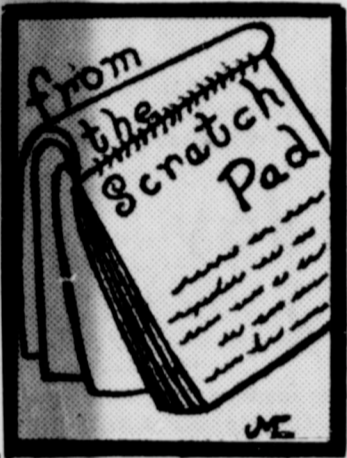

## Gail Vo-Ag Team Wins Four Straight In Farm Contest

Seven Vo.-Ag. teams entered the 4th annual Mesa District Vo.-Ag. Contest this week, sponsored by Lyntegar Electric Cooperative. Each team was comprised of four boys, competing for team honors and individual honors. The team from Gail was judged top team with 4,646 points, making this the 4th consecutive win.

Tahoka team won second place honors with 4,391 points and Dawson was third with 4,348. Other teams entered

were O'Donnell, Post, Brownfield and Meadow.

Members of the winning team were Gary Wilkerson, Fred Hagins, Xavier Benavidez, and Darrell Taylor. Max Bartley, Michael Glenn, Jiggs Taylor, and Martin Warren were the runner-up team from Tahoka. Members of the Dawson team are Corky Goode, Randy Hanes, Ronnie Hendon, and Ronny Schooler.

Overall individual winner was Darrell Taylor with 1,230 points. He was top contestant in the plumbing category with 375 out of a possible 400 points and tied in the identification event with a perfect 200-200.

Gary Wilkerson of Gail had 292-300 for high in the electric event and Max Bartley totaled 390-400 in welding for

top individual. Martin Warren had a perfect 200 for a tie in the identification category.

Each youth entered the four categories. The electric division consisted of installation of three-way switches controlling a ceiling fixture using a three conductor cable. Welding consisted of a lap joint weld and flat-butt open weld. Contestants had to cut, thread and ream a pipe that fit the gap in a plumbing frame, using center to center measurements. The pipe had to be assembled with elbows and pipe already in the frame. The final category was to identify several objects, in welding, wiring and other items pertaining to farm mechanics.

An awards dinner was held following the contest with Binie White, contest coordinator, presenting individuals and teams with plaque awards. Judges and guests were introduced preceding the presentation.

Other contest coordinators included Mrs. Lois Greathouse, John Ed Redwine and Mrs. Sue Inman. Lyntegar Electric Cooperative sponsors all activities, awards and meal. A \$75 cash award is also presented to the winning team, which is to be used for the purchase of electrical shop equipment.

## County Cotton Crop Exceeds Estimate By 40,000 Bales

Lynn County closed out the cotton harvest with a record crop, exceeding the preliminary production estimate by about 40,000 bales. The final bale count of area gins shows 170,022 bales of Lynn County cotton.

O'Donnell gins recorded the greater combined total ginned with 44,917 bales. New Home gins tallied 31,480 bales with the Tahoka gins showing 28,524.

Grassland gins were just

short of 20,000 bales, ginning a combined total of 19,435 and Wilson gins turned out a 16,318 bale count. West Point closed out the harvest with 7,200 bales. Wells with 12,300, New Moore, 5,600 and Gordon 2,800 of which two-thirds or 1,333 bales was accredited to Lynn County Hackberry Gin at Southland ginned 5,830 bales, accrediting half, or 2,915 of the total to Lynn County.

The record crop was ac-

complished despite adverse weather conditions during the growing season. Several county farmers had to go into three and four plantings, due to hail, flooding, and sand-storm conditions.

Some gins report that they have a limited number of unginned bales in the yards, but that the final tally would not be increased more than a hundred bales.

Information at one gin was not available this week

## More Funds Are Provided For School Lunchroom Program

The Board of Education of Tahoka Independent School District has authorized participation in the Special Assistance School Lunchroom Program, starting February 1, 1969. Application has been made and approval received from the Texas Education Agency.

This program provides more Federal Funds for the School Lunchroom Program and will enable more needy children to receive free or reduced price lunches, as long as this program is in effect.

Priority will be given to the low income people with large families and several children in school. Hardship or unusual circumstances may also qualify children for participation in this program. Policies have been established and a chart drawn up so that everyone will be given equal consideration in determining which children may receive free or reduced price lunches. This chart provides guidelines as to the family size, income, and number of children in school.

It is emphasized that this program will not provide lunches for everyone, as guidelines must be followed.

Application forms for free or reduced price lunches may be secured from Mr. J. B. Howell, South Elementary Principal, Mrs. Jean Harvick, School Nurse, North Elementary, and Mr. Burks, Junior and Senior High Counselor. These people will offer assistance in completing these applications and will answer any questions.

