RAIN AND HAIL THIS WEEK MOST DAMAGE INSURED

Monday night Tahoka missed what looked like a splendid chance for a good heavy rain. A good black cloud gathered in the west and shortly after dark a nice gentle rain began to fall but only lasted a short while. Fifteen-hundredths of rain fell, just enough to lay the dust for about twenty-four hours. Most of the farmers who have crops planted on old land have not yet begun to suffer, but the sod crops are needing rain badly.

Wednesday night heavy black clouds gathered all around and about ten o'clock the wind blew up from the west of north and rapidly increased until it blew a regular hurricane, many people saying Thursday that it was the hardest wind ever experienced in Tahoka. Considerable rain and some hail accompanied the wind here, altho we have not learned of any particular damage being done in town. The rainfall amounted to from about a quarter of an inch in the south west part of Lynn county to three inches ten miles north of Tahoka. The government gauge registered seventy-five hundredths of an inch in the city, and reports coming in Thursday morning show that the south part of the county including O'Donnell, had about three-fourths of an inch of rain. Up in the New Home community the hail destroyed a strip about five miles wide, but how long we have not been able to learn.

KNOWS WAY TO KEEP UP WITH LYNN COUNTY

Crops in this part of the state are fairly good. Corn is made and cotton is blooming quite freely—just had a nice rain and prospects for more.

"No man would expect to reap an enormous yield from one little gram of corn," says an exchange, "but a lot of so-called business men buy a little old five or six inch space in the paper once a year and then spend fifty-one weeks hollering that advertising don't pay."

Reference is made in nearly every paper received on our desk to the impending strike on all railroads of the train operatives, who, as a class, are declared by officials to be the highest paid employees connected with the operation of the rolling stock.

Officials claim that the demands of the trainmen, should they be granted, would throw a majority of the lines into the hands of a receiver before relief by increased revenue in the form of higher freight and passenger rates could be secured thru the interstate commerce commission.

The trainmen say, according to the Slaton Slatonite, published in a railroad division town and in a position to give a fair statement of the trainmen's grievance:

"That all they want by the eight hour law is to compel the railroads to put them over their runs in eight hours. That often a run that should be made in eight hours, holds them over ten, twelve and even sixteen hours because the dispatcher puts them on sidetracks for an hour at a time."

In other words they hope to penalize overtime to the extent that when they are "called" they will be put over the road with a minimum of delay. That there will be no overtime if this is done is the statement they make in answer to the officials charge that "overtime" would consume the dividends of the railroads.

Be this as it may. Should the demands of the trainmen be refused and a strike declared traffic would be paralyzed and business demoralized. The producer, manufacturer and consumer would pay the damages of a quarrel in which they were not instigators.

We believe in organized labor and the regulation of public service corporation, but the statute that regulates the latter should contain a provision for the arbitrary settlement of any difficulty arising between the public service corporations and organized labor.

POOL HALLS CONTINUE TO RUN IN HADMAN COUNTY

The pool halls are in operation again. Last week the proprietor of one of them sent Senator Decker to Childress, where he obtained a temporary injunction restraining County Attorney Spencer and Sheriff Walker from interfering with or prosecuting him for conducting the pool hall. Judge Nabors heard the application and granted the restraining order, which is set down for hearing in June, when it will be determined whether or not the injunction shall be dissolved or made permanent.—Quannah Observer.

