TAHOKA'S FOURTH OF JULY BARBECUE WAS A GRAND SUCCESS.

Wednesday, July 4th, was a day long to be remembered, not only by our own people, but by the many hundreds who traveled many miles to enjoy the hospitality of Tahoka the Star of the Plains.

Tuesday evening the town began to fill up with country people from everywhere within a day's drive, as well as town folks from Lubbock, Gail, Brownfield, Lamesa, Gomez and even Big Springs and Plainview intent on having a good time. All our people had their hands full entertaining visitors, while at the hotel the men guests slept on the porches on account of the rooms being filled up with ladies and children. The courthouse and all the business houses were stormed and easily captured by the tired and sleepy boys and men.

Although the dance lasted till 2 a. m., yet the crowd was astir very early next day and the cold drink

stand did a land rush business. Soon the ball game was announced and after a hard fought game lasting over two hours Tahoka beat Gail 18 to 2.

Dinner was on time and over 1000 people were at the table. No better beef was ever put on the table and it was well cooked. Every one had all they could eat and there was plenty left for the dogs and coyotes.

After dinner came the ball game with Gomez and the Tahoka team soon found they had to play men who could run like Indians and handle the ball like professionals. The result was 10 to 6 in favor of Gomez. The Tahoka team neither gloated over the vanquished nor envied the victors their hard-won laurels. Each of the visiting teams spoke very highly of the treatment they received. The Lubbock team was on hand and seemed grieved at

not getting a game. We asked them about it before the game and the offer we made was declined. We then matched with Gomez and when the Lubbock boys came, they took us by surprise. However, we would have been glad to have seen them lined up against the victorious Gomez team.

The races came late in the day and the grey horse came first, the sorrel horse second and the sorrel mare third in the first race. In the second race Lump Woods' Old Charlie was beaten by Walker's Brownfield black.

Many people went home that night, but most of them, especially the younger element, stayed for the dance, which lasted all night.

The barbecue is now a matter of history and we don't feel called on to apologize for it or anything which occurred in connection with it, since there was no drunkenness, bad language nor any other kind of disturbance on that day. The

rowdy—an alleged Western product constantly on exhibit in Eastern newspapers and magazines—failed to put in his appearance. Contrast this with similar occasions in the more civilized(?) sections of the country where a dozen arrests would have to be made and where the rampant riff-raff runs riot. Many people are kept away from Lynn county by land agents' stories of people starving to death in West Texas, but in a certain town 50 times as large and 100 times as wealthy as Tahoka, there has not been a free barbecue in 15 years.

Tahoka may not be as rich in money nor its land agents so rich in imagination as larger towns further east, but when it comes to inviting the whole world to come and enjoy themselves with us, we don't take second place for anybody's old town anywhere in Texas or any old town anywhere else, for that matter, even if it does cost us a dollar or two.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Tax to Pay Jurors.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

SECTION 1. *Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:* That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

SEC. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1906, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "For the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The voters opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per Diem of Legislators.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment of Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature of free passes, franks, rebates, privileges or advantages from certain persons and corporations.

SECTION 1. *Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:* That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

SEC. 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election, payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the Legislature during his term of office to accept any free transportation over any railway line or lines in this State, and any member of the Legislature violating the provisions of this Act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this State. Any member of the Legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this Article.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Certain Exemptions from Taxation.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to certain exemptions from taxation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 2, of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

SECTION 2. The Governor of the State shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and County officers.

SECTION 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas shall vote upon this amendment on the — day of —, at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to section 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 2, Article 8, of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes."

SECTION 4. The sum of \$5,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation, and election.

Cyclone and Hail Storm.

On Monday of last week a destructive hail and cyclone occurred in the north part of Howard county and destroyed the D. W. Christian house located 11 miles from town and occupied by W. E. Hale, whose new wagon was so badly wrecked by the storm that only one hub could be found. The family took refuge in the stormhouse, but the door of it was blown away, in spite of three men holding it down with a rope. The family escaped unhurt but lost their household goods. All outhouses were destroyed.

The cyclone was followed by a hail and rainstorm, which broke through shingle roofs and destroyed crops over an area of about 30 square miles and lasted over an hour. The rain was general over the entire county and was of much benefit to growing crops.—Big Springs Herald report condensed.

The Dallas News announces the consummation of a deal by which it secures the exclusive rights in the southwest to publication in color by J. Conde, the artist who has drawn the pictures for the Uncle Remus books of the past. The service will begin July 1.