Parents who wish to apply for this program should see Mr. Howell, Mrs. Harvick, or Mr. Burks on Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday of next week. Since the entire lunchroom program is involved, it will be necessary for those whose children are now on free lunches to file another application to determine whether or not their children are eligible for free or reduced price lunches under the new policies.

## School Census Will Be Taken During January

The statutes provide that a scholastic census be taken during January of each year for those pupils, within a school district, who will be six years of age but not 18 years of age on or before the 1st day of September of said year.

Monday, January 27, Tahoka school students will receive a census slip to be sent home, requesting that they obtain the parent or guardian's signature, where the letter (X) is marked in red.

Each school age child should have a slip and children who will be six on or before September 1, 1969, and entering school for the first time should be added to one census slip.

If you do not have children in school and need a census slip for your pre-school child, notify the Superintendent's office, phone 998-4865. This will help make an accurate enumeration of our school district.

The public and members of all Lynn County churches are invited to attend the service to hear of the work being done by Rev. Strong in Sumatra and learn of the way of life of these people.

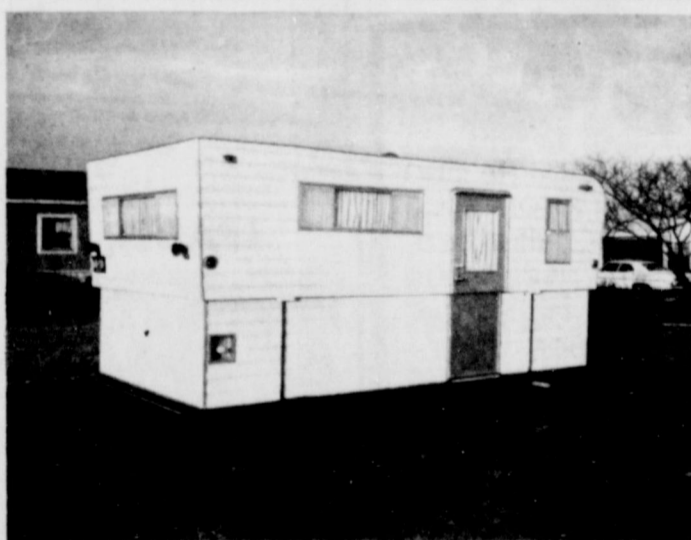

## Tahoka Electrician Builds Camper Unit

Bill Craig, local electrician and electric motor repairman has accomplished a project worth telling about. He has just recently completed a camper-trailer, of the Hi-Lo commercial type, with all construction being completed at his motor repair shop.

He began working on the trailer back in October, 1968, and upon completion, required approximately 300 man-hours and three months of parttime work. The camper, when fully equipped cost Bill an investment of around \$1,300.

The finished masterpiece, in the opinion of camper owners, involves far above construction, than that of commercial built campers.

Total weight of the all-steel welded frame camper, fully equipped is around 2,800 lbs.

Overall size is 7' 4" wide by 18 feet in length. A hydraulic lift system allows the top half of the unit to be raised to an inside height of 6' 6", within 60 seconds. The unit can be lowered to 65 ins. ground to top measurement, for moving to other areas.

Bill considers an electrical brake system a must, complete with a manual backup system. A dual 12-110 volt electrical system is used to power the lift and lighting facilities. Gleaming baked enamel, aluminum sided covers the outside, with pre-

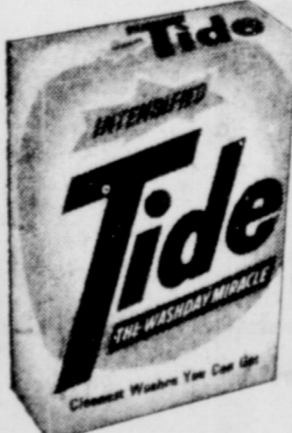

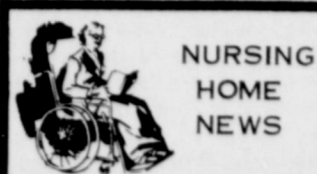

**Funds Received For Head Start**

Last week, the News published a story about a pre-school program receiving a fund grant through the Office of Economic Opportunity. The amount stated was in error and should have read \$71,905.

Funds will be handled by the Lynn County Development Committee, Inc. to finance a pre-school program for 60 children from migrant and season farm worker families. The program is a Head Start-project being conducted by the St. Jude Catholic Church. It does not involve any phase of the Tahoka Public School System.

**Local Education Board Receives Merger Report**

Tahoka school board was presented a report on the supplement to the Governor's Committee Report on the proposed school consolidation. Information in the supplement showed that the Tahoka School District is assessing property at 23.8% of market value (market value is established as \$58,358,000). The statewide average for local effort toward the Minimum Foundation Program is 13.8% per \$100 of market value.

