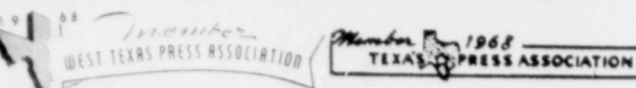

Some hunters and fishermen have strange definitions for the word "sportsman". These people prefer to be called a "sportsman" but actually do little to live up to the standards of a true outdoorsman.

uses any means available, legal or otherwise to catch as many fish as possible often exceeding his legal limit. He runs trot lines where they are prohibited and ducks the landowner to keep from paying the prescribed lake fees. Like his hunting counterpart, he smiles smugly when someone calls him a sportsman.

Maybe these people are a minority but the fact remains they make it very hard on those who actually try to live up to the word sportsman.

During the past week there were two cases of gross misconduct of sportsmanship committed in the county.

The first case involved the shooting of two Afganistan White Wing pheasant hens which were released last week. The person or persons unknown showed their true colors first by shooting the protected birds and secondly by leaving the game where it fell. I might mention here that the shooting of these pheasants at any time, or any protected game out of season carries a stiff fine and possible imprisonment.

The second case involved a fisherman at a local lake. He wasn't so lucky for he was fined on and pending legal action will determine the consequences of his case.

Our game wardens have a lot of territory to cover and can't keep tabs on everything. It therefore becomes necessary for us, as sportsmen, to help police our own ranks by: (1) co-operating with our wardens and landowners to enforce our game laws to the fullest extent, (2) discourage indiscriminate shooting practices among novice hunters and (3) report all violators to the proper authorities.

There is too much indifference in this world without our sportsmen turning a blind eye and deaf ear to what goes on around them.

I suggest you take a look at yourself and evaluate your traits and habits as a sportsman. If you fall into the category above, then I, on behalf of other sportsmen, wardens, and landowners, invite you to hang up your gun or rod and stay as far away from us as you can get. You're not wanted in our fraternity!
