



In chapters 8 and 9 are grouped a what the King can do over the chief foes of mankind-sickness, sin, satanic power, death, sorrow and storms. It is fitting that they should be grouped here, following the laws of the kingdom, for they show the King's power to administer the affairs of the kingdom, and produce within his subjects the graces of character set forth in these laws. It will make the lesson too long to attempt to consider all these miracles. It will also be unsatisfactory to confine ourselves to the particular section selected by the lesson committee, so we will select several of the most outstanding ones.

1. Jesus Heals a Leper (8:1-4). 1. This dreadful disease was the most loathsome and hopeless known. In the Jewish ritual it was regarded as a symbol of sin. It was incurable by man. Only the Divine Physician

2. The leper's faith. His cry was most pitiable, but his faith was strong. He fully believed that Jesus was able, ness to heal him.

3. Jesus' power. He put forth his hand and touched the leper, bidding the disease to depart, and instantly the man was clean.

11. Jesus Heals the Centurion's Servant (8:5-13). 1. The disease-paralysis. In pa-

rylsis the victim is helpless and disqualified for service. 2. The centurion's faith. He be-

III. Jesus Calms the Sea (8:23-27). 1. The King asleep in the stormtossed boat (v. 24). Since the King is the Almighty Creator, he had no reason to fest, and therefore, could well be resticg in sleep.

2. The terrified disciples (v. 25). If they had but known him as really the Amighty King they would not have deen terrified, for they would have known that no boat could go down with the Christ on board.

3. The King's rebuke (vv. 26, 27). (1) The disciples rebuked for their lack of faith. Instead of looking at the Lord, they were looking at the circumstances. (2) The sea is made calm. The elements of nature are sub-

IV. Jesus Casts Out Demons (8:28-34). After stilling the tempest Jesus crossed to the other side of the sea into heathen territory.

1. Met by two men possessed by demons (v. 28). By referring to Mark 5:1-7 and Luke 8:27 we get a conception of the desperate condition of these men. So fierce were they that no one could safely pass that way.

2. What they knew about Christ (v. 29). They knew that he was the Son of God and that he had come to destroy the Devil and his works.

3. The limitation of the Devil's power (v. 31). Although the Devil is mighty, he cannot even enter a hog without God's permission.

4. Christ's power to deliver from the Devil (vv. 30-32). The demons quailed before him not daring to dispute his power, but begged permission to enter the swine.

V. Jesus Healing a Woman With an Issue of Blood (9:20-22).

1. Her helpless condition (v. 20).

CATTLE RAISERS WILL FORM AGENCY SOON

RALPH H. HARRIS URGES BETTER CONTROL OF STOCK YARDS IN FUTURE

San Angelo, Texas.-Belated efforts of live stock commission firms to reform the'r business will cause no change in the plans of the Cattle Raisers' association of Texas to establish at Fort Worth a co-operative live stock selling agency, it was declared here by Ralph H. Harris. Mr. Harris has been appointed chairman of a special committee of the association to conduct an investigation and make plans for the organization of an agency to represent the live stock producers. This appointment was made on authority given President W. W. Turney at a recent meeting of the association. The other members of the committee are: A. S. Gage, San Antonio; J. G. Childers, Temple; J. W. Corn. Fort Worth, and E. B. Spiller, Fort Worth, secretary. In his letter to each of the committeemen President Turney declared that whatever action number of miracles which exhibit is taken must be economically sound sium. and productive of good results. He described the present condition with which the live stock producer is confronted at the principal live stock markets as "wholly unjustifiable and intolerable conduct of those whom circumstances only make our agents." He cautioned the members of the committee that there must be no failure and that the agency that is to be established must make good in results satisfactory to the producer. Mr. Harris was in conference with Secretary Spiller here Friday and a meeting of the committee will be called in Fort Worth later to go over data that is being compiled.

COAL OPERATORS SAY THEY ARE FOR FAIR PRICES

Pledge Support to Attorney General In Eliminating Profiteering.

Cleveland, Ohio.-A general open meeting of approximately 1,000 bituminous coal operators from all parts of the country, held here Tuesday, following a meeting of members of the National Gas Association, adopted a resolution pledging their support to Attorney General Palmer in eliminating unreasonably high prices and unwise practices, where such exist, and to immediately establish a committee in each bituminous coal district to cooperate fully with the department of justice and federal district attorneys to bring about this action.

The general meeting followed a meet ing of the members of the Nat'onal Coal association, at which Colonel D. B. Wentz of Philadelphia, president of the association, read a telegram from Attorney General Palmer requesting operators to take action looking toward a reduction in soft coal prices.

A motion was adopted that it be the sense of the meeting that the coal operators of the country will cooperate fully and heartily with the attorney general in an effort to reduce soft coal prices along the lines of the attorney general's suggestions, but that it can be best accomplished by the respective districts.

