residents admit that we have had an unusual weather pattern since January. Abundant moisture and less than usual dust storms. Now much of this has happened since moving my family from Oklahoma, and I hope that we haven't upset the normal routine around these parts. Up around the Vici, Oklahoma area, their wheat crop is burning up for lack of moisture and they say it is my fault for leaving and taking the moisture with me. Now I am not going to take credit for any of this.

Another thing I won't take credit for is the presence of the "Fiddle Back" showing up in this area. This spider, the Brown Recluse, is quite common in Northwest Oklahoma and I speak from experience, the bite is quite painful. Their venom is also quite poisonous.

They vary from an orange-yellow to dark brown or black, long legs and a fiddle marking immediately behind the semi-circle of three pairs of eyes. They are usually found in the home, especially closets and folds of clothing, and dry dusty areas. Immediate treatment is necessary in case of a bite. Phamlets on this and the Black Widow can be obtained from the Extension Service, Texas A & M, and the local agent's office.

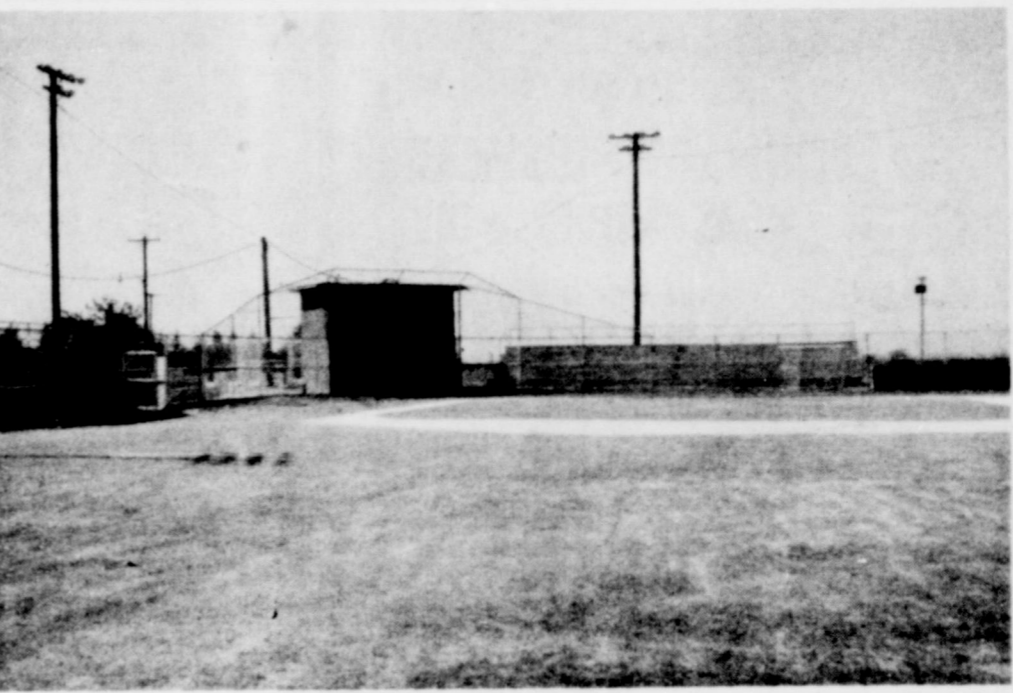

E. R. Blakney, chairman of the supervisory board of the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District, announces a personnel change in the local office, effective June 2.

