Two touchdowns each by halfback Billie Smith and fullbacks Ricky Hatfield and Jimmy Youngblood and one each by

quarterback Gene Richardson, halfback Jim Carson and fullback Richard Rendon, plus four extra points each by Richardson and end Don Lonney and two extra points by halfback Larry Clinton racked up the victory for the Mustangs.  
The Mustangs scored 16 points in the first quarter, eight in the second, 26 in the third and 14 in the final period. The loss left the Tahoka Bulldogs 1-4 for the season in



Lynn County Farm Bureau sent 10 official voting delegates to the 36th annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau November 16-19 in San Antonio, according to R.L. Dulin of New Home, president of the local county organization who headed the delegation.

Also attending the convention from this county were J.D. Atwell, and Alton Cain.

Voting delegate strength at the state annual meeting is based on the number of members enrolled. The Lynn County Farm Bureau ended its 1969 fiscal year with 985 members on the rolls.

More than 800 voting delegates from 203 organized county Farm Bureaus were in San Antonio to adopt policies for the state Farm Bureau in 1970. They also approved

recommendations on national issues to be forwarded to the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation which is slated for Washington, D.C., in December. Proposed changes in the Texas Farm Bureau's by-laws were also acted upon this year.

Featured speakers at the TFB annual meeting included: State Rep. Gus Mutscher, Brenham, Speaker, Texas House of Representatives; Rep. W.S. (Bill) Heatly, Paducah, chairman of the House

## Christmas Card Mailing Suggestions

If you will please clip, save, read and heed the following suggestions before mailing your Christmas cards, you may rest assured that the cards will be delivered promptly.

First, use CORRECT POSTAGE. A minimum of six cents postage is required on each card, whether sealed, unsealed, local or out of town. Last year many patrons mailed oversize and overweight greetings that had to be rated postage-due before dispatch to their destinations. If you purchased overweight Christmas cards, be sure to check with your local post office for correct postage before mailing. Plenty of the beautiful 1969 Christmas stamps are available at all post offices.

## High Plains Irrigation Survey Now Available

Facts and figures that describe irrigation in Lynn and 41 other High Plains Counties are now available from W.B. Griffin, County Agricultural Agent. Griffin says these irrigation facts are published each year by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in the High Plains Irrigation Survey.

Although special emphasis is placed on 1969 irrigation, long term trends for major crops, number of wells, pumping capacities, and irrigated acreage are also included in the survey. This information is combined to show changes that have taken place in High Plains Irrigation over the years, adds the agent.

In Lynn County, approximately 2,466 wells pumped water to 92,000 acres of thirsty crops during 1969. In addition to the wells, 130 tailwater pit and playa pumps were used. These two low-lift water sources offer economical irrigation and contribute significantly to crop production and water conservation. More playa lake water should be used for irrigation, says Griffin.

Of the major crops in Lynn County, Griffin points out that 90,000 acres of cotton, 4,500 acres of grain sorghum and 1,000 acres of pasture were irrigated during 1969. These acreages alone show the importance of Lynn County irrigation.

Additional income from irrigating these and other crops contribute heavily to the county economy. Irrigation water, continues Griffin, contributes heavily to the wealth of many people in the county, whether received directly by farmers or indirectly through other businesses and employment.

A point of major concern to all of us, cautions Griffin, is that an average of 100 acres were irrigated by each well in 1950, 53 in 1960, and only 37 in 1969. The number of wells pumping irrigation water increases every year. Growers continue to adjust irrigation practices in order to make more efficient use of available water. For many farmers this means watering fewer acres.

CORRECTLY. Put your return address in the upper left corner or on the back of each card, and it will be returned if delivery cannot be effected. Address each card correctly, giving post office box number, street address, rural route, etc. Cards sent to children should be sent in care of their parents, especially locally or to other non-city delivery offices where street addresses are not used.

Third, USE ZIP CODE. Put Tahoka's Zip Code (79373) in your return address, and use the Zip Code for the address to which the card is being sent. A Zip Code directory is located in the lobby of the post office for your convenience, and two other directories are available for loan to patrons who wish to Zip their whole mailing lists. Please do not call the post office for Zip Codes during the three weeks before Christmas, because the clerks will be too busy to give out that information over the phone.

Fourth, MAIL EARLY. Greeting cards for distant States should be mailed not later than December 10 and those for local delivery not later than December 15. The earlier the better - it will give the other people time to run and buy a card to mail back to you.

