The net result is the same. It's like educating our children...we can pay in the form of tuition...or we can pay in the form of taxes.

It's like our postal system. In order for postal employees to receive a fair wage we can either raise the cost of mailing a letter or we can raise taxes.

To raise postal salaries, more money must be had. Do we want to pay a higher price for a stamp...or higher taxes at the end of the year? Obviously it's much easier to raise the price of a stamp than to hike the price of a bushel of wheat or a bale of cotton.

There are other facets to the problem, facets we have not mentioned in order to keep the basic illustration simple.

We could have mentioned that the farmer, through his own efficiency, has actually reduced the cost of food. We could have mentioned that the farmer is engaged in producing not luxuries but necessities...food and clothing. We could have pointed out the economic truism that prosperous agriculture has always meant prosperous laborers and prosperous business, that everytime the farmer has gone down, unemployment and business depression were not far behind, that Americans eat better at the lowest relative cost of any people on earth at any other time in history.

So let's forget this mish mash about Uncle Sam giving handouts to the farmer. It just isn't so!

## Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Black spot is a spoiler in the rose garden. This fungal disease can ruin the beauty of one of our most desired ornamental plants.

This disease attacks the young tender foliage, causing black circular or irregular shaped spots on the developing leaves. Black spot, he says, can be controlled by the use of preventive sprays or dusts. Such materials as Folpet, Maneb, Polyram and Daconil 2787 can all be used on roses as preventive sprays.

Though the selection of fungicides is important, perhaps the regular application of the material at 7-day intervals is even more important. The rose gardener should set aside a time each week for spraying his plants. It might be each Saturday morning or another convenient time; however, the important thing is to see that all plants get a thorough fun-

gicide application every seventh day.

Pruning out last year's canes now will help reduce the amount of disease producing spores carried over from last year. Raking and burning old leaves

will also help reduce the currence of black spot.

Roses take a great deal of care, but their beauty both side and outside the home is more than offset all other considerations.

