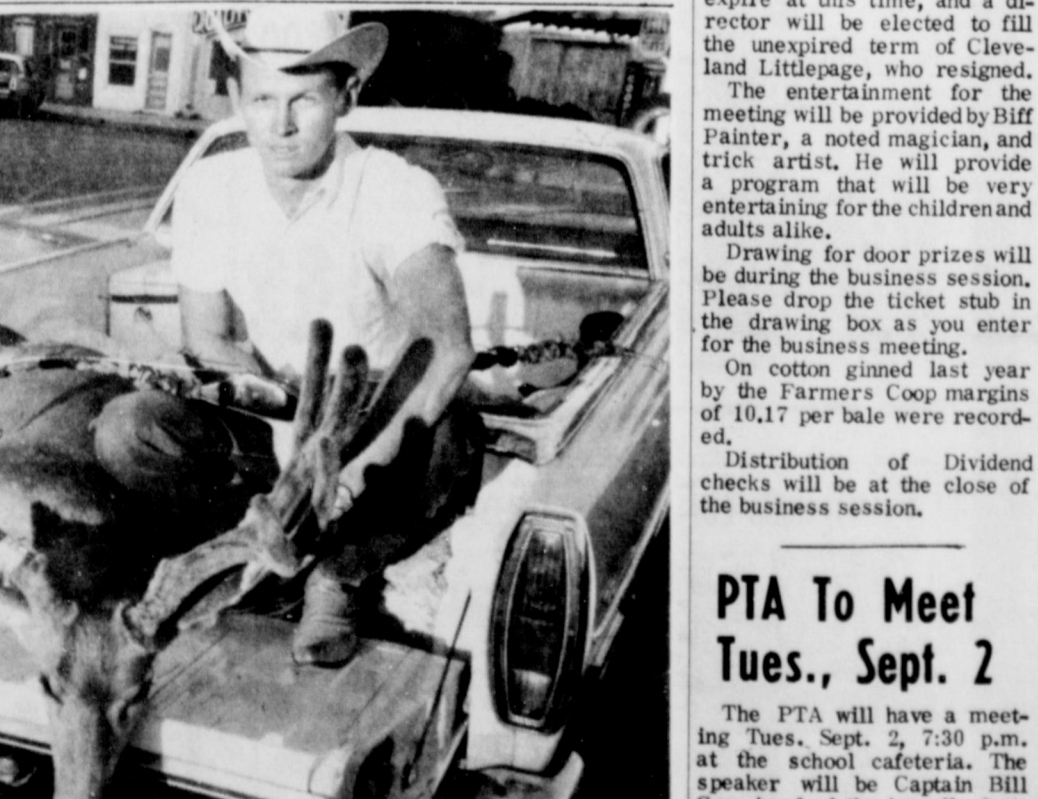
Million Dollar Rains Hit Lynn County Over Weekend

Wayland F. Taylor of O'Donnell was among 1243 students from 37 different states receiving degrees at Summer Commencement Aug. 22 at North Texas State University.

