

OLD SCHOOL AT SALADO, A LANDMARK, DESTROYED

BELTON, Texas, June 30.—The old Thomas Arnold High School Building at Salado, Bell County, ten miles south of Belton, burned early Monday morning. The building and fixtures are a total loss. The structure had been used as a public school building for some time and would have been used as such for a few months longer, until a proposed new building could be constructed.

The foundation and walls of the building were of rock and the wooden portion of the structure had twice been destroyed by fire the last time being in 1902. The building was owned by a local stock company and was insured for \$6,000, with the provision that the money from insurance be used in the construction of a new building in case it was destroyed by fire while in use for school purposes. The school was one of the oldest in Texas and a generation ago was one of the best known. Many of the most prominent men in Texas politics, schools and other affairs were educated in Salado at this school and it was one of the landmarks of Central Texas.

(Editorial Note—The above news story is of more than passing interest to many a citizen of Texas. In the days closely following the Civil War the old Salado College was founded, and for many years it was a prosperous institution, with many students enrolled for that day and time, under the supervision of Prof. C. R. Smith. Then came the railroads through the country, but none came to beautiful and cultured Salado. The school languished and finally died. A few years later, the Thomas Arnold High School was established by Dr. S. J. Jones and Prof. T. J. Witt, two of the leading educators of the state at that time, and for fifteen years or more it held its sessions in the building of the old Salado College. The enrollment was never large, and the student body was composed chiefly of country boys and girls who were ambitious and eager to learn. Many of the men and women who have figured prominently in the affairs of Texas were graduates of the old Salado College or of the later Thomas Arnold High School. This humble editor received most of his meager education in this splendid institution, and it is with a feeling of deep personal loss that we note the final and

complete destruction of the old building, within whose walls we received so much inspiration under two of the greatest Educators that Texas has yet produced.)

HORSE RACING AT AMARILLO

AMARILLO, July 1.—After a lapse of more than seven years, Amarillo is again to have horse racing. The new track and grandstand at the Tri-State Fair are completed and ready for use. Instead of waiting until the Fair this next September arrangement have been made to have a two day meet in Amarillo this week Friday, July the Fourth and Saturday, July 5.

The race this week will all be harness events, three races each day of heats each. A large number of harness horses are in training in this section preparatory to hiping East for the opening of the big circuits this month and have been racing at Vernon, Childress and Wichita Falls. It is stated that practically all these horses will be in Amarillo the Fourth of July.

Purses totalling \$1,500 will be offered to the winners.

Forty to 50 horses will be entered by owners from several states. One owner from Phoenix Ariz., will enter four horses. Strings of horses will be here from Ardmore, Okla., Colorado Central Texas and other places. Many unusually fast horses will be entered, and lovers of racing are expected to have an opportunity to see many fast ones. Horses that are due to record here will participate in the events here July 4 and 5.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

Relating To Granting of Confederate Pensions
 Senate Joint Resolution No 10

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purposes, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.
 Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or

authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers, and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under the special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the States served in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State and to the widows of such service during the war between the States and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this Section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together, in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100) dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1924, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For amendment of Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows who have been a resident of this State since January 1, 1910," and "Against amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."

Section 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publication and elections thereunder.
 Approved, March 20, 1923.

In 1922 Edwards' home people drafted him to run for the Legislature—the only public office he has ever held—and this is his first political contest entered voluntarily. He is president of the Denton Chamber of Commerce, served eight years as Democratic County Chairman, two years as State Democratic Executive Committeeman, three years as Red Cross county chairman, four years as president of Denton County Texas-Exes. Friends say 95 per cent of the Democratic vote of his home county will be cast for Edwards and that he has practically the solid support of Texas newspapermen.

THE MONEY VALUE OF A HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION TO A FARMER

Many parents living in rural communities are doubtless debating whether they should send the boys and girls who completed the course in the small district schools last spring to high schools this fall.

