At length the children began crowding in, each one eyeing the new teacher, and expressing their opinions in regard to her. By and by the hour has come and the faithful old bell warns those present that it is time for books. The little fairhaired girls and ruddy-cheeked boys come running to occupy eir usual place. After a short time we have the classes arranged and are ready for work.

#### El Paso-K. C. Short Line.

The El Paso Herald has the following: The line surveyed for the El Paso & Kansas City Short Line, of which J. L. An extension of another 100 miles would connect with the Katy.

These counties, formerly known as constituting a part of the "Staked Plains," and considered as a region where only grass and cattle could be grown, are, according to the information gathered by Mr. Bell, capable of producing corn, wheat, cotton, fruits; and other crops equal to some of the most tertile sections of the country, and of sustaining a population of hundreds of thousands or even millions of people when railroad facilities and convenient markets

are made available.

The two last years' cotton crops have not been any too large, yet the price has been low, which with the present high price of hogs. will cause many acres of colton land to be planted in corn and other grain. The low prices at which cotton goods are now selling will soon set all the mills running and all the cotton in sight will soon be used up and the price will soar.

> Statistics show that the worlds' consumption doubles alout every twenty years, and if there is the usual decrease of acreage next season, such as usually follows a lowprice year, it will be a great thing for Lynn county to raise a big cotton crop next year. In a new country remote from railroads we have to rely on cotton as the chief money crop. Now if our 200 and more Lynn county farmers should raise an average of ten or fifteen vales each of ten or twelve cent cotton the present year, it certainly would make times good in these parts. From the amount of winter plowing going on here, such a condition is not impossible; and judging from other conditions, is