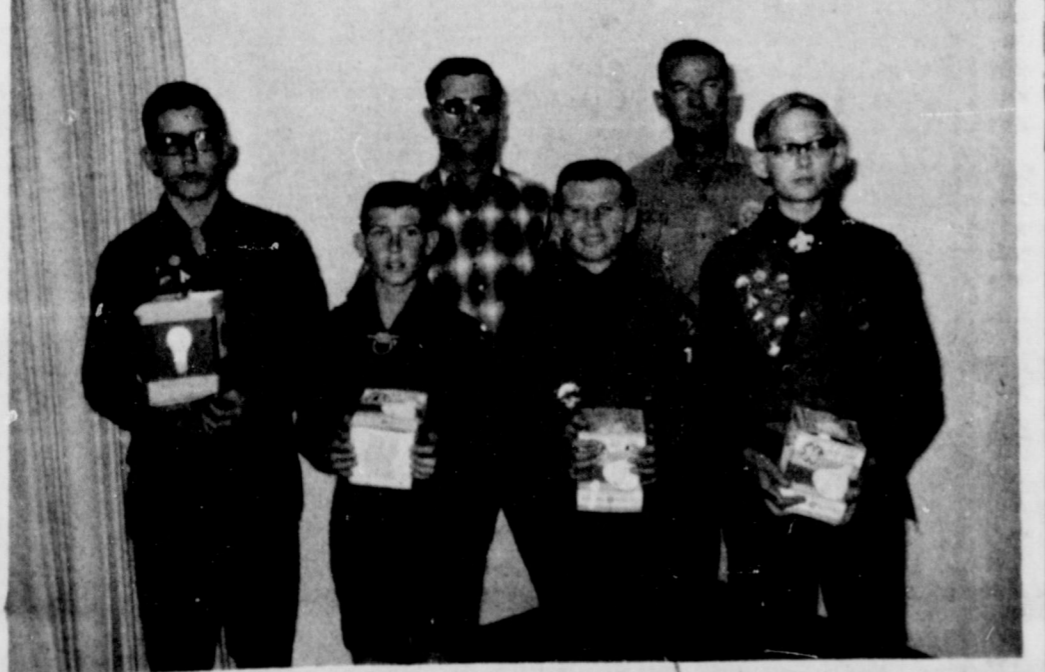

SINCE the conscience fund began in 1811, the Treasury Department has received over \$2 million from conscience stricken citizens, for defrauding the government. The fund was started with a \$5 back payment.

This brings us to the character sending \$500 to the conscience fund, saying that if his conscience still bothered him, he would send the rest.

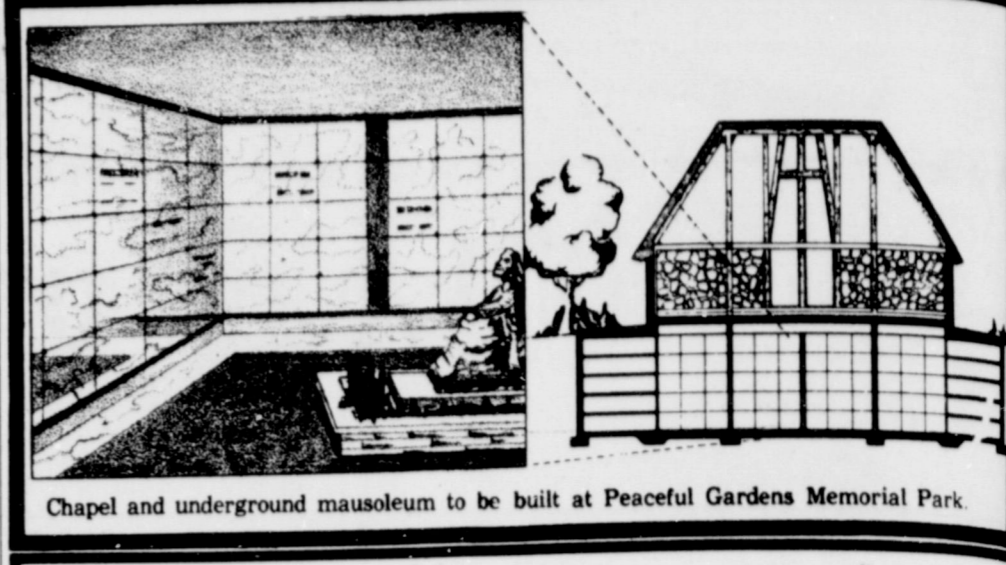



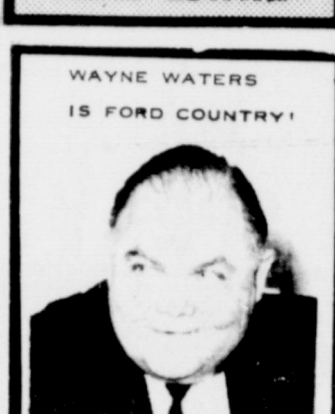