The United States Department of Agriculture and the various State Agricultural colleges have made a number of investigations of the differences between incomes of educated and uneducated farmers.

The department of agriculture reports a survey of three representative areas in Indiana Illinois and Iowa which shows that tenant farmers with a high school education received an average annual income of \$526 a year more than the men with only a common school education.

Cornell University has estimated that a high school education is worth as much to a farmer as \$6,000 worth of bonds bearing five per cent interest and that a college education is worth twice that amount.

This the 9th day of June A. D. 1924, came on to be considered by the county judge of Lynn County, Texas, the petition of W. G. Briley and nineteen other freeholders of the hereinafter described subdivision of said county for an order for an election in such subdivision for the purpose of enabling the freeholders thereof to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large thereon, and it appearing to the undersigned judge of such court that such petition was filed with the commissioners court on the 31 day of May, A. D. 1924, and that such court thereafter, on the 19th day of June 1924, heard and granted the same and ordered that such election be held on the 26 day of July 1924, and that the judge of said court issue an order therefor and cause public notice thereof to be given as required by law:

Now, therefore, by virtue of the authority vested in me under such order and the law, I, J. W. Elliott, County Judge of Lynn County Texas do hereby order that on the 26 day of July, 1924, at Magnolia School house in such subdivision an election shall be held for the purpose of enabling the freeholders of such subdivision to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large in such subdivision, to wit:

Beginning at the S. W. Cor. Survey No. 522, Certificate 2-222, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. Thence north 4 miles on the W. boundary line Survey 522, 521, 503, 502, Blk. 1, G. C. & S. F. to the N. W. Cor. Sur. 502, certificate 4-743, Thence east 2 miles on and with section lines to N. E. Cor. Sur. 501 cert. 4-743 G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. Thence south 1 mile on section line to S. E. Cor. Sur. 501, Thence east with section line to the county line Thence south with county line to a point in the south line of Sur. 1321, certificate No. 8, H. & O. B. Ry. Co. Thence west on section line on the south boundary line of Sur. 1321, 1322, 1369, 1370, 561-522, to the place of beginning.

That the polls shall be opened for such election at Magnolia School house in such subdivision; B. J. Emanuel, J. B. Ray and W. J. Farris being suitable persons for such purpose and freeholders and qualified voters of such county, are hereby appointed as managers of said election, and they shall appoint their own clerks.

No person shall vote at such election unless he be a freeholder and is also a qualified voter under the constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

All votes of such election shall be by ballot, and voters desiring to prevent the animals designated herein from running at large shall place upon their ballots the words "For the Stock Law", and those in favor of allowing such animals to run at large, "Against the Stock Law".

On or before the tenth day after such election, the persons holding such election shall make due return of all the votes cast at their voting place for and against said proposition to the county judge of said county, who will tabulate and count said returns and proclaim the result of said election in the manner prescribed by law.

Public notice of this order shall be given for at least thirty days before the date of such election by publication thereof in some newspaper published in said county, if there be one; and if no newspaper be published in said county, then at three public places in said subdivision.

**MRS. MIRAM A. FERGUSON
MAKES APPEAL TO THE
VOTERS OF TEXAS**

In making a woman's appeal to the voters of Texas to elect me governor of the state I am not unmindful of the task which I undertake. I am aware of the criticism which I may provoke and I appreciate the difficulties which I may meet.

But at the same time I have an abiding faith in the fathers and mothers and the brothers and sisters who will vote in this election, and I believe they will make due allowance for the unusual condition in which I am placed.

No other woman has been confronted with just such conditions or been in just such a position.

Speaking candidly, I have never taken a great deal of interest in politics. While my husband has been active in public life for ten years or more I have found much pleasure in looking after home affairs and the raising of a family.

While I am a member of the Episcopal church, yet I have never found courage to differ with our old time Primitive Baptist friends who are so devotedly consecrated to the ideas of the power and providence of God over the destiny of the human family.

