## Murder Charge Filed In County Death Probe

Two Negro men are in custody, one charged with murder and one with burglary in the Saturday death of Mrs. Carrie Wall, Grassland Odell Fullbright, charged with murder and Johnnie Coe, facing a burglary charge were apprehended Tuesday by Brownfield police, and a warrant has been issued for a third man, George Hight, possibly implicated in the burglary.

Mrs. Carrie Wall, 85, was found Saturday on the floor of her home by her daughter, suffering from a possible beating. She died in a White

Funeral Home ambulance before reaching a Lubbock hospital.

According to Justice of the Peace, Wayne LeCroy of Lubbock, Mrs. Wall's right arm was broken in three places and her right hip was either broken or dislocated.

Persons in the area have reported seeing two long-haired Negroes in the vicinity, and being seen hitchhiking north of Tahoka Saturday afternoon.

Lynn County Deputy Sheriff Doyle Woody told of following tracks of two men, for several miles northeast of Mrs. Wall's home.

Reports show that there was evidence of forcible entry into the house and that the telephone had been ripped from the wall.

### Area Residents Can Begin Vote Signup Tuesday

Voter registration begins October 1 in Lynn County and due to amendments of 1965, to the voter registration code, all voters must be registered in order to vote.

The change does away with the exemption from registration, previously accorded to persons over 60 years of age.

All persons 21 years of age or over may register at the

county tax office, beginning Tuesday. Deadline to register for the General Election will be October 5.

Current voter registration certificates must be held in order to vote in the General Election.

September 20 was deadline for new state residents to apply for ballots, to vote in the presidential election this year.

## Bulldogs Down Chiefs 46-0 In Home Opener

The Tahoka Bulldogs poured on the power, full trot to dump the Crosbyton Chiefs, here Friday night, to a 46-0 win.

The powerful Bulldogs piled up 333 yards rushing, for 18 first downs. The Chiefs

tallied 6 first downs and netted 33 yards rushing.

Larry Arnold tallied first pay dirt in the first period rushing in from 12 yards out. Charlie Brown, quarterback crossed the stripes in the second quarter on a keeper,

from seven yards out. Jim McCord put the toe to the ball for the extra.

Also in the second period, Brown passed to Tim Walker for a 28-yard teedee, and again to Walker for a 37 yard strike just before halftime.

Martin Warren intercepted a Chief pass and scampered 45 yards to cross the line making the halftime score 33-0. McCord again did the kicking honors.

The Bulldogs did not score in the third, but Warren tossed a pass to James Sayles for a sixty-yarder and Greg Thomas scored the final on a 31-yard run.

Outstanding defensive players for Tahoka were Robert Montemayor and Jody Edwards. Lowrie, Dunn, and Cash shared top defensive honors for Crosbyton.

Greg Thomas carried the ball for the Bulldogs, 13 times for 156 yards. Next was Martin Warren, 12 for 47; Larry Arnold, 7 for 40; Tim Walker, 7 for 31; Charlie Brown, 3 for 29; Robert Montemayor, 6 for 22; and Larry Durham, 2 for 8 yards.

Tahoka's aerial game was three passes for 71 yards and Crosbyton, 3 for 36, with 7 incomplete and one intercept. Tahoka tallied two incomplete with no intercepts.

Eleven penalties cost the Bulldogs 85 yards with the Chiefs losing 15 on three called penalties.

The Bulldogs will be hosts to the Hale Center Owls tomorrow night at Kelly Field. Hale Center downed Springlake 12-7 in last week's game.

Tahoka now has 1-1 going into the third game.

## Fever Ticks Are Becoming Numerous Throughout State

Fever ticks have been found outside the South Texas Quarantine Zone, advises County Agent Bill Griffin.

He said Dr. James B. Henderson, Executive Director, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, made the announcement and asked stockmen to send a sample of ticks found on either cattle or horses to a regulatory laboratory for identification.

The importance of the samples cannot be overemphasized, Dr. Henderson said, and it is urgent that stockmen throughout the State cooperate.

Ticks should be placed in a vial of commercial alcohol and mailed to the State-Federal Laboratory, Third Floor, Western Republic Life Building, Austin, Texas 78701. A label or memorandum should accompany the sample listing the name of the owner, the owner, the mailing address, location of the farm or ranch, or type of animal from which the tick or ticks were removed.

As an aid, Griffin said the vials used for submitting screwworm samples for identification could be utilized. They are available at his office at his office and from the following sources: Tatum Bros., G. and M. Grain and Seed, Collier-Parker Pharmacy and the County Agent's office.

If you haven't tried decoupage yet, now's the time. It may sound like a new kind of dance or fancy dessert, but decoupage is just a big word for a simple handicraft that has taken the fancy of millions of women.

The word itself is from the French and means the art of decorating surfaces with applied cutouts. It is pronounced "day-coo-pahge".

However, there is more to it than that. The cut-out design and the surface to which it is glued must be covered with coats of a special varnish. This gives the item, which might be a decorative box, wall plaque, or piece of furniture - a distinctive finish that resembles lacquer.

Several years ago, do-it-yourself versions of this age-old craft sprang up with the "old board" school of art. Materials were found by scavenging lumber yards for old pieces of wood suitable for making into wall plaques. Magazines and art periodicals yielded prints for pasted-on designs.

To make the wood look even more antique and weather beaten, devotees burned it, hammered it, even sawed off the edges.

Today, arts and crafts shops offer unfinished wooden items for decoupage purposes. They include ready-cut plaques, boxes of all sizes, and wastebaskets.

And now, reports the National Cotton Council, there's a rich new source for decoupage designs. Motifs cut from printed cotton cloth, either decorator or piece-goods fabrics, provide imaginative cutouts. The fabric motifs give finished items a three-dimensional look and are easier to work with than paper cutouts. They also enable you to coordinate decoupage items with the rest of the room decor.

For fabric decoupage, choose a closely woven cotton print with large, clearly defined motifs. These could be big flowers, country landscapes, circus animals, or Early American designs. To coordinate them with room decor, plan to make curtains, a tablecloth, or a bedspread with the same fabric.

Look for unfinished wooden items at an arts and crafts shop. Sand down the item and, if you like the weather-beaten look, hammer dents in it and burn the edges. Stain with any wood stain you like until you get the shade you desire. Or give it an antique colored finish with spray paint. After paint dries, paste on fabric cut-outs with white household glue.

When this is dry, give the entire item several coats of special decoupage varnish, available at hardware and paint stores. You can get flat, semi-gloss or high gloss varnish in liquid or spray form. Sand lightly between coats.