MACSWINEY FUNERAL IS HELD IN LONDON

Thousand of Sinn Feiners and Irish Sympathizers Atend.

London.-A little band of Irish pipers, wailing a weird dirge and shrieking defiance by turns, led the strangest funeral process'on that ever wound its way through the streets of London, a procesion of 8,000 Irish "rebels" Sinn Feiners and sympathi zers following the body of their dead leader Thursday.

And of these 8,000, hundreds were prescribed "outlaws," with a price upon their heads marching in safety through the heart of the "enemy" country, protected for once by a tacit truce between the British government

and the Irish republic. They were their Sinn Fein uniforms beneath their long overcoats. They carried, draped in black, the prescribed green, white and orange flag of the only government they recognize. But there was no reply to their mute defiance. London offered them only re

Armistice Day. Nov. 11, is designated as a holiday in Texas in a proclamation issued by governor Hobby.

The attoreny general's department has approved a \$250,000 issue of special road bonds of Val Verde county. The bonds mature serially and bear 5 1-2 per cent interest.

Thomas L. Beauchamp of Paris has been appointed an assistant in the attorney general's department and has entered upon his duties. He fills the vacancy made by a resignation.

There are fourteen students in the University of Texas who are listed in the directory as being from Mex'co. Of these ten are Mexican citizens and four are Americans living in Mexico.





TIMES CHANGING IN CHINA MAKING WAR ON DISEASE MENACE

American Red Cross Announces Budget of \$48,200,000 For Current Year.

NEW DISASTER RELIEF PLAN

Continuance of Heavy Work Abroad Deemed Necessary to Protect United States-\$21,000,000 Less Than Last Year.

A program of relief and service toward which appropriations of \$48,-200,000 have been made has been outlined for the American Red Cross for the fiscal year, July 1, 1920, to July 1, 1921, according to official announcement by national headquarters of the organization at Washington. The figures for 1920-21 are \$21,000,000 below those of 1919-20, in which \$69,400,000

Important among the items of the budget for the present year is the appropriation of \$31,500,000 for relief in fereign lands, which includes \$11,000,-000 in purchased supplies on hand and not distributed.

Must Protect United States.

This will enable the American Red Cross to continue its humanitarian effort to aid stricken peoples to re-establish themselves, to fight the disease epidemics which threaten many countries and to efface largely the remaining traces of the blight left by the World War. It is regarded as social as well as physical sanitation on a large scale that will have a direct bearing on future conditions in America.

Central Europe, the chief sufferer from the conflict, today is facing another winter of famine, pestilence and ruin. Typhus decreased much during the summer months where last winter it had its greatest stronghold, but phy sicians who investigated the situation at the behest of the League of Red Cross Societies have given their unqualified opinion that this coming winter will see a recurrence on an unprecedented scale. The Red Cross feels it must continue preventive measures abroad to keep this and other deadly maladies from the United

Millions for Work at Home.

When the disease was sweeping Central Europe last winter the American Red Cross, with the aid of the governments of afflicted nations, undertook the fight against it. Hospitals were established wherever possible and food and clothing were distributed to the undernourished populations, who by reason of their undernourishment were easy prey to the epidemics. Where disorganization contributed last year to the great inroads made by the disease, by virtue of its knowledge of the disease and the presence of well established hospital centers, the American Red Cross this year will undertake the work with a new confidence.

Including the total of \$11,000,000 in supplies left from the last fiscal year the \$31,500,000 is \$21,000,000 less than the expenditures for 1919-20.

Appropriations for domestic activities total \$16,700,000.

The largest item of this "home" budget is \$7,800,000 for civilian relief work. This includes service and as sistance for families of soldiers, sailors and marines, and work incidental to disaster. Of the total appropriation for civilian relief, \$5,000,000 is held in reserve for the carrying out of actual disaster relief.

Reduced Overhead Expense.

The Red Cross invariably is the first thought of a community visited by calamity. With this in mind, it was determined by the Executive Committee in preparing the budget of 1919-20 to have a fixed reserve fund from which to draw in these instances.

For assistance to soldiers, sailors and marines in hospitals and in camps this year \$1,900,000 has been set aside Four million two hundred thousand dollars has been appropriated for improvement of health and prevention of disease throughout the United States during the current twelve months. The Red Cross is co-operating fully with the United States Health Service in this work and through its Junior Red Cross is doing much to spread among children the principles of sanitation. An appropriation of \$1. 000,000 has been made for developing the peace time program of the Red Cross by service to its chapters in all

The appropriation of \$48,200,000 is exclusive of the local expenditures of the 3,000 or more chapters. Administration expenses this year



WATCH YOUR FEET

Important Matter Pertaining to General Health.