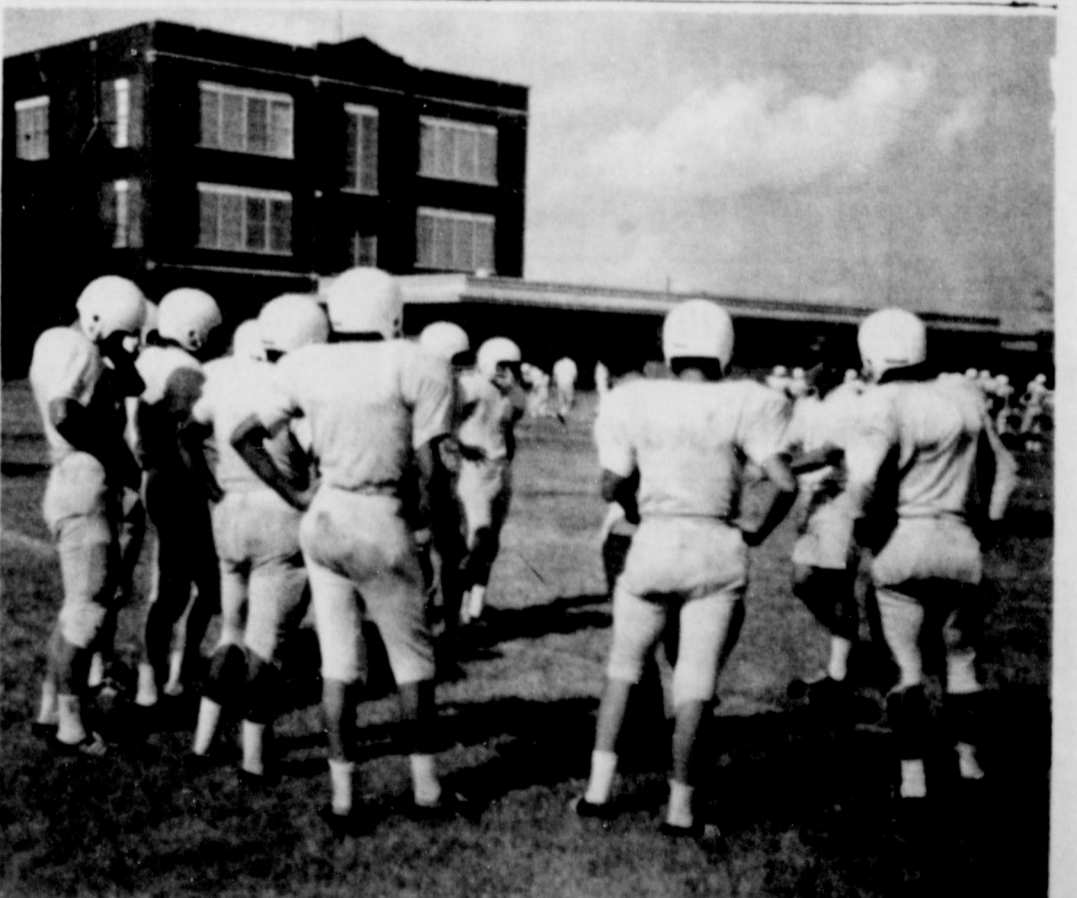

Copied from the September 8, 1916 issue of the Lynn County News:

District Court has been in session the greater part of the time since Monday and has been occupied by the case of S. H. Windham vs the A. T. & S. F. Ry, et al. Several witnesses from distant points in the state have been in attendance on the case, which went to the jury Wednesday.

The case of the State of Texas vs Buster Cagle, for alleged forgery, will come up today. The grand jury adjourned Wednesday without finding a bill.

Our worthy county clerk, P. H. Northcross, disappeared from Tahoka on or about the 19th of August, as the lawyer says and sometime after the 21st day of the same month, reappeared at his office. Being a bachelor of several years standing, and withal a very conservative man, no one though he would do any thing rash, therefore his absence occasioned not the least suspicion.

However, Truth the often cast down will rise at last, and Pat has been brought to justice.

Sunday past, Mr. Northcross drove into town accompanied by Mrs. P. H. Northcross, nee Miss Bertha Bauder. We don't know whether Pat confided in some friend or whether his self-consciousness betrayed him, but when he appeared on the street late Sunday afternoon, a few friends escorted him to the water trough and gently but firmly immersed him in the cooling waters. It is reported that as soon as he regained breath enough to speak, he confessed that he was married August 21st and that he and his better half would be at home to their friends at his residence in North Tahoka.

Short, 53, was found dead in his home at 1:30 p.m. Sunday. Justice of the Peace A. M. Turland ruled death was from natural causes. Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Glass, no longer a limited-use material in the building construction industry, now forms a new product - ceramic shingles.

One of the leading glass manufacturers has introduced and is testing currently traditionally shaped shingles of foamed glass.

Because of the extreme durability of the new foamed glass shingles when handled and installed properly, the manufacturer offers a 30 year guarantee.

The glass provides good insulation, will not deteriorate in the sun and extreme heat, is unharmed by freezing and thawing and resists fire, the manufacturer reports.

Color is an integral part of the foamed ceramic, so there is no fading or discoloration even in continuous sunlight.

The shingles cast heavy shadow lines much like those on a heavy weight wood shake roof and they appear heavy. But the cellular glass is light weight and easy to handle and install.

The wedge-shaped shingles are five inches deep and nine inches wide. Tapered ends are laminated to asphalt sealing strips. They are attached with nails like conventional asphalt shingles.