Tahoka School District's local effort toward the MFD is 12.2% per \$100 of market value. Changes of the proposed Foundation Program compared to the present program of 1968-69, shows an increased cost for the 1969-70 and 1970-71 school years. A net increase in local cost, under consolidation, would be \$18,700 for the 1969-70 school term, showing increases of \$38,600 in MFP cost; \$28,000 in LFA; \$9,900 in state aid. The 1970-71 term shows increase in net local cost \$17,300. The MFP cost would be \$86,700; LFA, \$52,000; state aid would total \$347,000.

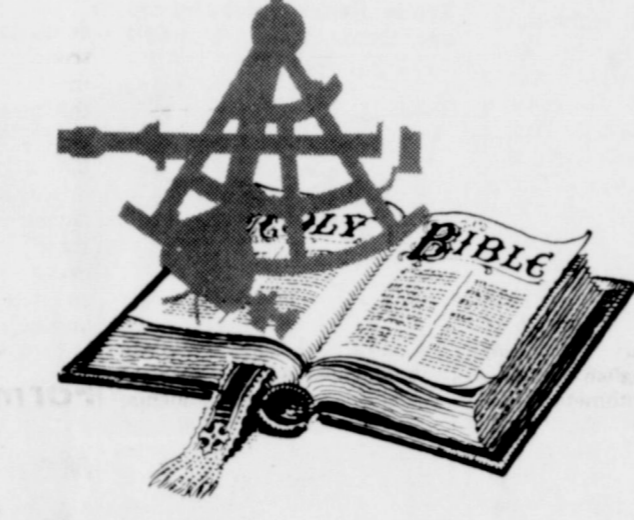

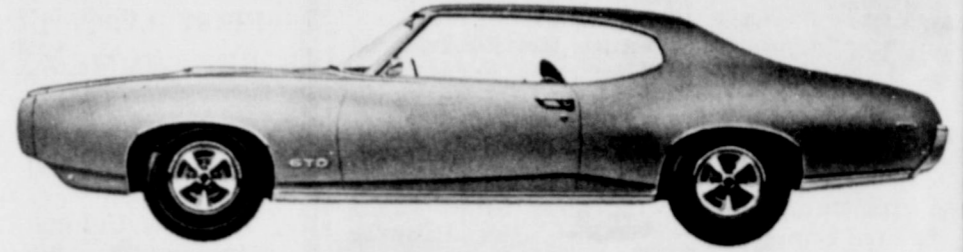

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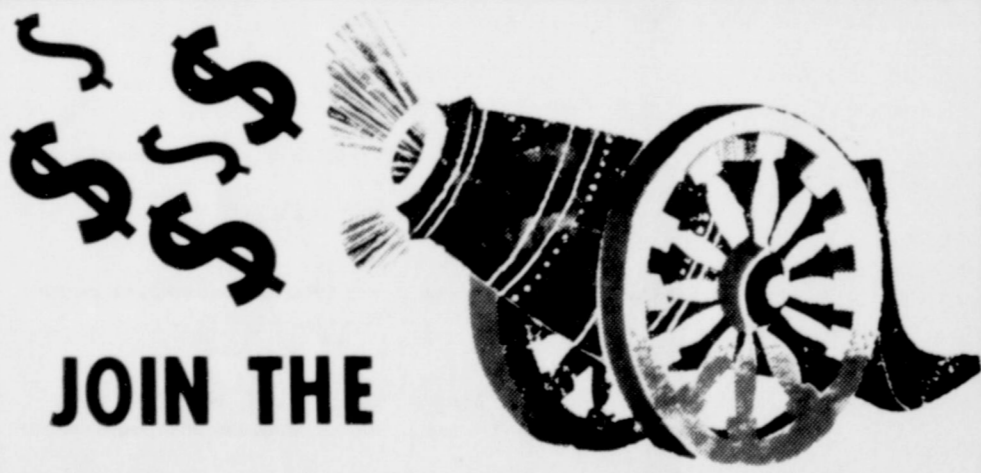

**Resolution And Order For City Bond Election**

ON THIS, the 10th day of January, 1969, the City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, convened in special session, being open to the public, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall with the following members present and in attendance: Meldon Leslie, Mayor; Alton Cain, E. T. Cloe, Austin E. Haney, H. B. McCord, Jr., Aldermen; and with the following absent: Clayton Carter, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had were the following:

Mayor Leslie introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Alton Cain moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Austin E. Haney. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote: Ayes - Alderman Cain, Cloe, Haney and McCord; Nones - None.

The Resolution And Order

is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Tahoka, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore,

**Be It Resolved And Ordered By The City Council Of The City Of Tahoka, Texas:**

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 8th day of February, 1969, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

**Proposition Number 1**  
"The Issuance of \$50,000 General Obligation Sanitary Sewer System Bonds"

**Proposition Number 2**  
"The Issuance of \$15,000 General Obligation Municipal Airport Bonds"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear to the left of each proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary, at the top of which shall appear the words "Notice of Election for the Issuance of Bonds", shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Tahoka, and published in the City of Tahoka, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.
