## West Texas Normal at Canyon Burns

West Texas State Normal totally destroyed by fire Tuesday morning. Loss was \$225,000, with \$100,000 worth of equipment was destroyed.

A fire started at 8:30 o'clock was caused by the explosion of a gasoline torch, while a laborer was engaged in soldering a pipe in the garret of the building, in connection with the installation of a hot-air heating system in the institution.

When the fire alarm was given there were some seven hundred students and instructors in the building. All marched out in good order in less than five minutes.

## P. & N. T. to Extend Its Lines?

Austin, Texas, March 14.—Authority to issue and register \$2,320,000 first mortgage 6 per cent gold bonds was granted to the Pecos & Northern Texas Railway this afternoon by an order issued by the railroad commission.

These bonds are to be issued against the franchise and property of the road from Amarillo to the Texas-New Mexico state line and from Canyon to Plainview, the company has heretofore issued stock and bonds aggregating \$6,664,000.

The company is contemplating extensions.—Ex.

The report from Austin that the Pecos and North Texas has taken out an issue of bonds for further construction work indicates an early extension of the Lamesa road on to Sterling City. It must be either that or building east from Slaton towards Fort Worth, and it is not at all likely that the Santa Fe is ready to take up that project yet.—Slatonite.

The special train that went down to Lamesa the latter part of last week carrying several high officials has a rather encouraging look just at this time. The closing of this gap south of us would be of great benefit to Tahoka, giving us much better freight and passenger service, and by giving us through trains would likely give us a direct mail line west from Tahoka to Roswell, New Mexico.

## DOCTORS AS ADVERTISERS.

The question of publicity, commonly called advertising, is likely to be the burning issue to come before the meeting of the national house of delegates of the American Medical association next summer.

The medical profession regards it as derogatory to advertise—in the ordinary, crude way that a man with something to sell does—because some clever and conscienceless medical fakers do so.

But there is more than one way to kill a cat. Addresses before learned societies and papers in leading magazines may be reprinted and "digested" for press-agent use, and the dignity of the profession can be still upheld.

But this is advertising none the less, and hardly as honorable as the crude method of the man with something to sell. He pays cash for his publicity, while the "ethical" doctor gets his free.

The truth about medical advertising is that there is a lot of solemn piffle talked about "ethics" and the like. There is not a single good reason why a reputable doctor should not advertise in a dignified way; and there are a hundred good ones why he should. If a few leaders of the profession should start the practice in a proper way the fakers would literally be snowed under and driven out.

This is the age of specialism in medicine and surgery, as in everything else. Why should not the medical specialist let the public know who he is, where he was trained and what he can do? The public is entitled to know these facts before it invests in a doctor's services. The magic letters "M. D." convey nothing specific to the lay mind. Both doctor and public suffer from this frigid conspiracy of silence.

Let us have light and lots of it. Ethics will take care of itself. What the public wants to know of a doctor, as of everyone in the market with something to sell, is: What can you do?—Philadelphia Telegraph.

## Slayer of Bullock Gets Thirty Years

The verdict returned Thursday morning by the jury in the Thad Crosset murder trial at Lamesa was "thirty years in the penitentiary." The case went to the jury Wednesday evening and they reached their decision in a couple of hours.

The people of Dawson county were considerably excited and threats having been made, the sheriffs of Lubbock and Lynn counties were called to Lamesa every person entering the court room had to undergo a search for concealed weapons. Everything however passed off quietly, and no disturbance was made. It is reported here however that the accused father made the remark "they will take my body to the grave before they take my boy to the penitentiary."

The killing as well as we can get the story here was as follows: Bullock, the young man that was killed, was floor manager at a dance, and he and Crosset had some words and went outside where Crosset proceeded to give Bullock a severe thrashing, and then as Bullock started for his home about 180 yards away Crosset shot him several times in the back.

## SPECIAL SESSION DISCUSSED

Farmers' Union Officials Want No Politics.

Ft. Worth, Texas.—The suggestion that the Legislature meet in special session to enact, among other measures, laws needed by the farmers emboldens us to make a few observations concerning the proposed session and its work.

The Farmers' Union has had considerable experience as an organization with legislatures, having had representatives at Austin during the sessions for the past dozen assemblies or more, and our observation prompts us to suggest to Governor Colquitt that in addition to the exactions he has made he also require the members to promise their constituents that in the event the session is called they agree not to commit grand larceny upon the tax payers by playing to galleries or to sand-bag Father Time by making political speeches during the session. We already have too many political aviators darkening the skies with their queer crafts and any member inclined to rise and fly in search of office while the legislature is in session should be regulated and restrained, for it is not in the interest of the farmer to turn loose a flock of partisan orators in the legislative halls while agricultural matters are under consideration.

### A Tremendous Task.

We leave the question of calling an extra session with the Governor without comment, but we want to take this occasion to impress upon legislators present and future the magnitude of the task they are undertaking. The subjects of warehouse bills, rural credits and kindred matters have been receiving constant study by the Farmers' Union for the past ten years and they are by no means solved to our entire satisfaction. We are entering a new rural civilization and the problem of agricultural legislation is as big as the continent and one that requires master minds and years of experience to deal with.

successfully. It is easy to throw a few words together in the form of an enactment, but quite another matter to put a workable law upon the statute book containing native ability to germinate activity and distribute energy throughout the agricultural life of State. There is already too much agricultural gossip upon the statute book; we want laws that can live and labor. A law that a politician can run for office on and one that a farmer can run a farm on, are entirely different propositions.