Recipe of the week: Parmesan Bread Sticks: Hot dog buns, Melted butter, Parmesan Cheese

Cut hot dog buns in half crosswise, then cut in half length wise so that 3 1/2" x 1" bread sticks are made. Brush each stick with butter and sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Brown slowly in oven until sticks are dry and crunchy. Recipe by Jo Alford - Lubbock, Texas.

Rodriguez Receives Medal

Specialist Four Armando L. Rodriguez distinguished himself by exceptional heroism in the Republic of Vietnam during the period 23 and 24 February 1969, while serving as a cannoneer with the Third Gun Section of Battery B, 6th Battalion 14th Artillery. The Third Section was called upon to fire a counter-battery program against enemy guns shelling Ben Het Special Forces Camp. Sixty rounds landed in the battery area while eight rounds landed in the Third Gun Section area. Specialist Rodriguez' exceptional performance while exposed to heavy enemy incoming fire encouraged the other section members to remain on the guns and continue firing. His courage and outstanding example contributed immeasurably to the success of his unit's mission. Specialist Rodriguez' heroic actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

Armando is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mateo Rodriguez of Petty. He is a Sergeant in the Army and worked for Bonnie Brown before volunteering for the service.

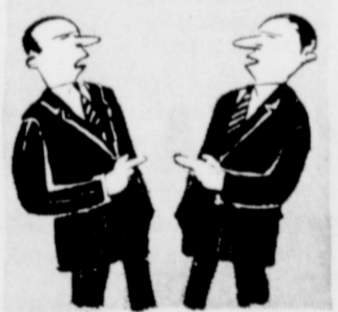


Mimics, Unlimited?

Mimicking the famous is, and always has been, a favorite mode of humor. Prince or president, magnate or movie star, anyone in the public eye can expect to see his idiosyncrasies turned into fodder for laughs.

Some are pleased, perhaps on the theory that imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. But suppose the person mimicked is not pleased. Does he have a legal kick coming?

As a rule, the answer is no. Whatever anguish he feels is considered one of the penalties of fame. The law gives a kind of



poetic license to the mimic to practice what it calls "a distinct variety of the histrionic art."

However, there are limits. Even the famous are entitled to be shielded against the imitator who goes too far.

For one thing, mimicry must not be used as a device for defamation of character.

"A person shall not be allowed," said a judge, "to murder another's reputation in jest."

For another thing, the mimic—even though telling no lies—must not violate the right of privacy. He must not expose those areas of the person's life that are not "fair game" for public dissection. Thus, revelation of a tycoon's personal peccadilloes, if totally unrelated to his business career, might well be an invasion of his privacy.

What if the mimic uses imitation not for humor at all, but rather to pass himself off as the real thing? In one case, an actor assumed a name and mannerisms similar to those of a famous entertainer, so as to trick audiences into coming to see him.

But a court finally halted him with an injunction, partly to protect the original entertainer, partly to protect the public. As one judge put it:

"First, a man who has a reputation for excellence is entitled to be protected in the reputation thus established; and second, the public should be protected against whomsoever places a counterfeit article on the market in the likeness of the genuine."

Such an investigation should also be welcomed by the public which pays the insurance premiums.

The insurance industry is seeking substantial rate increases on Texas automobile insurance policies and it is indicated that the state board of insurance is convinced the rates need to go up.

Car insurance rates have gone up every year for the past several years and we suppose there is no reason to suppose the climb won't continue.

But a lot of people are being priced out of the market when it comes to car insurance. Even carrying liability insurance of the minimum kind costs a lot of money.

The insurance companies contend that the increases are necessary because of highly inflated costs of automobile repair and medical treatments, and certainly we know that inflation has hit hard in both those areas.

Critics of the companies contend that the companies are fat and prosperous, getting rich on inflated premiums, and that their system of reporting profit and loss does not give a true picture of their net income.

So many are the arguments and counter-arguments that the average automobile owner, who must pay the ever increasing costs, cannot know who is right.

Insurance rates have become one of the major automobile operation cost factors. Still, the automobile owner who has any other property feels compelled to insure if to protect himself against suit if for no other reason.

