Whit Davidson Is Best Man-Pierson

Judge Lee Pierson Speaks in Interest of Whit Davidson, Gubnatorial Candidate

Judge Lee Pierson of Dallas, campaaign manager for Whit Davidson, candidate for Governor, spoke to · a small audience in the District Court room Monday afternoon, in the in terest of his chief's candidacy.

He devoted a great part of his time to answering alleged charges made by Lynch Davidson and in at tacking the official record of Lynch Davidson. At times he was bitter in his denunciation of the "lumber king", pronouncing him a "dirty de

In reply to the criticism that Whi Davidson had been endorsed by the Farm Labor Union Conference, he declared that Whit Davidson had opened his campaign for Goovernor and had announced his platform long before the Farm Labor Union con ference was held, and that when this conference was held it endorsed Whit Davidson for Governor. He maintain ed that the farmers and laborers had as much right to organize as the law yers or any other class of people and that they had a right to endorse whomsoever they pleased for the var ous offices. In answer to the charge that Whit Davidson himself had here tofore favored the very things in Whit's platform that he now de nounces as socialistic.

Attacking Lynch Davidson's re ord and campaign promises, he charged that Lynch Davidson had started out in this campaign favor ing the exemption from taxation of the cut-over 'timber lands of east Texas. Lynch Davidson had later denied this, he declared, and then he drew a copy of the platform that Lynch Davidson had issued at the beginning of the campaign and read the plank therein in which Lynch Davidson had proposed such exemp tion. Lynch Davidson himself personally owned 40,000 acres of these cut-over timber lands in Polk county while the Lynch Davidson Lumber Company owned more than 200,000 acres of such lands in Texas, the speaker declared.

Lynch Davidson is now proposing to reduce the biennial appropria tions \$10,000,000, he said. Davidson was a member of the state senate two years and as lieutenan governor he presided over the senate two years more, and during all thi time he never proposed the reduction of a single appropriation", he con tinued. "The only reduction bill he the penalty for violation of the antitrust law. How can Lynch Davidson reduce the appropriations ten milion dollars? If he were to close up the capital building and turn off al the state officials and all the departments, that would amount to only a little more than \$2,000,000. 





The cyclone swept from the southwest to the northeast and seems to have affected only a very narrow strip of country. Outhouses at the Brewer residence, which was situated on Sheriff Sam Sanford's farm, were left standing, but the barn of J. E. Sherrill further to the north was demolished. A hard shower followed in the wake of the wind, about a half inch of rain falling over a small territory. The cloud and dust were clearly visible in Tahoka, but its disastrous nature was not generally learned until Thursday morning. hart.


