Post, they have no regular store to accommodate outside custom as yet. Mr. Brown tells us they have a carload of impliments to be used by the colony, which comprises twenty tents and the commissory beadquarters.
Mr. Post and party have vans fitted up for their use which puts them in as comfortable quarters as they well could have in a camp.

Mr Brown in his usual brisk manner of combininig business with pleasure, sold a nice block of land while in the new town.
The teams are provided with good sheds.
This new town will probably be equal to the towns burile by Pailman and Carnegie, at the very least it will prove a formidable $t$ val to Batfle Creek, Mr. Post's frat town: The older town just grew, and this town is being buitt according to a specified plaw.