Experts Advise Walking "Indian Fashion" in Preference to the "Toeing Out," Which Has Hitherto Been Considered Proper.

(Short Talks on Health, by the United States Public Health Service, Washing-

Well-directed feet are now considered to be quite as important to general health as a well-poised head or an erect carriage. Few people seem to realize that many troublesome ailments are caused by flat or weak feet, and attribute the nervous depression, pain in the legs and back and general fatigue to some other cause, when the feet are really at fault, says the United States public health service.

Actual "flat foot" is much less common than is ordinarily thought. On the other hand, "weak foot" is very common, and if not remedied gradually leads to flat foot.

Recent investigations have estabfished the fact that "toeing out' in walking, or standing, puts an added strain on the arch of the feet. Instead of standing and walking with the feet forming an angle of about 45 degrees. as formerly advocated in military and athletic manuals, experts now advocate standing and walking with the toes pointed straight forward. This has been found to be of great assistance in remedying weak and flat feet, and constitutes what is known as walking "Indian fashion."

"Toeing straight" should be practiced for a little while, and it will come easy. Make two parallel lines on the floor, about six inches apart, and walk on them with the toe and heel touching the outside of the line. Follow this up with an exercise such as the following: Stand with the feet parallel, with about two inches between the feet, and rise on the toes anywhere from 20 to 40 times each night and morning. In standing acquire the habit of placing the feet a few inches heels and toes. Keep the body weight equally supported on both feet.

Do not make the mistake of believing that flat feet can be cured by the shoemaker, or by the ordinary arch that is sold in shoe stores. The condition is one that should be treated by an experienced physician when it fails to respond to the measures outlined

It is comparatively easy to remedy a tendency to weak or flat feet in children by teaching them the proper walking and standing posture. Parents would do well to teach their children to walk Indian fashion.

Wives' Work.

Neither Mr. Hamlin nor Squire Heaton is noted as a worker, but their wives are very industrious, and nothing gives either gentleman more pleasure than to boast of the wonderful things that his wife accomplishes.

"I don't know what the Red Cross would have done without my wife," said Mr. Hamlin one day. "She knit twenty-five sweaters, seventy-four pairs of socks and one hundred and fifteen wristlets."

"That's not a bad record." admitted the squire. "In fact, I call it a real good record for an average knitter. Now, I don't know how many articles my wife turned out for the Red Cross; she didn't count them. She started to count them, but when she had knit several hundred articles of every kind she said counting tired her. and she quit. After that she estimated her output by needles."

"By needles? What do you mean by needles?" asked Mr. Hamlin, a lit-

Lived Days in Sealed Box.

Joseph Barcroft, a reader of physiology at King's college, England, has lived for six days in a hermetically sealed glass box. The experiment arose out of a 30-year-old controversy as to whether it is possible to calculate the amount of oxygen in the blood from a knowledge of the amount of oxygen in the breath. The test was also made to demonstrate whether it was necessary that airmen should have oxygen apparatus when flying at great heights. It proved that oxygen was necessary to flying men, but it did not show to what height they could fly with safety. While in the box Barcroft kept a record of his sensations and made scientific observations. He said he suffered from sleeplessness, but otherwise did not experience much inconvenience except on the last day, when the atmosphere became extremely rarefled. He then had headaches and nausea.

ODD CONTESTS, OLD AND NEW

Beigium Cock-Crowing Matches and English Lark-Singing Contests-Turtles in Exciting Races.

From the dawn of time man has delighted in contests, whether between Individuals who match their strength and skill, or between animals.

Some of these contests are decidedly quaint, or, for instance, the cockcrowing matches of Belgium, where specially bred and trained fowls are matched to see which will crow the greatest number of times within a certain time limit.

The lark-singing contests of England are far more musical, these contests being promoted and conducted by an association having a good membership. The birds are kept for some time in a dark room, and then placed before a mirror in the light. Imagining his own reflection to be a rival, the bird at once bursts into song, a careful record being made of the length of the song.

There used to be in Hamburg a famous collection of wild animals which included a number of giant tortoises. each weighing several hundred pounds. Children would mount upon the backs of these strange steeds, and, holding a lettuce leaf on the end of a stick just beyond the reach of the tortoise, coax them into an amusing race toward a fixed goal.

Much more exciting are the turtle races which may be witnessed in some of the South American countries. Turtle fishers select a number of the great sea turtles, and, attired in bathhig costumes, mount their backs, grasping the forepart of the shells with both hands. The turtles are then released and at once make for the sea. Ordinarily the turtle would plunge with his rider to the bottom of the sea, but this the jockey would prevent by throwing his weight on the back part of the shell and at the same time pulling the forward part up with his hands, which keeps the animal's head above the surface. By pulling the shell to the right or left, the rider is able to guide his mount, and a circle is made about a boat anchored off shore, and so back to the starting point. These turtles cover a course of eight or nine miles in an astonishing short

Infinite Variety at Geneva.