But be that as it may, I find myself confronted with a condition which I did not produce.

Looking backward over a period of ten years, I can see and I frankly admit that my husband has made mistakes and I know it will not be denied that those who have been opposed to him made mistakes too.

If those with whom he differed had been content with his removal from office, then he and I would have resigned ourselves to the situation and found consolation in the fact that we both knew that he had meant no wrong and had always been faithful to the people.

But in the passion and frenzy of the hour of his terrible ordeal at Austin it appeared that his removal was not sufficient and it was decreed that for all time to come he must forfeit the sacred right, of a citizen—the right to serve the people. There is but one more sacred right and that is the people's right to select that servant. Destroy these rights and government of, for and by the people becomes a myth and liberty becomes a dream.

No greater punishment could be put on one's family name. It lasts so long as life shall last and then it descends upon the wife and the children who shall suffer.

I have never understood why those in authority could have the heart to visit such a harsh punishment that would for all time blacken his name and the name of his family. And I have never understood why, after he was out of office, that another law should be passed to keep him from taking his case to the people and let them say whether he had done wrong or not.

And I cannot understand now why they will not let him have his name on the ticket and let the people give him a vote of confidence if they want to.

I guess the courts are all right but it looks to me like that a new kind of religion is being set up that denies the right of reformation and repentance of sins.

No matter what my husband may have done it does not seem right that he should be denied the right to make his peace with the people and receive their approval if they want to extend it.

But such is his lot and as his wife it is my burden as well. Every door is closed to him. Every door is closed to the people who want to help him. They say now we are satisfied, he and the people can't get together. We candidates now have our chance. We have branded his name and for all time to come he shall not be in our way.

So far as I know my opponents are nice men, and as they have all said that they believe in equal suffrage for women, I hope they will not deny me the right to appeal to the family name.

And as they will not let my husband run, I hope our friends all over Texas will see that I am forced to enter this contest. Mothers, I love my children just as you love yours. I have a little bright-eyed grandson that I love dearer than life itself. Some of these days he will grow up to be a man and maybe he might want to run for office and serve his country. If, when he does, somebody wants to point the finger of scorn at him and say, "Your grandfather was impeached by the senate of Texas," I want the grandson to be able to say, "YES, AND AS A REBUKE TO THAT IMPEACHMENT THAT DENIED MY GRANDFATHER THE RIGHT TO GO TO THE PEOPLE, MY DEAR GRANDMOHER WAS ELECTED GOVERNOR BY THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS—the first woman governor in the world."

Mother, father, son or brother, won't you help me? Jim and I are not seeking revenge; we are asking for the name of our children to be cleared of this awful judgment.

If any wrong has been done, God in heaven knows we have suffered enough. Though we have lost the most of our earthly possessions in these years of trouble we shall not complain if the people will keep us from losing our family name which we want to leave to our children.

We are passing on, and fast the most of us are tipping over the summit of life's journey and next time may be too late and that is why we are so anxious now.

I am adopting and approving the platform which Jim has already announced and if you elect me, I promise with all my heart to carry it out and he will help me to give the people of Texas the best administration that our ability, tempered with love and gratitude, can produce.

Jim wants another chance to show his appreciation of the thousands of loyal friends who have stood by him through their darkest hours and he has put all hate and malice out of his heart and if you will elect me he will consecrate himself to your service.

I know I can't talk about the constitution and the making of laws and the science of government like some of the other candidates, and I believe they have talked too much, but I have a trusting and abiding faith "that my Redeemer liveth" and I am trusting in Him to guide my footsteps in the path of righteousness for the good of the people and the good of our state.

