OIL PROSPECTS ARE EXCELLENT

J. B. Nance had a letter this week from J. J. Hart, president of the Hart Oil Corporation, in which he states that despite the fact that the Company has had much trouble and delay in drilling their well west of Tahoka and have already gone to enormous expense, they are determined to complete it as soon as possible, and express the utmost confidence that they will find oil at this location.

Mr Hart also states that they expect to begin work on the well southeast of Tahoka at an early date.







Eighty miles west across one of the most desolate regions the writer ever traveled over, sage brush and bear grass are about the only vegetation that grows. Some of the latter grow six or eight feet tall and are a foot in diameter, look like they might be a century old. Then we pass up a rock-bottom canyon through the San Andres Mount tins. Here we found the roadbed almost impassable, but a crew of hands were blasting and grading a road through the mountain passes, and when that is completed a direct route will be opened from here to Roswell.
