1969 tax collections for November were \$11,478.73 after 2 percent discount was allow. ed.

Collections for November 1968 were \$15,942.06. On November 30th approximately 65 percent of the current taxes had been paid in comparison to 68 percent at this time last year. One percent discount will be allow. ed on taxes paid in December.