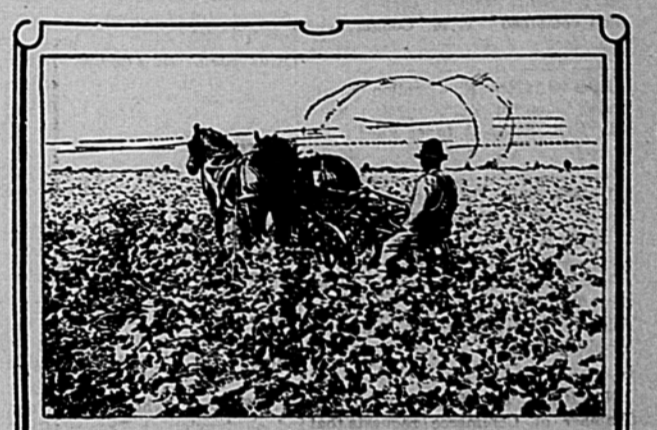

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

Relating To Granting of Confederate Pensions
Senate Joint Resolution No 10

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purposes, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
---Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
---Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, pro- other corporations whatsoever, pro- vided, however the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Con-

federate soldiers, and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under the special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the States served in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State and to the widows of such service during the war between the States and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this Section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together, in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100) dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.

---Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1924, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For amendment of Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."
Section 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publication and elections thereunder. Approved, March 20, 1923.

Sur. 501, Thence east with section line to the county line Thence south with county line to a point in the south line of Sur. 1321, certificate No. 8, H. & O. B. Ry. Co. Thence west on section line on the south boundary line of Sur. 1321, 1322, 1369, 1370, 561-522, to the place of beginning.

That the polls shall be opened for such election at Magnolia School house in such subdivision; B. J. Emanuel, J. B. Ray and W. J. Farris being suitable persons for such purpose and freeholders and qualified voters of such county, are hereby appointed as managers of said election, and they shall appoint their own clerks.

No person shall vote at such election unless he be a freeholder and is also a qualified voter under the constitution and laws of the State of Texas. LET THE HOWLER CEASE HIS HOWLING

The calamity howler, as well as the poor, we have with us always. This country just now seems to have a surplus of this tribe. They all think the country is going to the how-wows—wherever that is. But they have many different reasons for thinking so.

First, there is the proletarian, the socialist, the one-gallus cuss that spends most of his time "chawing his terbaccer" and cussin' the government, the fellow who imagines that the hated plutocrats are eternally grinding down the common people and trying to make slaves of them.

Second, there is the misanthropic moralist, who believes that every boy and girl with a natural and moral love of fun and excitement is Gehenna-bound, and that the Devil is dragging every one of them swiftly and surely to perdition.

And Thirdly, as the preachers used to say, there is the narrow-minded religionist who thinks that every man who disagrees with him on religion is a devil incarnate, seeking whom he may devour.

There are all lop-sided folks. They lack the proper sense of proportion. They see evil only through glasses that magnify and good only through glasses that minify. They easily become the victims of professional alarmists, whose chief business it is to fleece them.

The one-gallus guy that spits red and cusses the frich, becomes the easy victim of the political fakir who seeks to ride into office or into places of power by feeding him just the kind of fodder that his diseased political stomach calls for.

The misanthrope who believes that every girl who bobs her hair or paints her lips is bound to be a little she-imp, becomes the easy victim of the religious sensationist who makes his living chiefly by talking vulgarity in the pulpit and trying to be sensational.

The religious ghost-hunter becomes easy picking for the grafter who depends on his ability to fan the flames of religious bigotry and hatred and then induce his victims to part with their ready cash to carry on his "holy" and venomous warfare. Just now the ghost is Catholicism, bad enough in fact, no doubt, but which the professional alarmists are painting on the imaginations of their victims as a great political and religious power that is about to overrun this country and destroy this government.

What we need in this country is people with poise, people who can see things in their right proportion, people who will not take every sign post in the dark, with its out-stretched arms, to be a frightful ghost; people who can see that not all the rich are robbers, though all poor are to be pitied and helped in one way or another; that not all the thoughtless young are victims, and that parents are largely to blame for the defaults of the children; that the man who has a different faith from our own may be as honest, as sincere, as benevolent, and as good as we; that the erring can not be won by hatred and abuse but may be won by love and sympathy.

