Now, it looks like the pruper time to do somethang to increase both the acreage and the yield per acre of Lynn county cotton. There are sevetal good reasons for doing this. Tue two last years' cotion crops have not been any two larke. yet the price has been low, which with the preseat high price of hogs, will cause many acres of colton land to be planted 1 in corn and other grain. The lów prices at which colton goods are thow selling will soon set all the milis running and all the cotton in -ight with soon be used up and the price will soar.
statistics show that the worid-' consumption doubles ai out every twenty years, and if there is the usnal decrease of acreage next -eason, such as ustaally foilows a louprice year, it will be a great thing for Lynn county to raise a big cot ton crop next vear. In a new country remote from ralloads we have to rely on cotton as the chief money cop. Now if our 200 and more Lyun county farmers shouid raise an average of ten or fifteen 'vales each of ten or twelve cent cotton the present year, it certainly would make tines good in these parts. From the amount of win ter plowing going on here, such a condition is not impossibie; and judging from other conditions, is not at all improbable.
