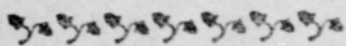

\$4.00 PER HUNDRED

J. E. Roberts sold 38,220 pounds of maize this week on the Floydada market at \$4.00 per hundred. This was from last year's crop, which had been carried over by Mr. Roberts, until he was assured of a sufficient supply from this year's crop.

Delivery and payment were made Wednesday, B. F. Yearwood & Son being the buyers. Total paid was \$1,528.80.

On the same day wheat was selling at \$1.86 per bushel weighing 60 pounds, which means that a 50-pound bushel of maize, selling at \$2 brought 15 cents more per bushel than a bushel of wheat weighing 10 pounds more.

The car of maize was shipped to San Angelo and was sold by the dealer at \$2.10 per bushel F. O. B. Floydada.

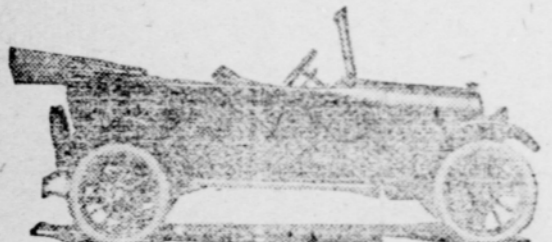