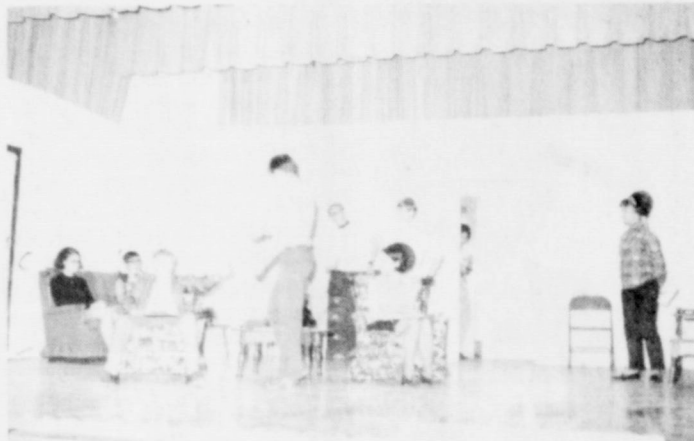

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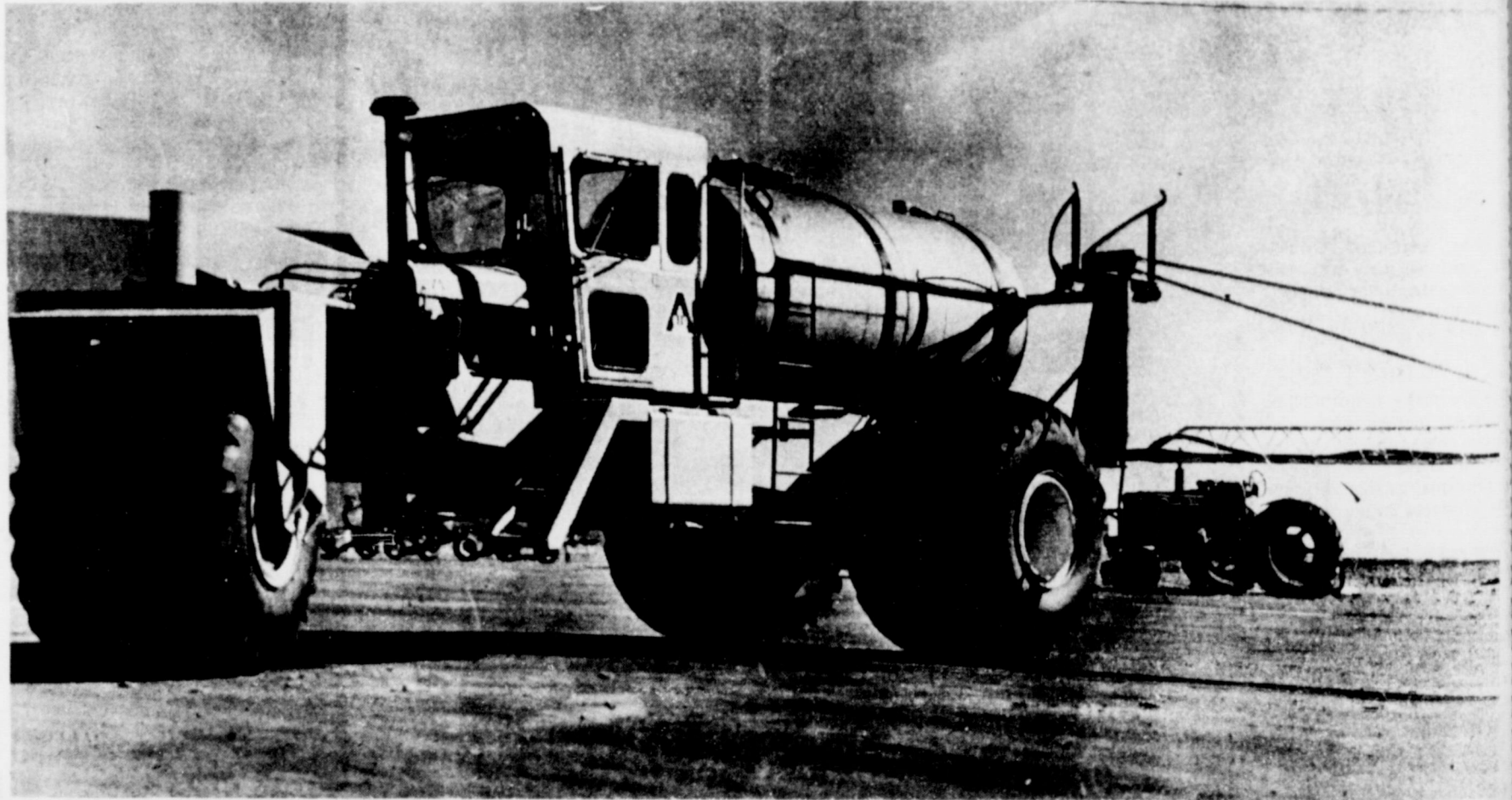

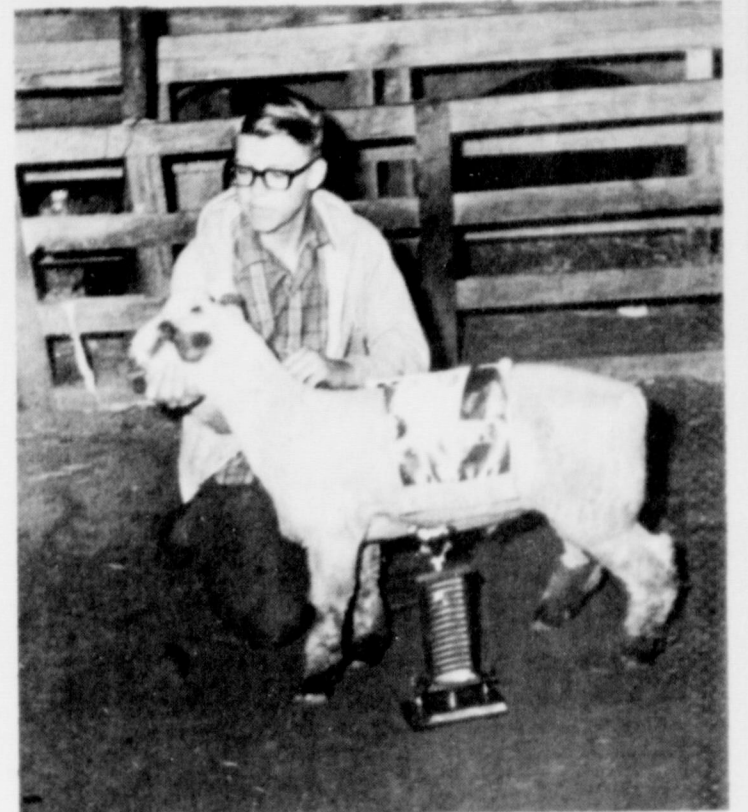
A reception will follow the ceremony in the fellowship hall. All relatives and friends of the couple are invited to attend.