Fifth, SEPARATE YOUR CARDS into Local and Out-of-Town Bundles. Labels for separating the cards will be delivered to each rural and city box on or before December 3. Cards for Tahoka rural routes should be put in the Local bundle and not in the Out-of-Town bundle. If you mail over 10 cards, whether bundled or not, hand them to the window clerk instead of throwing them loose in the letter drop. It will save the time spent in picking up and facing them. Extra bundle labels are available at all post offices.





**Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....**

Orange juice and orange drink aren't the same thing. Any beverage labeled "juice" must be the juice of the fruit named. Fruit punch may be part juice and part synthetic flavor. Fruit drink may be all synthetic.

The artificial sweetener cyclamate, recently was banned by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration. If a product contains cyclamate, it will be listed on the label.

Food manufacturers are aligning their products with recommendations stopping the use of the sweetener. Among them is General Foods.

In a recent statement, General Foods said they have halted production of foods and beverages containing cyclamates. Products are Pre-Sweetened Kool-Aid Soft Drink Mix, Diet Twist Mix, Good Seasons Low Calorie Italian Salad Dressing Mix, Log Cabin Light - Cal Syrup and Scoop Low Calories Granulated Sugar Replacement.

Conventionally sweetened products will replace them. Other General Foods lower-calorie foods, such as Birds Eye Cool Whip Non-Dairy Whipped Topping, and Dream Whip Topping Mix, contains no cyclamates.

The D-Zerta Low Calories line will be continued until February 1, 1970. Secretary Robert Finch of the Health Education and Welfare Department recognized the need for certain dietary foods for diabetics and others with health problems.

The company plans to reformulate the products to contain no cyclamates.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK Pumpkin Cake**

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 3 cups cooked pumpkin
- 3 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 2 tsp. soda
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. cloves
- 2 cups raisins
- 2 cups nuts, chopped

Cream sugar, shortening and eggs till light. Add pumpkin. Then sift dry ingredients. Save 2 tablespoons flour mix and dredge nuts and raisins and add last. Bake in prepared tube pan at 325 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

**Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....**

Weather conditions on the South Plains this summer and fall have been anything but ideal for producing quality planting seed. Now, a good possibility exists that cotton seed of acceptable quality from this year's crop will be in short supply.

"There are two big reasons for this gloomy outlook," says Dr. Bob Metzger, area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "First, the early freeze resulted in immature by stopping lint and seed development in northern portions of the High Plains. Secondly, the exposure of mature seed to prolonged wet spells in open cotton was equally detrimental.

"While excessive moisture is the main culprit that has brought on seed deterioration, we are fortunate that the temperature was relatively low during these wet periods," adds Metzger. "Otherwise, the results could have been disastrous."

Early preliminary tests of new crop cotton seed indicate higher than normal free fatty

acid content. Since this type acid is an indicator and by-product of seed deterioration, it may serve as an ominous warning of things to come, the agronomist points out.

A free fatty acid content of one percent or more indicates some degree of deterioration. Such seed will not only be more sensitive in storage but will also be more susceptible to mold growth during germination and to seed decay organisms in the field.

Free fatty acid does not tell us the whole story. But Metzger urges producers to use this test as a preliminary guide for rejecting or keeping a seed lot for planting purposes so that any sub-standard seed can be sold for milling purposes. Also, they should get a germination test as quickly as possible on seed to be saved for planting.

"Several other points should receive careful attention in preserving seed quality," adds Metzger. "When harvesting, make sure the cotton is dry. This means removing all green material that carries moisture. About eight percent moisture is desirable for seed cotton. Cotton with a moisture content above 12 percent left on a trailer for even short periods can cause heat and ruin good seed quickly, especially since most seed has some previous deterioration in the field."

Ginning is another area where steps can be taken to preserve quality. Operating with a tight seed roll and excessive fan speeds often contribute to mechanical injury of seed. Such seed are more susceptible to further damage when exposed to acid in the delinting process.

Another aspect of seed quality is varietal purity, points out the agronomist. Variety mixtures can be avoided by ginning in larger lots of 10 bales or more. Seed rolls should be dumped and other equipment cleaned between varieties. Of course, this problem can be solved best with one-variety gins or block-ginning procedures. Failure to clean trailers also results in mixtures.

"In view of the seed quality picture this fall, it becomes imperative that we treat these seeds with utmost care during harvesting and ginning operations," emphasizes Metzger.

"Extra care will also be needed in delinting, cleaning and seed treatment operation.

"Furthermore, once the seed is in the bag, make sure it's stored in a dry place away from harmful chemicals. We can do nothing to reverse seed deterioration that has already occurred in the field, but close supervision will go a long way toward maintaining our present seed quality."

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
