Student Pilot Killed In Crash Of T-37 Jet Plane

A Reese Air Force Base student pilot was killed about noon Friday when his T-37 jet trainer crashed in Terry County 12 miles west of Seagraves. The instructor, Capt. William Harris parachuted to safety and was hospitalized for observation.

Second Lt. Larry L. Calvin, 24, was dead at the scene. He was a member of the Illinois Air National Guard and living in Lubbock.

Line crewmen of Lyntegar saw the aircraft go down and

observed one parachute. They radioed the information to the Tahoka office and the information given to Sheriff Carl Spears. He notified area officials and Reese AFB rushed emergency crews into the area.

The aircraft, which was on a routine training mission, crashed on the R. J. Rowden farm, three miles north and two miles west of the Ashmore community. Cause of crash is still under investigation by a board of officers.

Future Homemakers Will Observe National Week, March 31-April 6

More than 600,000 high school youth across the nation, members of the Future Homemakers of America, will observe National FHA Week, March 31-April 6, 1968.

In Texas, 72,905 Future Homemakers will participate in special activities and projects designed to share their FHA experiences and achievements with families, friends and neighbors.

The theme chosen for this year's observance is "Focus On Citizenship". Objective is to encourage worthwhile involvement of youth as citizens in the home, school, and

community. The local, state and national FHA associations, through projects, meetings, and workshop help develop individual and group initiative in improving personal, family, and community living.

The FHA carries out its goals with programs based on local needs and interests. Members tackle such problems as how to get along with parents and start family councils to discuss family problems and plans. They survey the job and career opportunities for home economics students and volunteer as aides, assistants, and helpers in order to gain practical experience. They assist and befriend the elderly, conduct anti-school dropout campaigns, run clean-up and beautification campaigns, perform volunteer work for hospitals and other institutions, and lend assistance in school and community activities.

Rotary Members Told Of Future Highway Schedules

Further highway improvements are scheduled for the future in Lynn County. District Highway Engineer Oscar Crain of Lubbock, told Tahoka Rotarians in a talk Thursday.

Next major farm road project, he said, will be rebuilding "Wells road", the 10-mile stretch of county paving from US 380 six miles west of Tahoka south to FM 213 through the old Three Lakes area.

Also, plans are in the making for improving and widening US 390 from Tahoka to West Point.

Immediately, however, Mr. Crain said, the State Highway Department and City of Tahoka are trying to solve a drainage problem in West Tahoka so that US 390 along Lockwood Street may be widened and curbs and gutters installed.

The State Engineer stated work is progressing satisfactorily on the \$1.8 million projects now underway, including the US 87 freeway.
