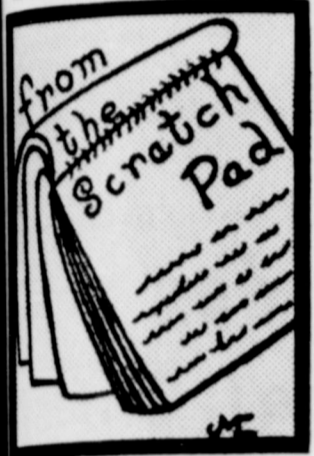

Firemen Attend Training School

Jacky Henry and Jerry Ford, Tahoka Volunteer Firemen, Chief Pat Patterson, Tahoka and Leroy Mensch O'Donnell Fire Department, attended the 38th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School, last week at Texas A & M University.

Firemen Mensch and Ford were sponsored by the Lynn County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau, by contributing toward their cost of the school.

General Telephone Company Announces Rate Reduction

A reduction of long distance rates goes into effect for General Telephone Company of the Southwest customers August 1 as a result of the recent ruling by the Federal Communications Commission which ordered the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to reduce interstate long distance

rates by \$20,000,000 annually. The reductions will be 5 to 10c from the charge for the first three minutes on day time weekday station-to-station calls. These are calls placed between 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. Monday through Friday.

This is the 23rd time interstate rates have been cut

since coast to coast service began in 1915. During that time, the cost of transcontinental calls has dropped to little as \$7.5 (station-to-station between midnight and 7 a. m.) from \$20.70 in 1915.

Long distance rates have been cut in half since 1945 in contrast to 77% rise in the consumer price index.

Plant Beauty Can Be Deadly

"The summertime beauty of our State's lush vegetation in yards, fields, pastures, and woodlands also holds dangers that the public should heed," Fred Graff, Soil Conservationist for the local USDA Soil Conservation Service, warned this week.

Graff said that throughout the U. S. and Canada more than 700 species of plants are known to cause death, illness or extreme discomfort to people.

"Chewing, swallowing or otherwise contacting the toxic parts of certain plants, trees and shrubs takes a heavy toll," Graff said. "Each year health services report that about 12,000 children are poisoned or injured by these sources."

Parents should be concerned, the local SCS official stated, because many of the plants are quite common in flower and vegetable gardens and in ornamental landscaping, as well as in wild places. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves, beans, stems or berries may

contain poison, depending on the species of plant.

The beautiful oleander bush, for example, grown all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant similar to the drug digitalis. The toxin is so strong that a single leaf can kill a child. People have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

The popular Christmas flower poinsettia is full of an acid, burning juice, so lethal that a child who consumed one leaf might die. Mistletoe berries can also be deadly.

Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, which is also used as black or red ant poison and sold to kill ants. It is one of the most dangerous poisons known. Potato and tomato plants, close kin to the deadly nightshade or white weed found in our cotton fields, have foliage that contains alkaloid poisons which can cause severe digestive upset and nervous disorder if eaten, Graff explained.

Jimson weed, sometimes called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes more poisoning than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and leaves.

Duffenbachia, or dumb cane, is a beautiful houseplant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of the mouth and tongue that can be deadly. It is called dumb cane because of its power to strike its victims speechless. The stalk contains needle-like crystals of calcium oxalate that become imbedded in the tissue of the mouth and tongue causing severe swelling and pain.

Castor bean seeds are especially dangerous because they are so deadly and so readily available. They are sold in garden stores for about 25 cents a packet and are popular because they produce large, lush plants in one season. Yet each seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a child.

Mescalbean, or mountain laurel, is also dangerous. It has a poison bean with a hard coat. If it is swallowed whole there may be no ill effects, but if chewed or crushed it can be lethal.

Applicants Are Needed For Patrol School, August 27

The Texas Department of Public Safety is seeking applicants for highway patrol positions, to be filled following the next training school August 27 at Austin.

Certain basic requirements must be met before an applicant is qualified to take the training. The applicant must be male, at least 20 years of age and less than 36 on the date of probationary appointment to the position of Patrolman-Trainee.

Height should not be less than 68 inches or more than 76 inches and weight not less than two pounds per inch of height or more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height, and according to body build.

Commissioned law enforcement personnel of the Department will be paid longevity, traveling expenses away from the home station and furnished headgear, shirts, trousers, jackets, guns, badges, belts, and other items.

Two weeks annual vacation is provided as well as holiday time. Sick leave, insurance and retirement are also a part of the Patrol Program.

