Quarter Horse Show Will Open Saturday

Quarter horse fanciers will get a chance to see some of the finest quarter horse stock in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico as the Tahoka Rodeo Association presents the Lynn County Quarter Horse Show Saturday, August 10th at the rodeo arena. The American Quarter Horse Association approved event will begin at 10:00 a. m. Saturday morning with halter classes and end Saturday afternoon with the Senior cutting event. John Stotts, an approved A.Q.H.A. judge from Matador, Texas will judge the competition. Over 100 entries from West Texas and Eastern New Mexico are expected, according to Oran Short, Rodeo Association president. Competition is divided into 42 separate events with halter judging of mares, stallions, and gelding with picking of grand and reserve champions taking up the first

17 events. Other events will include halter competition for youth, youth activity performances including showmanship, western pleasure, pole bending, barrel racing, and stake racing. Adult performance class will include junior and senior western pleasure, reining,

pole bending and barrel racing. Trophy and ribbons will be awarded to winners in these classes while winning entrants will split jackpots in the last four events which includes junior and senior calf roping and cutting. The Rodeo Association held a similar show in 1966 and now plans for this event to become an annual affair. Persons interested in showing an A.Q.H.A. registered horse in this show should contact C. W. Armes, Box 247, New Home, phone 806-924-3140. Entries will close at 10 a. m. Saturday.

feet at the state meet at Abilene. The Lubbock Jaycees sponsored Larry at the state meet. During the regular track season, Donnie set seven new vaulting records, breaking most of his own, set during the previous year. Climax of the season was winning 2nd at the UIL State Meet. Since

then, he has competed in summer track meets, placing 1st in 5 of 6 meets. One of the placings was at the state meet held by the Texas Amateur Athletic Federation at Fort Worth. Larry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Moore, Jr., along with 11 other winners will represent Texas at the National.

Your judgement is no better than your knowledge. To make wise decisions, you must know yourself, know your country, and know your opponents. Can you answer these questions truthfully: (1) Do you have freedom? (2) Do you have economic security? (3) Do you care about what's happening to your country? There are four ways for man to secure freedom and economic security - at the same time - (1) communism, (2) socialism, (3) communism, and (4) American capitalism. The difference between communism and socialism is the method achieved. Socialism, sometimes called Democratic socialism, is evolutionary in its development. It is voted in by the ballot, but it has the same ideas and basic goals as communism. Communism is revolutionary. It is forced upon the people by revolution, or bullets. To put it simply, the difference between socialism and communism is the ballot and the bullet. "Manifesto to the World", a declaration of principles written by Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels in 1847, announced to mankind that the new program of International Communism stood for: (1) the overthrow of capitalism, (2) the abolition of private property, (3) the elimination of the family as a social unit, (4) the abolition of all classes, (5) the overthrow of all governments, (6) the establishment of a communist order with communal ownership of property in a classless, stateless society. Lenin declared, "We must combat religion". When Karl Marx was asked what his objective in life was, he said, "To dethrone God and destroy capitalism." To reach their goals and create the society they have dreamed, they can only succeed through revolution. As complete revolutionists, they have set up "Rules for Revolution": (1) Corrupt the young, (2) Get control of all publicity, (3) Breakdown moral values, (4) Cause dissatisfaction, (5) Divide people into hostile groups, (6) Get people to lose belief in their religion and their country. How many of these things do you see happening in America today?

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

Section 1. That Article VIII Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carriers, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given in the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Conservation Practices Are A Must For Man's Survival

"Seldom has a cause enjoyed more public support than the soil and water conservation movement. Local farmers cooperating with the Lynn Soil and Water Conservation District have joined with landowners across our Nation to halt the waste of our national resources soil, water, and plants." Allen V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Tahoka, Texas, has stated.

"Like many other great causes, the soil conservation movement was born in answer to a crisis. That crisis, of course, reached its height during the Dust Bowl of the Thirties, when drought and rolling dust storms plagued great sections of our Nation. The United States Congress was in session when one of the great dust storms rolled across our nation's capital. The landowners became alarmed about the wind and water erosion of our soil, they arose and joined the Conservation movement of our soil and water," Sheppard pointed out.

"Today, we face a conservation crisis of another sort. It is concerned with the whole of man's environment - with the air he breathes, the space he moves in, the soil he tills, the water he drinks, bathes in, swims and fishes in - in short the overall quality of man's life. Pollution of our air, water, and soil is one of the greatest crisis facing mankind. This

goes beyond the farmer, it concerns everyone, the people that live in our cities as well as our rural population," Sheppard stressed.

"What's needed," Sheppard believes, "is a new, total approach to conservation problems, one that covers all fields of waste and pollution. Soil and water conservation important as it is needs to become but a part of the movement to preserve the overall quality of our environment. Foul air, belching smoke stacks, noise, polluted air and water, salted out soil - these need to join flooding and erosion as targets for all the people especially the leadership of our local groups," Sheppard stated.


"Booming population is largely responsible for the crisis we now face. The population explosion on a world scale is nothing short of startling. In the next 35 years, the population is expected to increase as much as it has since the beginning of time, resulting in a world of more than 6 billion people. Even our nation will not escape the effects of booming population. At present growth rates, we will have a net population increase of over 160 million by the year 2000.

The demands that millions more will make on our resources are staggering. According to official estimates, by 2000 the U. S. alone will need twice as much food and half again as much water for

irrigation. Our supply of irrigation water in the Lynn District is declining at an alarming rate.

"We do not need to wait 32 years to feel the effects of more and more people on our resources. We see the effects today in America's river systems, all are polluted to some degree by sediment from agriculture and construction, by municipal sewage and by industrial wastes. Air pollution in many parts of our nation is replacing bad weather as the farmer's chief enemy," Sheppard explained.

"There is much that agriculture can do to meet the problems facing mankind. First, the conservation movement can be improved to use each acre according to its capacity and treated to keep it permanently productive. Water and air pollution can be minimized by conservation practices that keep the soil in place and hold the water until it soaks into the soil. Only when we have spoken out, planned our approach, and kept conservation in the spotlight can we say we have done our part to care for the God given resources that man needs to survive. Only when we have turned our resources over to the next generation in as good or better condition than they were when we received them, can we say we have been good stewards of the natural resources," Sheppard concluded.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stock and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are, and as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children never exceed Seventy-five million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 51 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of certifying and measuring powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or compensate any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing shall be construed to prevent optometrists to treat the eye for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or prescribe any drug, physical treatment whatsoever unless such optometrists are regularly licensed physicians or surgeons under the laws of the state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance to Seventy-five million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for assistance payments only to Seventy-five million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are, and as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children never exceed Seventy-five million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 51 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of certifying and measuring powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or compensate any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing shall be construed to prevent optometrists to treat the eye for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or prescribe any drug, physical treatment whatsoever unless such optometrists are regularly licensed physicians or surgeons under the laws of the state."