### Law Makers Follow the Sap.

It is refreshing to find the legislature getting back to the soil. We have been legislating downward. We are now beginning at the soil and going upward and for the first time, following the direction of the sap. Many efforts have been made to legislate in favor of the farmer by building subsidiary industries, and to assist the farmer by restraining the manufacturers, traders and carriers but such legislation has been comparatively worthless so far as the farmers are concerned. To meet the situation successfully will require a code of laws adapted to the business of farming.

### War At Any Price.

War at any price has been the slogan of some people for the past few years and now let us have peace without price. The agricultural problems now confronting us call for statesmen—not warriors. The improvement of our educational system demands students—not warriors. The expansion of our industries demands diplomats—not warriors. The real elimination problem in this campaign is to get rid of liquor warriors—pro and anti. If they cannot earn a livelihood during the next four years at peaceful pursuits they should be either chloroformed or pensioned.

The State Democratic Prohibition convention had before it the pleadings of the Farmers' Union for peace and they chose war. The opposing forces will make their final declaration on April 14th. If they have the welfare of the farmer at heart, they will take no part in the liquor controversy but will sign the treaty of peace promulgated by the Farmers' Union. We will wait patiently to hear what they have to say.

Dispel Hostile Attitude Toward Well to Do

IT is said there is great unrest in society. Perhaps there is. Certainly the attacks on the motives of good people, the UNJUST ASSAULTS UPON THE COMMENDABLE ACCUMULATION OF WEALTH, the failure to discriminate between honest business men and dishonest business men and the cultivation of contempt for law and constituted authority would be likely to bring about such unrest and a sullen or hostile attitude on the part of many of the less fortunate toward the well to do.

MOREOVER, GENERAL DISCONTENTMENT WITH CONDITIONS WAS TO BE EXPECTED AND WAS NECESSARY TO AVOID THE VERY SERIOUS DANGER OF PLUTOCRACY AND TO RELEASE THE HOLD THAT CORPORATE CORRUPTION HAD OBTAINED IN POLITICS. NOW, HOWEVER, WE HAVE REACHED A TIME WHEN WE MUST DISCRIMINATE. THE PEOPLE ARE SUFFICIENTLY AROUSED. NOW LET COMMON SENSE PREVAIL TO DISTINGUISH BETWEEN WHAT IS GOOD AND PRACTICAL AND WHAT IS LURING, BUT DECEITFUL IN ITS PROMISE.

No Capitalist Can Change Model of United States

ALL human history maintains that there is a struggle between classes. It is asserted that CAPITALISTS CONTROL THE LEGISLATURES, while men of large wealth have a great deal of influence, and during the past year these men have managed to TOUCH SOME LEGISLATORS AND EXECUTIVES. But that age is gradually passing by.



AMERICA IS A DEMOCRACY. IF EXECUTIVES AND LEGISLATORS ALLOW THIS TO BE USED BY THESE MEN OF WEALTH IT IS CONFESSION ON OUR PART THAT WE ARE NOT DOING OUR DUTY. NO CAPITALISTS CAN CHANGE THE MODEL OF THE COUNTRY.

It is asserted that capitalists who pay for labor give the laboring class just enough to live on. Socialism is a PROGRAM OF REORGANIZATION OF ECONOMIC SOCIETY, while the Socialist feels that the laboring man is divorced from capital, and their purpose is to abolish all private ownership of production and make the United States the sole landowner.

Many philanthropic schemes have been tried, but all have proved inadequate. What, then, must we say concerning a remedy? Some ETHICAL CHANGE IS NECESSARY, one not contained in CONCILIATION OR ARBITRATION. While profit sharing will furnish the motive that will materially help the DEPLORABLE INDUSTRIAL SITUATION, it will not cure it.

WITH DISGRACEFUL CONDITIONS EXISTING IN EVERY CITY, WITH FACTORIES ADVERTISING FOR FAMILIES HAVING CHILDREN TWELVE YEARS OF AGE AND UPWARD, WITH WOMEN AND CHILDREN BEING PUT TO WORK FOR WHICH HORSES ARE DEEMED TOO GOOD, THE CONDITIONS WHICH THE PROPHETS DECRIED HAVE SURVIVED IN DECREASING MEASURE EVEN UNTO OUR OWN DAY. BUT THE SPIRIT OF BROTHERLY LOVE IS SLOWLY MAKING THIS OLD WORLD OVER.

Help secure the appointment of policewomen everywhere, for the policewoman can be to the WOMAN IN NEED A MOST HELPFUL FRIEND. Blot out the saloon and the social evil through education and legislation combined, so that police departments will have more time—the time that they ought to have—to enforce the laws and investigate working conditions, which really are touched by law, but for which at present we have to provide SPECIAL INSPECTORS.

Best Period For Marriage Between Twenty-one and Twenty-five

YOUNG people should trust more to nature than they do. They should give nature a chance. They should THINK LESS ABOUT MONEY and the things that money will buy. They should live more plainly, be CONTENT WITH A SIMPLER STANDARD OF EXISTENCE. They should not wait to be rich or even well to do before they join fortunes.

NOTHING IN THE WORLD DRAWS TOGETHER A YOUNG HUSBAND AND WIFE LIKE SHARED DIFFICULTIES AND SELF DENIALS. THE TWO HAVE THUS AN INEXHAUSTIBLE FUND OF COMMON INTEREST; ALSO EACH INSENSIBLY LEARNS CONSIDERATION FOR THE OTHER, A SELF FORGETTING SYMPATHY.

There are many good arguments for youthful marriage, by which, of course, I do not mean the HASTY, ILL ADVISED MATCHES OF SCHOOL CHILDREN. Of course health or family reasons sometimes make it impossible for a young man and woman to marry at once. But generally speaking, I think BETWEEN TWENTY-ONE AND TWENTY-FIVE is the best period for marriage in the case of both sexes.