Let us get a right view of things. Let us quit this foolishness and be sane and sensible and sympathetic for a spell, and see if many of our evils don't disappear.

WHY NOT TELL THE TRUTH?

The News believes that even political advertisement ought to tell the truth. Last week a paid advertisement was carried in the columns of this and many other weekly papers in Texas in the interest of Felix D. Robertson for governor. In this advertisement it was stated that Judge Robertson has been a lifelong

prohibitionist, having been active in his fight against the liquor interest, for more than twenty years. This ad was paid for by "Felix D. Robertson's friends". His "friends" evidently know something about Judge Robertson's prohibition record. If they do, they know that the above statement is false. They know that Judge Robertson has not been a life-long prohibitionist and that he has not been active in his fight against the liquor interests for more than twenty years. In his address in Tahoka and in numerous other addresses in Texas, as reported in the daily press, Judge Robertson states, that formerly he was an anti-prohibitionist. In Tahoka he claimed that he was converted to the cause of prohibition 16 or 18 years ago but admitted that he continued to drink liquor occasionally for a year or two after that. As a matter of fact, if Judge Robertson had any prohibition record at all until he entered the race for the governorship was never heard of it. While Judge Robertson resided in Waco two or three local option elections were held in McLennan county. We should like to ask Judge Robertson if he voted for prohibition in either of those elections. Is it not a fact, Judge Robertson, that you voted against prohibition in every local option election that was held in McLennan county? Is it not a fact that you voted against state-wide prohibition in 1911? Were you not still an anti-prohibitionist in 1912, and did you not so express yourself on more than one occasion? Did you at any time, anywhere, make a speech for prohibition, in any contest, in any precinct, county, or state, before the state wide prohibition law was enacted in Texas? If so, please state where and when, and give the name of some man who was present and heard you. If you haven't the time to answer these questions, perhaps some of your "friends" have. We want to know when you became a prohibitionist, whether before or after prohibition was adopted in this state.

The nomination of Davis and Bryan by the Madison Square convention seems to have met with general approval throughout the country. Davis is no doubt about the strongest man intellectually that the Democrats could have selected and he seems to be reasonably progressive. He towers above Coolidge in about the same manner that Wilson towered above his successor. Bryan is the governor of Nebraska, having been elected over his Republican opponent by a crushing majority, although Nebraska is a normally Republican state. He is an ultra progressive, both in theory and in practice, and is strong in the west. Things are looking better for the Democrats in spite of the unnecessary and regrettable deadlock that tied up the convention for nearly two weeks and threatened to split the Democratic party wide open.

Judge Mullican gave some advise in his address last Saturday. Hatred and malice and strife are not good for any community. Love and fellowship and sympathy among men are the things that count for good in a community. Secrecy too often breeds suspicion and distrust. Clannishness always produces factionalism. Exclusiveness creates resentment on the part of those excluded. Let us all meet on the common ground of love for country, love for humanity, love for one another here in our own community. Let's quit this clannishness, this secrecy, this breeding of hatred and strife, boys, and let's all be just plain American citizens, loving a common country and the same great God of us all.

Although no rain has yet fallen in most sections of Lynn county, the cotton is not yet materially suffering. Some farmers are getting a little blue, however, over the continued dry weather. A rain would be very welcome, but we should bear in mind that good rains coming in August would assure an excellent cotton crop, while lots of cotton will be made without another drop of rain. Cheer up, folks.