OUR County has very few private or public areas open for fishing or other sports activities, and it is a crying shame when these have to be closed through some person's thoughtless, deliberate or careless acts and conduct. Such an incident happened over the weekend and the landowner had no choice, but to padlock the gates. Respect for the property and rights of landowners could have prevented this.

Being the possessor of a solid hunting and fishing lease does not grant you the right to utilize private property without permission of the owner. This should be a sportsman's first thought. Landowner's permission. What would you do if a farmer and his family decided to have a picnic on your front lawn, leaving it a mess with papers, food scraps, cans and broken shrubbery? Think about it.

MAN, in his everyday life is prone to make mistakes, and this is not too bad, for at times we profit from our errors, gaining knowledge in correcting them. Too, a man that doesn't make mistakes apparently isn't doing anything.

I've often thought that the best thing or mistake is a bad call at a Little League game. Even this can work out for the better, as he probably won't be asked to fill another game.

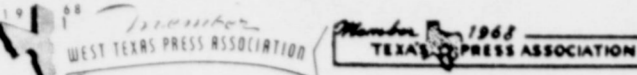

SPORTS POINTS

Gun Registration, A Follow-up
Several weeks ago, three identical petitions, signed by 151 adult Lynn County citizens, were sent to Senators John Tower, and Ralph Yarborough and to Congressman George Mahon. The petitions outlined opposition to the proposed registering of firearms and called for stronger rights for our law enforcement officers.

During the past week, the majority of the petition signers have received replies from Congressman Mahon in which he outlines his views on the subject.

Congressman Mahon's letter read as follows: "During recent weeks I have received many thousands of communications in regard to gun control proposals, and I have not been able to write everyone in detail, but I do appreciate having your views on this important matter."

It is impossible to tell what may develop, but you may be sure that Congress will exercise a great deal of restraint and judgement in dealing with this problem, but it is not the basic one, nor is the registration of guns the answer to the problem. Every responsible effort should be made to keep weapons out of the hands of criminals, but good citizens must be fully protected in their rights to possess firearms.

Congressman Mahon also attached a statement on law and order to the letter in which he calls for the enforcement of existing laws. He also said, "I am encouraged by the rising tide of concern and resentment which the people are displaying. They are rightly demanding an end to the appeasement of the lawless. This is the first step toward effective action!"

Mahon held the letters until he could announce the results of the House vote on the gun control bill. The House voted July 24, 305 to 118 for the bill. Mahon voted with the majority in opposition to the registration provisions, so consequently it was not contained in the final versions of the bill.

We haven't heard the last of this gun registration business for it will surely crop up again as future sessions of congress are held. We need to keep a constant watch over this and be ready again to defend our right to bear arms.

Other common plants in Texas that have poisonous parts include elephant ear, larkspur, azaleas, lantana, canana, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poison oak, buckeye and poison sumac.
"More detailed information on these and other plants can be secured from health and plant authorities," Graff said. The local soil and water conservation district cooperates fully with the National Safety Council in keeping the public alerted to plants that cause these problems."

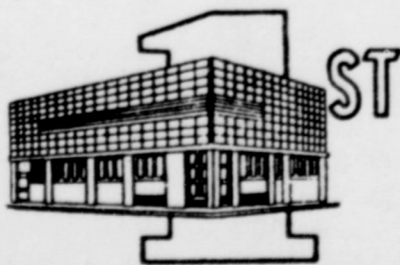

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas, as contiguous to Texarkana."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and such printing as may be required at the Texas School Depository, and paper, except that required for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract and best bidder under regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member of any department of government shall be in any way interested in such contracts."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

According to statistics, one family out of every three will have a member involved in an accident this year. What statistics don't tell is that in addition to the pain, trauma and inconvenience of an accident these people may be hurt financially as they go through the legal mill.

A lawyer is needed in a situation with complicated circumstances. When he fights for his client, extends the benefit of his training and enhances or wins the case his fee is well earned. However, in many cases a lawyer receives a fat fee for what amounts to little more than a few cents of postage, and a half hour spent in dictation or on the phone.

When you are involved in an accident where the other party is clearly at fault, you don't necessarily need an attorney to plead your case. And, the amazing fact that emerges out of the claims fog is that the majority of accidents are clear cut cases.

With an accident where the fault is obvious you can probably get more money by settling your own claim. An attorney usually receives 1/3 to 1/2 of your final settlement, which means you lose money, because in most cases, a lawyer doesn't deduct out-of-pocket expenses.