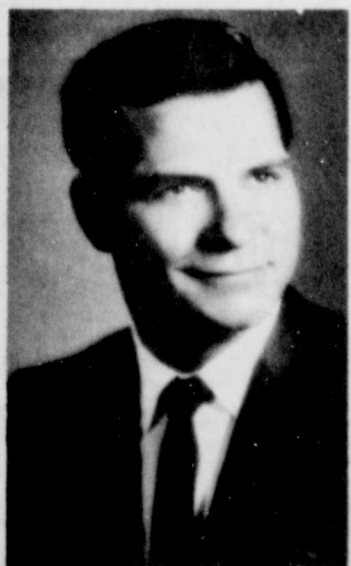
## Youth Led Revival

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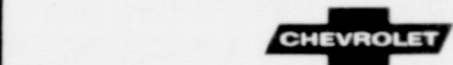

## SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

"Why run that tractor when it is not needed" says Billy Weaver of Wilson. He is in the farming business to make money and he keeps good records. I know it pays to plow as little as possible because I have done it, says Weaver. Billy measures his cotton crop by net income. If he can go to the gin with the same number of bales of cotton with less operating expenses he feels he is making money by not plowing as often as in the past.

This is a new concept in Soil Conservation. It is receiving an enthusiastic reception throughout the country. Those who have tried it have increased the acreage treated by minimum tillage each year. It will reduce labor and operation cost and cut soil losses from erosion sometimes as much as 90 percent and makes it easier to maintain soil tilth. Much research has been done on the net return as a result of minimum tillage. Many articles have appeared in various journals and periodicals.

Bond Sales Are 5% For Jan.

According to Mr. F.B. Hegi, Chairman of the Lynn County Savings Bonds Committee, the 1970 Savings Bonds goal for Lynn County is \$130,000. January sales totaled \$6,921 for 5 per cent of the sales goal.

The 1970 sales goal for Texas is \$179.9 million. During the month sales were \$15,862,542 with 9 per cent of the state's goal achieved.

The Treasury Department announced that sales over the nation totaled \$407 million -- 3.8 per cent below January a year ago. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Savings Bonds during the month amounted to \$17.2 million -- 3 per cent above the \$16.7 million exchanged in January 1969.