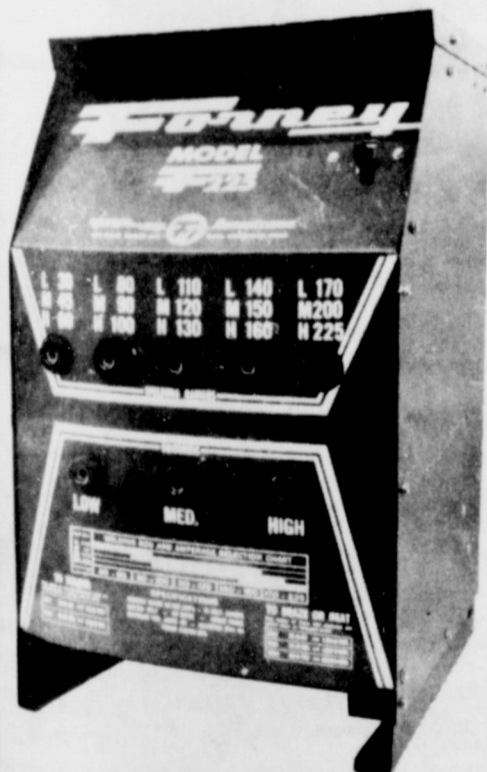

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Highway Depart Plans Improvements

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvements on F.M. 3112 in Lynn County, beginning at a point on U.S. Highway 380 approximately 6 miles west of Tahoka, Texas, and going south along an existing paved county road approximately 13 miles to F.M. 2053.

This project will be developed in cooperation with the Bureau of Public Roads and financing of construction will be 50 per cent State and 50 per cent Federal.

Work on the proposed project will include reconstructing grading, drainage, caliche base and an asphalt surface treatment, and reconstructing the intersection with F.M. Highway 2053 to a T intersection. Minimum right-of-way width is 80 feet with proposed right-of-way width to be 100 feet for T intersection.

Maps, drawings showing geometric design and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected at the Resident Engineer's Office on North U.S. Highway 87, P. O. Box 128, Lamesa, Texas 79331.

Canned California ripe olives are so simple to take on a picnic or to a barbecue. Just serve them right from the can for a snack or a relish. Since they are low in calories, everyone can enjoy them.

RIPE OLIVE SALAD ROLLS

1/4 cup canned pitted	1/2 cup mayonnaise
California ripe olives	6 hot dog buns
1 (7-ounce) can tuna	Butter or margarine
2 hard cooked eggs	Western iceberg lettuce
1/4 cup chopped celery	

Cut ripe olives into large pieces. Drain tuna and flake. Peel and dice eggs. Combine ripe olives, tuna, and eggs with celery and mayonnaise. Cut rolls in half leaving one side attached and hollow slightly. Spread rolls with butter and heap with filling. Tuck a crisp lettuce leaf inside each roll. Makes 6 sandwiches.

Stencil Cottons With Color

Whether you're the all-thumbs type or an experienced do-it-yourselfer, you'll find stenciling is an easy way to imprint colorful designs on fabric.

For one thing, it's a craft that demands little in the way of artistic talent. You can buy stencil designs or trace them from art books or magazines. Use stenciled motifs on place mats, curtains, pillow covers, bedspreads, dresses, aprons, even towels and pillowcases. Items stenciled with permanent, washable textile colors can be machine-washed without colors fading.

Choose a firmly woven all-cotton fabric for best results. Wash first to remove any sizing in the fabric, and press. For stenciling, you'll need textile paints, special stencil paper or any heavy waxed paper, a stencil knife or single-edge razor blade, and a short stubby stencil brush.

Paints, brush, and stencil paper are available at hobby shops or art stores. Heavy waxed butcher's paper or freezer paper also can be used.

For your first stencil, use a simple design—either a ready-made one or a motif traced from an art book or a magazine picture. Flowers, fruit, sunbursts, leaves, animal shapes and birds are good choices.

To cut your own stencil, place waxed stencil paper on top of a design you have sketched or traced on white paper. Tape to hold securely in place. Hold up against a window pane so the outline of the sketched design will be visible through the stencil paper.

Trace design onto stencil paper with a hard pencil. Then cut out the design with a special stencil knife or single-edge razor blade.

If you plan to use more than one color in the design, cut separate stencils for each color or area.