For example, if you get \$600 in Special Damages (damage to property, medical bills and lost wages - this \$600 is the natural consequence of your accident and must be paid to you by the insurance company whether or not a lawyer intervenes. When it becomes part of the gross settlement, which includes Compensatory Damages - the value of your pain and suffering - his cut goes up, and your net is diminished. If you are awarded a total of \$800, and the lawyer takes up to \$400, you'll have \$200 less than you need just for reimbursement of your own out-of-pocket expenses!

One thing that stops a layman cold is not knowing how to evaluate his claim. Compensation of pain and discomfort due to an accident is what you're really negotiating when you settle a claim. This has always been the difficult part to put a price tag on because of the intangible factors involved. Now, however, it's possible to arrive

at a reasonable figure for your claim - thanks to a new "Probability Statistics Formula" - which uses a point system based on all related facts and makes such a figure feasible for the first time.

This valuable formula is in "How To Settle Your Own Insurance Claim," written by claims expert, Daniel Balducci, and published by the Macmillan Company. The book is an easy guide for dealing effectively with insurance companies which includes step-by-step instruction for preparing the necessary forms and documents so that you can present your own case and get and keep every penny you are entitled to.

An important fact to remember, if you do decide to settle your own claim and are not satisfied with the insurance company's final offer to you, is that the statute of limitations allows you ample time after you've negotiated to go to an attorney.

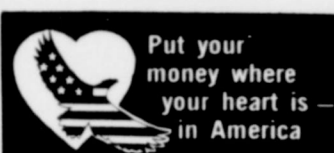

But because the plant's irritant lingers on a pet's coat, a person can pick it up. If your dog's been in poison ivy, put on some rubber gloves and bathe him with brown laundry soap.

A cut calls for gentle trimming of hair around the wound and cleansing in mild soap and water. Use only a non-poisonous antiseptic, and don't bandage the pet's wound unless he keeps licking it — or the cut is deep.

South Plains Grain Fields Heavy In Greenbug Infestation

Greenbug Control on Sorghum Questionable Lubbock - Greenbugs are presently heavily infesting numerous grain sorghum fields on the High Plains. However, the overall situation does not warrant control measures at this time, reports Lyndon K. Almand, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In fact, spraying at this time would also drastically reduce the populations of beneficial insects which are beginning to build up, he points out. These insects should be given a chance to work in reducing the number of greenbugs.

Almand adds that if control measures are taken, more than one spraying may be needed since reinfestation is highly possible due to the buildup of greenbugs throughout the area. However, this buildup should slow down during the hot weather which the area is presently experiencing. The rapid greenbug development over the past few weeks has been a result of relatively cool weather which is conducive to greenbug reproduction.

are running as high as 2,000 to 4,000 per leaf in many sorghum fields, the greenbugs are mainly on the bottom leaves of the plant and are doing little damage, says the entomologist. On grain sorghum which is in the pre-

boot stage or later, research has shown that the insects do not cause enough damage to justify control measures. Almand advises farmers, however, to keep a close watch on their fields and evaluate their particular situation. If the greenbugs move to the upper leaves and begin causing considerable damage to these leaves, control measures may be necessary.

Small grain sorghum, that which is less than about 14 inches high, may be severely damaged by heavy infestation of greenbugs, emphasizes Almand. Control measures

may be necessary on such small sorghum.

Insecticides available for controlling greenbugs include phosdrin, endrin, and parathion. Extreme care should be exercised in applying these materials, cautions the entomologist. The waiting period from the time of application until harvest is as follows: phosdrin, 3 days; endrin, 45 days; and parathion, 12 days.

- 1 (9-inch) baked pastry shell, cooled
1 tablespoon (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
3 eggs, separated
1-1/3 cups (15-oz. can) Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1-1/2 cups (about 3/4 lb.) fresh peaches, peeled and sliced
OR
1 cup (one 1-lb. 1-oz. can) sliced peaches, well drained

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein.

"Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices.

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices.

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast thereon are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for the officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, investing the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per cent (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per cent (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas, the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be the custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and other securities, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stock eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions relating to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions relating to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue for the necessary Proclamation for this Amendment and shall publish the same and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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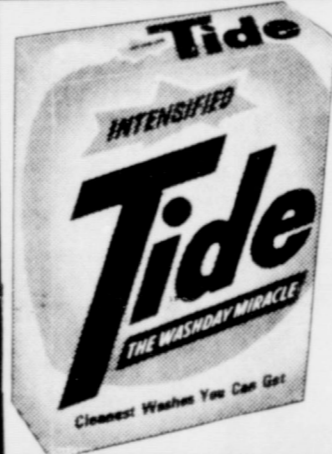
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