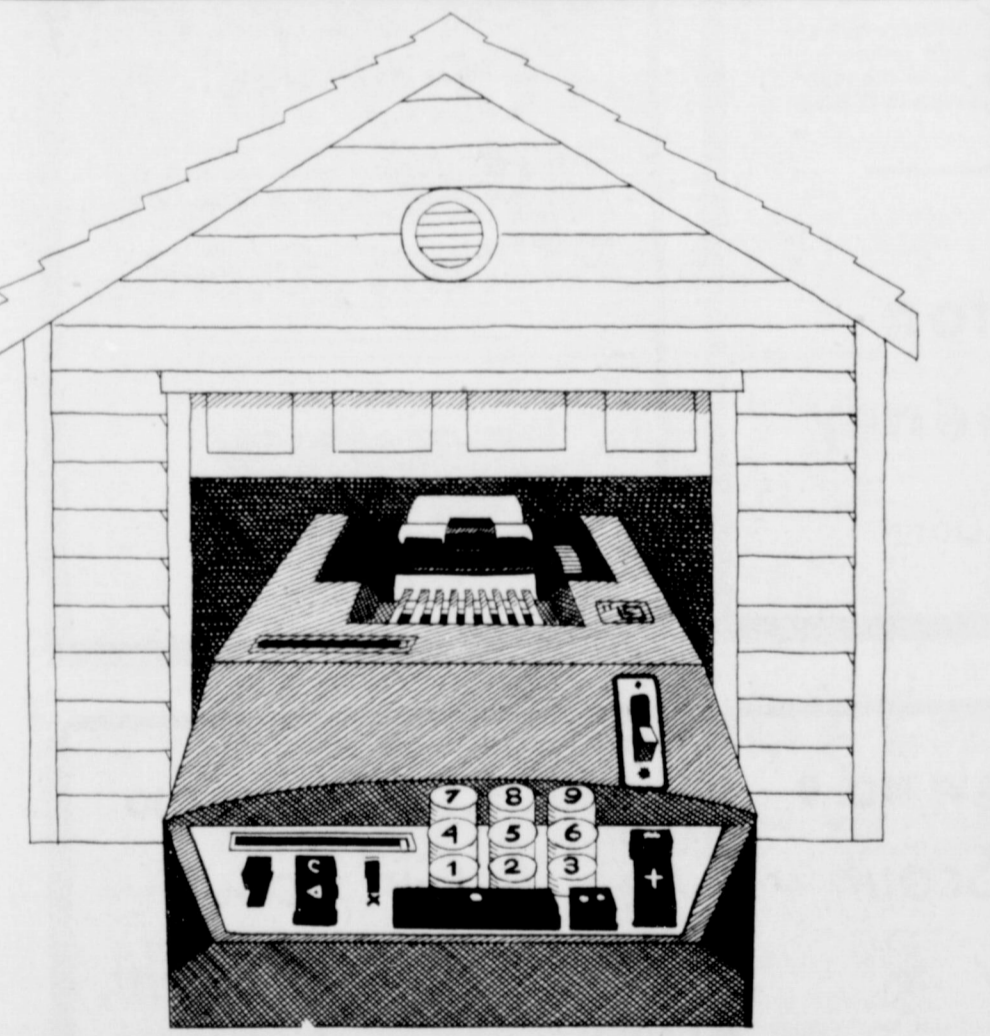

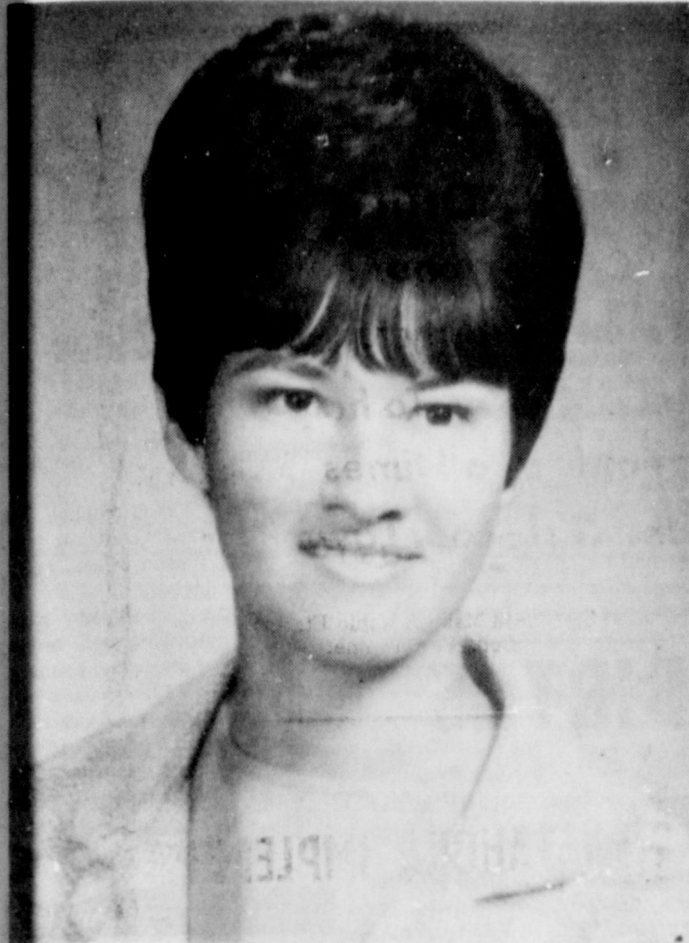

### Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

What is ahead in the new decade for food products and processes? How will consumers spend their food dollars? What will they want?

For one thing, the homemakers wants and is willing to pay for "instant" heat-and-serve and ready-to-cook foods.

