The supply tank of the T. & P. rrilroad company at Big Springs has been exhausted and now all water for machinery and engines used in that town is being hauled in cars from the inexhaustible supply at the stand pipe in Stanton, While you hear a great deal from time to time about the great resources and advantages of towns, the real proof comes during a dry season when a town's water supply is deficient. No such calamity ever happened to our town nor is it likely to occur here with hundreds of wells in every part of nown at a shallow depth from which the supply cannot be pumped with the largest machnery. We have no desire to crow over the misfortunes of a sister city and only use this instance to show what Stanton has in the way of a water supply. Reporter.
