. M. Morgan against the Griffith Amusement company from Brady, McCulloch county, held that bank nights under the conditions set forth did not constitute lotteries and therefore were not illegal on those grounds. A district court had granted Morgan an injunction against the company which operated two theatres.

The opinion of Chief Justice James W. McCloud said there was no violation of the Texas anti-lottery laws because a patron merely bought a ticket to the show, registered for a chance at a \$25 prize put up weekly by the theatre and had not paid anything to become eligible for the prize.

50,000 School Children See Dallas Show

Student Movements Handled Without Loss Of Piece Of Baggage

DALLAS, Oct. 29.—Ten of the state's twenty-four administrative school districts have been cleared through the Texas Centennial exposition. The attendance has represented more than 50,000 children—with more than 50,000 separate pieces of baggage.

This baggage has been cleared and checked through the school divisions, the children relieved of the burden of transporting it to their overnight stopping place—and not a single piece of baggage has been lost or misplaced.

Frank N. Watson, head of the promotion department of the exposition, explains this record is due to the fact that tags are placed on each separate bag, a duplicate is given the child or his sponsor, and it is delivered in a Centennial truck to the point of the overnight stay. The child thus may enter the exposition without the worry of transporting his baggage, or his blanket, with full assurance that he will be able to find it at night.

The record as to baggage matches that as to accidents or lost children. There has not been a single accident in the movement of the children, nor has one been lost from his group for more than a few minutes. Uniformed guides are assigned to the children's groups to make sure there will be no "lost sheep" and to further make certain that all will get to the lodging assigned them.