For instance, your design may be a flower with a long stem and leaves. You plan to paint the flower red, and the stem and leaves green. Therefore, cut one stencil for the flower and another for the stem and leaves.

Put fabric to be stenciled on a blotter or thick cardboard to take up any excess paint. Tack or tape the stencil in place on the fabric.

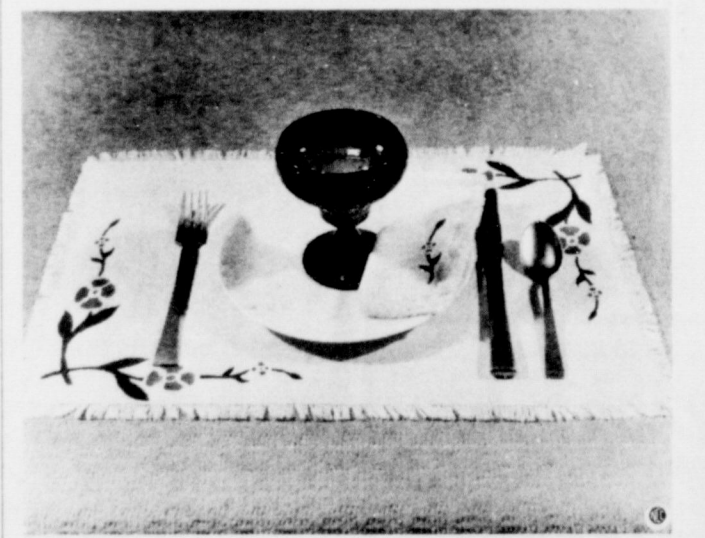
In using textile paints, follow manufacturer's directions. Stroke color on fabric with a stubby brush, working from the outer edge of the stencil toward the center. Be sure you do not have too much paint on the brush. Wipe off excess paint on a paper before you start each brush stroke.

Let the first color dry before stenciling the next color area with a separate stencil cutout.

After you've decorated something simple—like place mats—you'll want to try your hand at a bigger project, like a bedspread or tablecloth. Stencil motifs over the entire spread, or just around the hem of a tablecloth. You'll find it's easy to be your own decorator when you take up stenciling.



FIRST STEP—In making stenciled place mats, first cut out the design on heavy waxed paper. Use a special stencil knife or a single-edge razor blade for cutting. Cut flower petals from one sheet of stencil paper, and stem and leaf designs from a separate sheet.

Taxpayers Rights

ANY FAILURE on the part of law enforcement officers to follow proper procedures in informing lawbreakers of their legal rights can result in light penalties or no punishment for perpetrators of the most vicious acts.

It now appears, at long last, that the poor, battered taxpayer is to be accorded a little more official concern for his rights under the law.

THE INTERNAL Revenue Service has announced that an agent investigating alleged tax

evasion must now advise the taxpayer at their first meeting that anything he says may be used against him, that he cannot be compelled to incriminate himself by answering questions or producing documents and that he has the right to seek assistance of an attorney before responding.

Certainly, taxpayers should receive as much or more official consideration of their legal rights as do lawbreakers apprehended by the police.

The Internal Revenue Service is to be commended for its action.

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Bollworms are being found in many cotton fields throughout the South Plains, reports Dr. Bill Clymer, Extension entomologist, and producers should pay particular attention to avoid economic damage from this insect. However, he cautions against spraying if not needed as an application of insecticide will kill the beneficial insects and probably necessitate continuation of spraying at 5 day intervals.

Bollworm adults or moths tend to be more active in lush growth and after the recent rains cotton will be in better condition and more vulnerable to attack. Also, damage may be greater in the younger June planted cotton.

According to past research, one bollworm can destroy 8 squares and about 2 bolls, says Clymer. This can be quite an expensive pest when heavy populations are present. Research has shown 2,000 - 2,500 worms per acre are of economic importance. This is about 1.5 to 2 bollworms per 10 feet of row.

Producers are urged to check their fields closely by carefully examining plants in several areas across the field. If an average of 2 bollworms per 10 feet of row is found, control should be considered. Clymer points out, however, that worms over 1/2" in length are most difficult to control.

Your local county agricultural agent has available insect control guides which give the latest information on when to spray and what chemicals to use. If you are in doubt on control measures do not hesitate to contact your local agent.
