A Herd of Buffalo at the Grand Canyon.

Col. C. J. Jones, the noted frontiersman, perhaps better known as "Buffalo" Jones, has bought a carload of buffalo bulls in New Hampshire and will ship them to his big ranch, on the Kaibab plateau just across from El Tovar hotel Grand Canyon of Arizona.

Mr. Jones has been experimenting with a new animal which he calls catalo, a cross between the buffalo and the ordinary cow. It is claimed that the catalo is hardy, has a fine hide and produces excellent meat.

The herd of catalo at the Grand Canyon will be a great attraction for visitors. It is proposed to stretch a heavy cable across Granite Gorge of the Colorado River, from bank to bank and attach to same a movable steel cage, in which passengers will be transported. The distance through mid air as the crow flies is thirteen miles. The distance going down the south wall crossing the river on the cable and ascending the north wall is fully 20 miles. On the north rim is a dense pine forest, with frequent springs of pure water and plenty of wild game.

Land Values Advancing.

T. D. Hunt of Hereford Tex. is predicting record breaking crops in that part of the panhandle this season. He says that wheat is especially promising. We are now predicting 40 bushels of wheat to the acre in many places" said Mr Hunt "and when we raise wheat down in the panhandle county it is the very best quality. Our wheat will weigh 60 lbs. to the bushel and bring the top price. It is these good crops of grain that has benefited that country and attracted outsiders to it. We have improved on the quality of our cattle and they are bringing better prices than a few years ago and now our land values are going up very fast. During the past six months land in certain localities in my neighborhood has doubled in price. That is climbing pretty fast.—Amarillo Herald.

We have as good wheat country here in Lynn County as they have around Hereford and we have a better cotton and corn country. We are raising better cattle too and land is advancing rapidly. But what we need here is more Wheat, Oats, and Corn planted these are the crops that the eastern farmer likes to see growing.

"The Plainview News" is the name of paper No. 2 for that town. Shffner & Callaway are the proprietors and it is expected to be in running order by next week. They purchased an outfit from J. M.