CYCLONE IN DRAW COMMUNITY KILLS BREWER

LITTLE CHILD SLIGHTLY INJURED OTHER MEMBERS OF THE FAMILY UNHURT

A cyclone of small proportions visited the Draw community in the southeast portion of the county about seven o'clock Wednesday evening, killing George Brewer and painfully but not seriously injuring one of his little boys seven or eight years old. His wife and the other two children were uninjured. The house in which they resided was blown down, and Mr. Brewer was struck by the falling timbers. His back was broken and the skull on the back of the head was crushed. Funeral services will be conducted at three o'clock this afternoon and the body laid away in the Tahoka Cemetery under the auspices of the Odd Fellows Lodge, of which the deceased was a member.

The cyclone swept from the southwest to the northeast and seems to have affected only a very narrow strip of country. Outhouses at the Brewer residence, which was situated on Sheriff Sam Sanford's farm, were left standing, but the barn of J. E. Sherrill further to the north was demolished. A hard shower followed in the wake of the wind, about a half inch of rain falling over a small territory. The cloud and dust were clearly visible in Tahoka, but its disastrous nature was not generally learned until Thursday morning.

A CORRECTION

There has recently been published in many papers throughout Texas a statement to the effect that Judge Felix D. Robertson, a candidate for Governor, is an "elder" in the First Baptist Church of Dallas.

JUDGE MULLICAN ADDRESS-ED LARGE CROWD IN DISTRICT COURT ROOM

(Cont'd from First Page)

you people that I am a Klansman and unfit to hold office. I am willing to tell you people all about my position. I am not a Klansman. I am not a member of the Ku Klux Klan. I am not a member of any secret political organization and I never will be. Neither am I an anti-Klansman. I am not a member of any organization opposing the Klan. It may be proper for candidates for some offices to take sides on issues of this kind, but not for a candidate for District Judge. Do you want a man as district judge who is tied down by either one side or the other? I have tried two murder cases since I have been district judge in which the Klan question figured. Suppose I should make my campaign for district judge as a partisan on one side or the other of this question, and then a case should arise in which the Klan question was involved, and the defendant should challenge my fairness as a judge on the grounds that I had taken issues against him in the campaign. What would be the result? A district judge disqualified perhaps to try a case because he had made his campaign on one side of the other of that issue. I want to represent all the people. If I can't represent all men and protect their rights as guaranteed by the constitution, I do not wish to be your district judge and you can look for another candidate. My opponent gives as one of his qualifications that he has not practiced criminal law. I want to tell you that 50 per cent of the cases appearing on the docket in this district are criminal cases, and the man who has just had experience in trying criminal cases will have a hard time coping with the shrewd, scheming criminal lawyers that will appear in his court.

My enemies have been making attacks upon my personal character. But they realize now that they have overdone the thing and they are trying to stop it. They sprang an outrageous story that reflected on the character of a good man and a good woman. Any man that would do such a thing is unfit to bear the name of a man, no matter who he is. I want to say that I believe my opponent is a Christian gentleman, and some good women, some as good as there are anywhere, but he has

following him some of the sorriest human beings that ever lived. My opponent may not realize it, but it is the criminal element that is backing him up. I have made up my mind that if I am elected, I will clean up this district and clear it of that element that is corrupting the boys and ruining the girls in this country. I have been against the criminal element all my life. My opponent is backed by a clique of criminal lawyers that can't control me and they want to get a man in that they can run things over. Now, may be I have said too much. I am always saying too much.

"Go on, pour it on! Pour it on!" the crowd shouted back.
"Now, I am not slinging mud, the Judge continued, "I am only fighting those who are against you as well as me."
"Now, let me counsel you people just a little. You may not appreciate being lectured, but I just want to give you a little lecture. It seems to me that a pitiful condition is coming to exist in this country. Neighbor is being arrayed against neighbor, Klan against Anti-Klan, Let me beg you to forget your differences. There is one organization that we can all join, an organization that has no officers, the organization of good citizenship."

Again pronouncing the charges against him as false, he challenged his enemies to prove that he had lied, and closed with a promise that his life shall be as clean and as spotless as a Christian man can make it.