Criteria for convenience foods is changing to quick serve and instant foods instead of foods to which only some degree of preparation has been added.

For example, a packaged pudding mix which requires stirring in milk and cooking is too old-hat and too much bother. So canned and frozen instant puddings are high style.

Canned soups to which water must be added are losing an increasing per cent of their market to the soups with water in the can.

The second trend is that Americans will eat more meals away from home in the 1970's. Institutional food sales rose 36 per cent from 1960 to 1966. During this same period sales in food stores rose only 14 per cent. Forecasters say 40 per cent of the food dollar will be spent for meals away from home by 1978.

In 1962, about 25 per cent went for meals away from home. This figure jumped to 35 percent by 1966.

This trend is attributed to 1. homemakers working away from home; 2. increased leisure time; 3. improved technology; 4. decreased interest in learning how to cook.

Today 40 per cent of all women more than 16 years old are in the American labor force. The largest segment (57 per cent) of women in the work force are married.

Thirdly, fast foods services will increase in the 1970's. More food chains are going into institutional foods; they're opening franchised dining chains through facilities for on-premise food consumption and take-home prepared foods.

This trend will continue and probably expand to most major companies.

Forecasters predict that supermarkets will go heavily into food service operations too, offering all types of prepared, take-home foods from chicken dinners, fish and chips, pizzas, and Chinese entree to fancy gourmet meals completely prepared from appetizer through dessert.

By the mid-1970's, 50 per cent of the supermarkets will have luncheonettes and 84 per cent will have take-out food services.

Advances in food technology is the fourth major trend. Scientists will make new products from fabricated foods. As a protein extender in meats, snacks, low cost meatlike foods and beverages, the soybean leads the parade.

Gread strides are being made in the development of cheese-like, meat-like and cellular textures to be used in foods.

### Reynolds Speaker At Rotary Club

In keeping with Public School Week, Supt. Harold Reynolds was the speaker at the Rotary Club last Thursday.

In answer to questions from members Mr. Reynolds brought those present up to date on the controversy aroused by Mexican-Americans in the local school system. He indicated school officials were satisfied the Federal judge had ruled airily, under the law, in per-

mitting the wearing of brown armbands by 17 Latinos, suspended from school, and allowing them to return to classes. However, the judge warned against "trouble" started by either side in the controversy.

Mr. Reynolds pointed out only a small minority of local Mexican-Americans were involved in the arm-band wearing episode.

He declared there has been little bitterness in the school system over integration of the races.

The speaker explained the tax re-evaluation program now underway in the local district which will bring about a slight raise in overall taxes but will result in a decline in taxes for some individuals.

The new kindergarten program going into effect this next year will be for five and a half year old children who have a language problem or who are from families with incomes of \$3,000 or less.

Ultimately, the program will be for all children of five and will be compulsory.

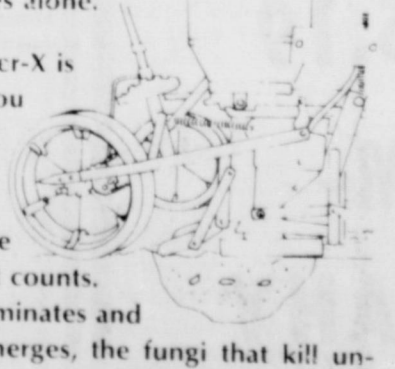
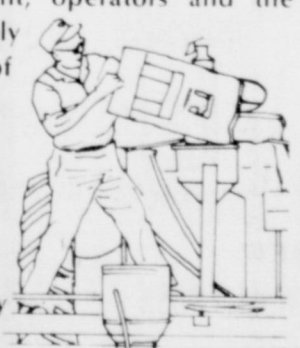

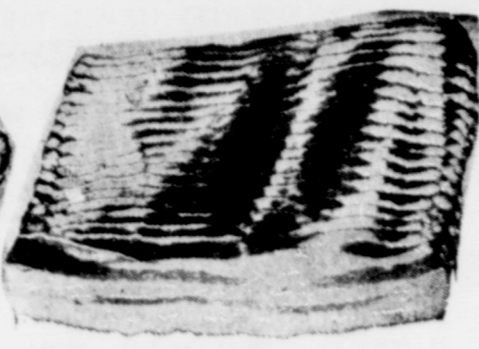
