A farmer does considerable trading at his neighborhood stote, and when he wants a larger stock to select from, than the country store keeper can afford to handle, he has hardly enough to go to the railroad for, so he comes to the county seat and gets what he wants.

Whenever a trade is made, somebody makes something, and it is better that a Lynn County man should make it than an outsider. To build up Tahoka and Lymm County we must trade at home as much as possible.
Every country post office should have a school house, church, a store or two and a blackswith shop. There should be a post office and store, near the county line, on every public road in Lynn county. They would not hurt Tahoka, and they would draw trade from neighboring counties.

WINS FICHT OF 17 VEARS.
Stubbors Man Finally Gains Eis Point and Closes Toll RoadConflict of Long standing.

Lancaster, Pa.-For 17 years Columbus 0 . Rate, residing near the city limits, has fought unaided the Bis Spring \& Eeaver Valley Turripike company, whose road passed his property, and waich, he maintained, was a pablic naisazce. His victory has finally been vion, the court haviag just ordered the turnpike condemned.
As far back as 1888 Rate first regan condemation proceedings against the company. The latter resisted, and a suit resulted, which Rate won; uut tha decisiun was reversed by the supreme court. Rate then refused to pay toll, and ihrea:ened to tear down the gate house, thereby inviting another suit to test his allegation that the turnpike was a nuisance and an unnecessary public intiction.
Agaits he was prosecated, and won the sui: in the lower court, only to be again recrued. Still unrelenting in his deteranation to close the toll neirbiars tugan an azistance of hial extencion of south Dubc sitces it was fianly souta Duke strcet it a. he cumpan'a collhouse, elers to get inco and out of the city without paying toll.
