They issued their paper of four six-column pages, and aside from the ads and a few sheriff-sale notices, they had they had less than three columns of set type, locals, general news items, editorials and pay-locals combined. The reading public in this day and time are "wise" to the plate matter racket, Crie. You can't fool them any longer. They know when you are giving them "dope," and they will not stand for very much of it good-humoredly, at least. Come across and give us some of that deep-thinking editorial and spicy local matter which we know you can produce if you will.—Lubbock Avalanche.

Seldom since we have been in the newspaper game have we been made to realize the truth of the old axiom "It is the truth that hurts," as we have since reading the above "roast." We grabbed up our No. 6 lead pencil (hard as nails, sharp as a needle and lasting as sin) with the intention of passing it on to our merchants; however, Providence, whom it is said looks out for fools and drunkards, and we can't possibly qualify under the latter head either, intervened in the shape of a caller, and we took time to investigate the matter, finding that as a certain trust has it, "There is a reason."

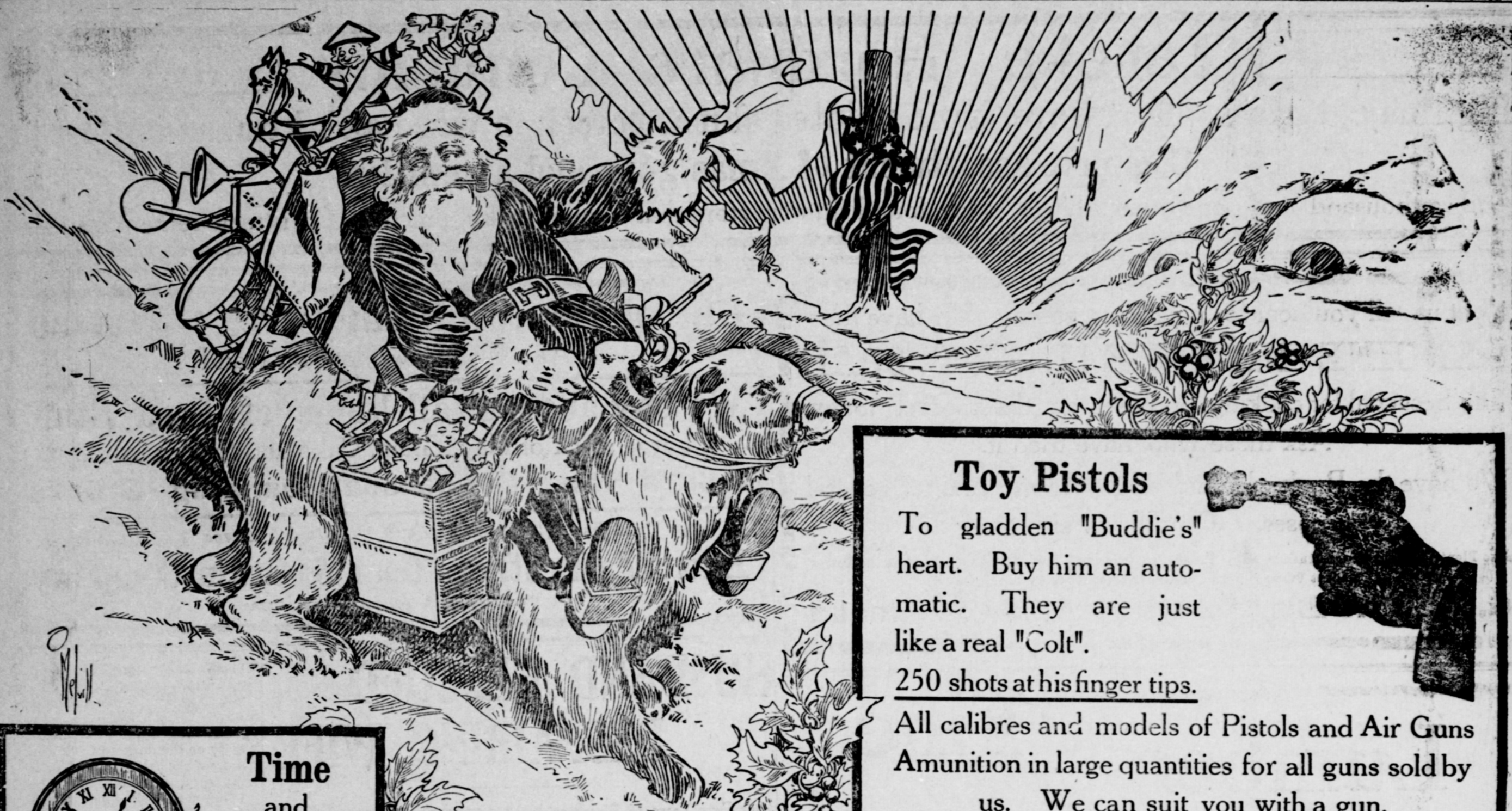

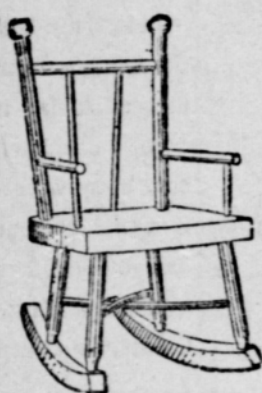

"I should think," said the humorist, "that you would be afraid to drink such water; especially as the seepage from that cemetery I see on the hill must drain directly into the river and pollute it."

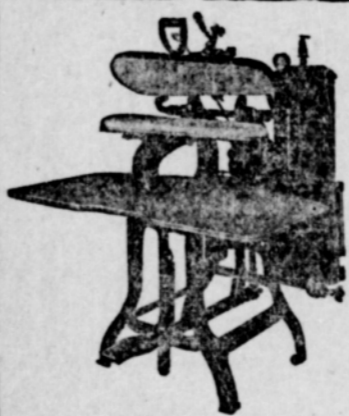
"I reckon yo' all doan' know Philadelphia ve'y well, sah, aw you'd know dat's Lau'el Hill cemetery!" said the son of Ham.