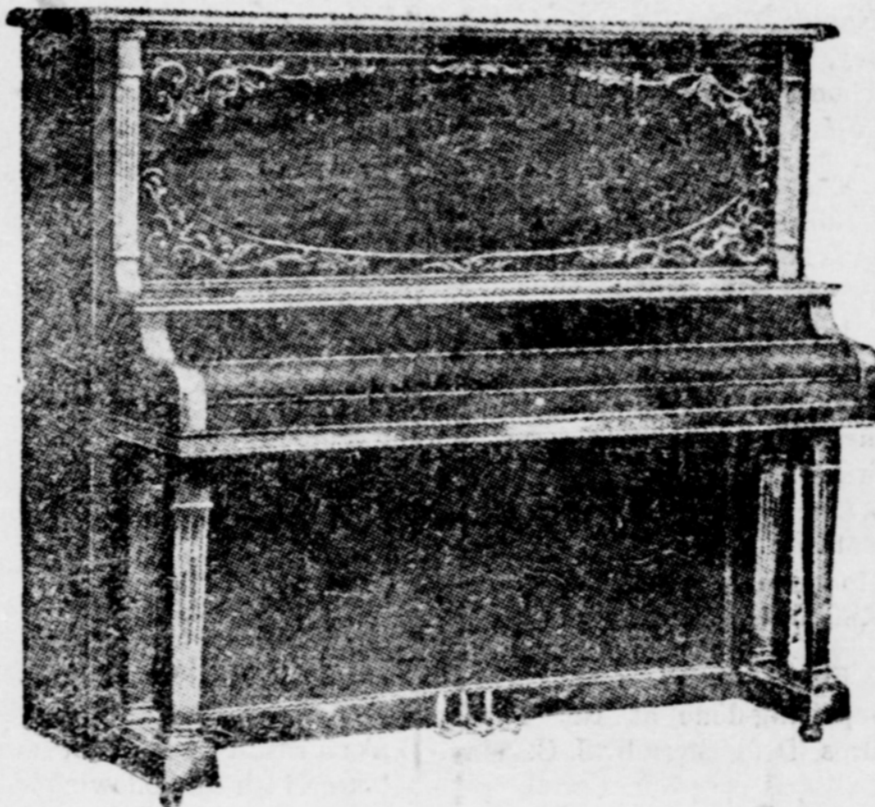

Apparel for the Boudoir



Feminine daintiness and love for beautiful color may be indulged without restraint within the walls of the boudoir. There is no excuse for any sort of ugliness there. Lingerie grows more and more airy and dainty, and in realizes the prettiest fancies of design are interpreted in any extreme of style. Satin and chiffon, thin crepe and fine laces, are the alluring mediums with which the artist works out her dreams. Ribbons and little made flowers add touches that betray her delight in the work she undertakes.

Color is such an important factor in apparel for the boudoir that the less expensive sheer fabrics, in the same colors as silk stuffs, are used with as good results. Voiles, mull, lawn and thin mercerized cottons are made up with laces and trimmed with ribbons to make negligees that are as captivatingly colorful and dainty as any others. But they cost a fraction of the price of sheer silk materials.

A negligee worn over a combination with pantalettes, is shown in the pic-

ture. The pantalettes are substituted for petticoats and worn under dance frocks or under negligees. They are of satin, joined to an under bodice of satin and lace. Wide val lace is cascaded down the sides in ruffles that widen toward the bottom. Just above the ankle the fullness is gathered on an elastic cord, forming a narrow frill. This combination is supported by ribbons tied at the shoulders.

Chiffon and Uruguay lace make the lovely empire coat worn over this combination. It is banded with ribbon in three widths, the widest forming a border about the bottom. Wide lace flouncing is draped in the effect of a mantle, falling over the sleeves and covering the upper half of the coat. It fastens at the waist line under two little bouquets of chiffon flowers made of tiny roses and ribbon foliage.

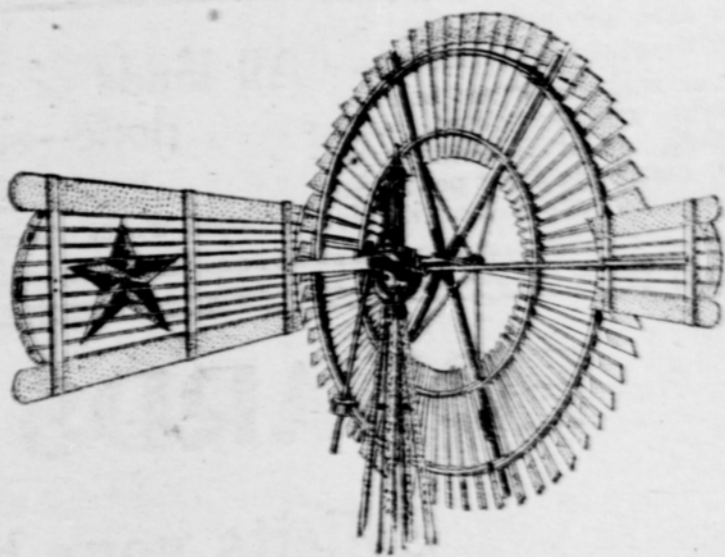
