homes here. In a few of the larger towns men who have grown rich selling land to these people have now begun to encourage the
"colored brother" to move west. What could be a more dishonorable course of conduct? Two years ago Jones county had no colored citizen's, but it would seem that the map of the otherwise beautiful city of Stamford is now disfigured by an ugly and growing black spot and the same paper from which glean this gro troubles at that place and at Sweetwater and Rotan. This paper must be proud of having helped bring them on, since it favored negro immigration; and every one knows that where there are no negroes, negro tr
riots can't occur.
Comanche, one of the riches counties in Central Texas has not had a negro lynching for twentyone years, during which time ne been laid at a black man's door-no black man has since then stayed in the county long enough to acquire a door of his own or even a temporary place to lay his head, The Comanche Pioneer- Eixponent seems to think that another generation may elapse before they can have another negro lynching.