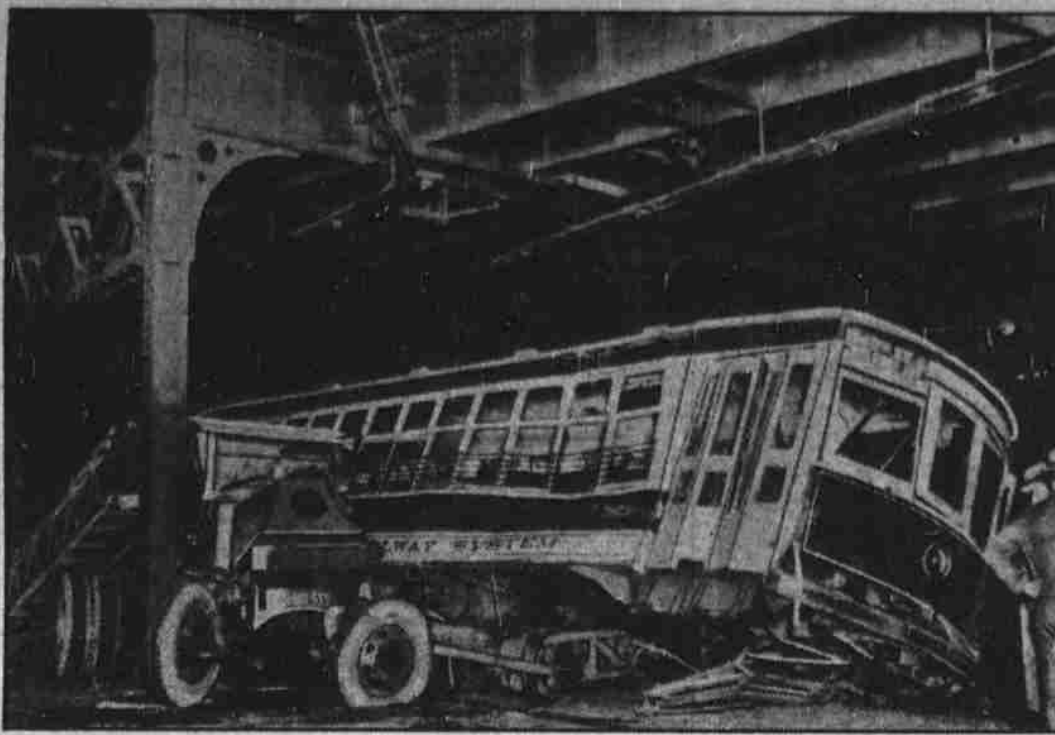

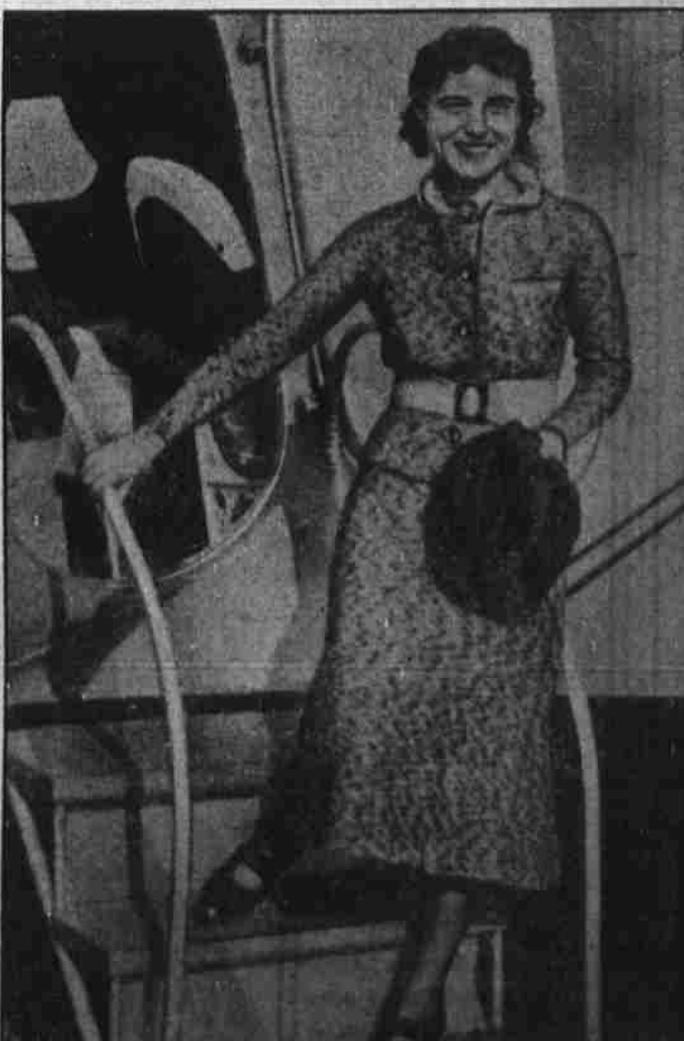

Retail Sales In Southwest Up

Increase Of 15 Per Cent Over Last Year Shown In Three States

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Retail sales in the Gulf Southwest as reflected by reports from 1,033 independent stores in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico, increased about 15 percent in dollar volume for September 1936 as compared with September 1935. Without adjustment for the extra working day in September of this year, there was an increase of 20 percent.

This preliminary estimate is based on figures collected by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, department of commerce, in cooperation with the bureau of business research, University of Texas. It covers the larger independent stores, in 21 kinds of business, 8 of which, due to an insufficient number of reports, are included in miscellaneous or group totals.

Without adjustment for the number of working days or for seasonal influences, September sales for the 3 states were 12 1-2 percent higher than for August, 1936. There was one more working day in August than in September.

All of the kinds of business represented registered gains from last year. The greatest increase was shown by lumber, and building materials dealers with a 40 percent gain. This was followed by motor vehicle dealers with an increase of 34 percent, other gains ranging down to the 7 percent rise shown in filling station sales.

GREAT BRITAIN'S KING 'CAN DO NO WRONG'— IF HE DOES, EMPIRE'S PRESS IGNORES IT



NEW YORK, Oct. 28. (U.P.)—The self-imposed censorship of the British press in connection with the friendship between King Edward and Mrs. Wallis Simpson, and the attractive American's divorce suit, is a striking example of the traditional protective attitude of the newspapers towards royalty and especially the throne.

The papers consistently refrain from publishing news that may cause annoyance, pain or inconvenience to the royal family. Some-

That is how the British press sees the crown—and the reason nothing derogatory is printed about the king who wears it.

Times there is a request from the place to newspapermen to suppress something, and such requests always are granted. More often the editors act of their own accord.

For example, several years ago a snoopy fellow got hold of the private diary of the then Prince of Wales and tried to sell it to a publisher. There naturally was a fortune in the book, but the publisher promptly notified the authorities and the diary was returned intact to its owner.

Throne Blinds Empire

But there is more than respect and reverence for royalty in this attitude. It is a truism in England that the throne is the symbol which holds the empire together; that if the throne goes, the empire dissolves. Because of this the papers suppress anything that may reflect adversely on the throne.

If England no longer subscribes exactly to the old doctrine that the king can do no wrong, it comes

and hedged in by stiff formality such as reflected in this Welsh guards uniform, can Edward successfully continue to live his life as he sees fit?

close to it. In any event, if a ruler should make a mistake the press would protect him against himself—that is, would safeguard the dignity of that all-important throne.

to regard the king's friendship with Mrs. Simpson as his private affair (though many Britons say it is getting uncomfortably close to being a matter of state), and England never intrudes on royal privacy. So far as Edward is concerned, his adoring subjects gave him plenty of leeway when he was Prince of Wales—"Prince Charming," they called him. Perhaps the question may arise now as to whether as king-emperor, he can do things he did as heir.

Public Just Smiled

The fascinating Mrs. Simpson is not by a long way the first friend Edward has had, and in several instances the romance was of considerable duration.

The public merely smiled and said "boys will be boys." The newspapers were silent. When Edward was "off-duty" as prince, he was accorded all the privacy of an ordinary citizen.

If he appeared in a cafe to dance—and he often did—nobody paid the slightest attention to him or his lady. They got bumped by other dancers, the same as anybody else. He used to like to go back of the scenes at musical shows, and he wasn't the Prince of Wales there. If he got in the way, the ladies of the chorus used to push him about like an ordinary mortal. Let the prince desert his role of plain Mr. David Windsor, however, and he would be surrounded immediately by a cheering crowd which would fight to get near him.

If the British press picks up the Simpson story, it will be because it feels compelled to do so in defense of the throne. But it will take a lot of pushing to force London's Street of Ink to abandon its age-old policy regarding royalty.

MORE WPA PROJECTS IN TEXAS APPROVED

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 29.—Authorizations for 33 work projects, involving federal expenditure of \$469,224 and \$208,147 in sponsor's funds were released by Works Progress administration officials during the past week, State Administrator H. P. Drought announced today.

Planned to provide jobs for 2,801 workers, these projects will be used to care for persons released from completed WPA projects and from seasonal employment, Drought said.