Those who had the rare pleasure of looking in on a plenary session of the international woman's conference at Geneva were, in a few instances, unconvinced that out of such a variegated group unity of action and opinion could be possible, writes Alice La Maziere in Figaro, There were delegates from all parts of the worldblonde and heavy Scandinavians, robust and energetic Americans, frail and brunette Spaniards, Italians and Greeks, expressionless and saffroncolored Japanese and Hindus in overembro'dered gowns. And there were Frenchwomen despite the fact that though France has marched at the head of so many movements of emancipetion, it will be a long while before she enfranchises her daughters. And we must not forget the delegate from Iceland, who journeyed for 30 days to be with us and came dressed in festival costume.

But Lady Astor, our good colleague from England, was the charm and grace of the conference. What will come of it all? Notwithstanding the opposition the women are meeting in certain countries-Spain, Italy, Switzerland, Turkey, France-the day is not far distant when we will act as a body in moral, political, educational and domestic questions. And our voice shall be heard when the specter of war threatens to arise.

The War Horse.

Mud-spattered, high power motorcars, careering along military roads, replaced foam-flecked chargers in the work of carrying generals and their staffs in the World war when it came to the actual business of a campaign. No panting charger carried a Wellington from a town 20 miles away-a motorcar did the work in 20 minutes without exciting comment. But the horse was not entirely robbed of his glorious place in the war. Motorcars might do the work better in actual campaigns, but when it came to the pomp and panoply the horse was not entirely robbed of his glory. An army headed by a fat general cuddled in the deep upholstery of a mere machine would not stir the imagination. He must sit on a prancing, arch-necked steed and return the cheers with sharp salutes while handling his mettlesome mount. So it was that the high officers of the allies had horses for ceremonial occasions.

Warning to Airmen Who Smoke. An airman who drops a lighted pipe

from his plane is responsible for any damage his pipe may cause. This was decided at a moot, or discussion. in Gray's Inn hall, London, recently. at which Justice Darling presided.

Mr. Justice Darling, in the course of his judgment, said that for an airman to take a lighted pipe and smoke it when flying at a point where if it fell it would fall by gravitation to the earth instead of to the moon, to allow it to fall or not to prevent it to fall -that was in itself prima facie negligence. If the pipe fell to earth and set fire to a haystack or did any other damage, the person injured was entitled to an action to recover damages for negligence.-Brooklyn Eagle.

Interesting and Beautiful City of Holland.

Estates That Remind the Visitor of the Arabian Nights, and at the Last, Dinner at Real Dutch Inn.

Perhaps the most interesting city in Holland is Arnheim, the chief center of Guelderland, near the German border. It is on the north branch of the Rhine, in the midst of a pleasant and fertile district, and is the spot selected by the wealthy nabobs, who made vast fortunes in the East Indies, for their homes and estates when they retired to enjoy their

In laying out these estates, each

owner vied with his neighbor to excel him in beautifying and adorning his home. All the skill of gardeners and architec's and builders was taxed to the utmost to produce delightful and surprising effects in roads, forests, lakes, bridges, fountains, gardens, houses and vistas-so that it became a real fairyland in which one would think the Arabian Nights had been realized. For instance, as the old head gardener conducted us about one of these estates, he brought us suddenly to a small lake, and there in the middle of it, without any road to reach it, was the castle of the proprietor, a curious medieval-looking pile, a copy of some ancient place that had pleased his fancy. Passing along under the great copper beech trees, we shortly came to a stream acress which from bank to bank hung a little swinging suspension bridge of staves. With a dash at full run, the old guide sped across the bridge and then turned with a smile to see us follow. As there was no crossing except on, the run, we accepted the challenge and our party of four all made it in safety, except one who fell at the farther bank amid the gibes and laughter of the rest. Ten rods farther ornamented with white marble statnes, steps and vases. At the bottom was a payement of a fourth of an acre, in white and black marble

We were directed to walk across this pavement, and when near the center, the gardener slyly stepped upon a secret spring, which sent up a jet of water at each corner of every little square-hundreds of little columns of clear water-at first a foot, then two. then three feet high, and we, huddled surprise, each in his twenty-inch square, were tristing and turning, to escape a wetting. So there were surprises of bisque birds and clay animals at unseen corners-figures that you would suppose at first were alive and just about to eat you alive. Then the charming vistas that opened through the shrubbery across the pends-the long magnificent tunnels of verdure and color made by the driveways, arched with the glorious copper beeches-the groups of figures illustrating national legends or history -you could see a hundred Busch's gardens, laid out long ago, about quaint old Arnheim.






