An Ordinance regulating Pawnbrokers and Purchasers of used items of personal property for resale: providing for daily records to be kept and furnished to the Chief of Police: providing for visitation and examinaton of the premises and goods; providing a penalty: authorizing publication of the caption and penalty clause, and declaring emergency.

(SECTION 7.) That it shall be unlawful and shall constitute a misdemeanor for any person, persons, firm, partnership, association or corporation to violate any provisions of this ordinance and shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00)

And It Is So Ordered. This Ordinance and Resolution shall take effect and be enforced from and after its passage, approval and publication, and it is so ordained.
