## No Speeding Within City Limits Says City Marshal

At the request of City Marshal B. Cr King, we give some points of the new state highway law that are most flagrantly unobserved in Taboka and which the city marshal informs us will be strictly enforced in the future.

All cars must slow down to 12 miles an hour in the city limits. A leeway of three miles is accorded drivers. That is if you are not going over 15 miles you are playing safe.

All cars must go to the street intersections to turn. And must drive to the right hand side of the street. When turning to the left cars must go to the right of the center of the street before turning. Cars must not cross from one side of the street to the other between street corners.

All cars must head into the urb at an angle of forty-five degrees. When leaving the curb, back out to clear the other cars, if any, and then proceed the way the car is facing to a street intersection before turning.

No car shall be driven within the city limits without a headlight. The state law requires the lights that will throw a ray of light not less than two hundred foot and the head lights must not throw a blinding glare more than four feet from the ground.

Two cars approaching a street intersection, the car coming from the right has the right-of-way. And in case of an accident the car coming from the left is liable.

The city marshal states that these rules will be absolutely adhered to and that this notice will be considered sufficient warning.

## HOW YOU WILL RECEIVE NOTICE IGNORANCE IS NO EXCUSE FOR FAILURE TO REPORT

Those men in Lynn county who will be drafted into Federal service will receive their notice of draft by number. The number by which each of these men is known to the United States government appears in this issue preceding his name and it is by this number that he will be ordered to report for duty when the new army is raised. This is expected to be Wednesday July 18th.

It has been pointed out that in the list printed herein and given out by the local exemption board there may be clerical errors. But clerical errors it is stated will not excuse any man from service. Every man that is registered knows that he is registered and no clerical error will excuse him from finding in the list the name under which he registered and the corresponding number by which he will be called into service. The local board urges that every man who registered in Lynn county find his name and number in this issue of the News and keep a record of the same in order that there may be no confusion when the general order is received here. Ignorance of one's number does not excuse one from reporting for service, it is announced, and the penalty for failure to report when the order is received is drastic.

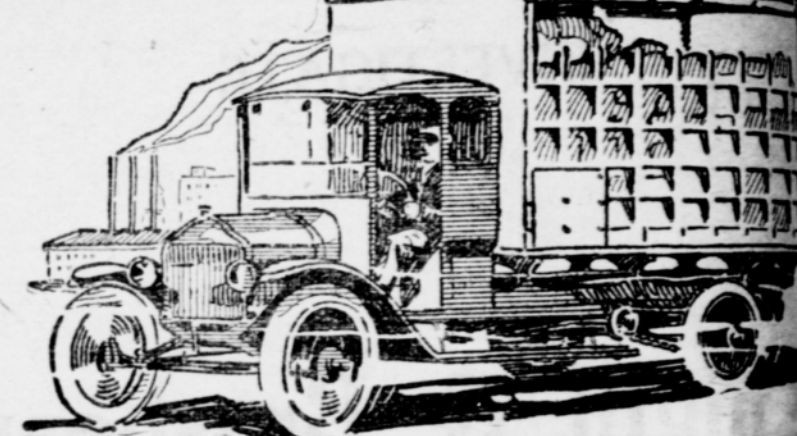

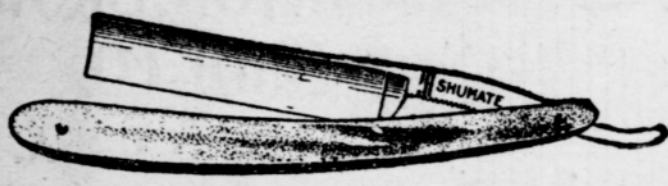

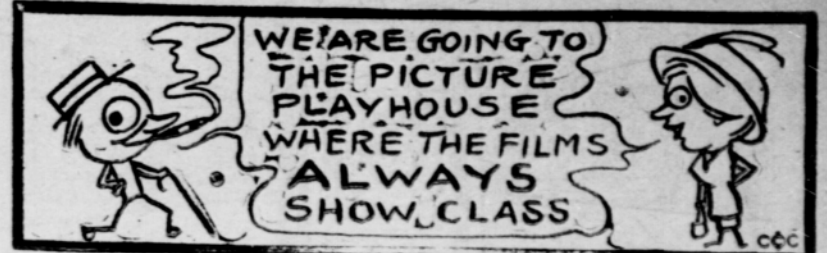

Austin, July 17.—The law creating the state highway commission was upheld as constitutional today by Judge Calhoun in the Fifty-third district court in an opinion in the injunction case of P. S.
