W. A. Slover Dead. Dimmitt Plainsman.

W. A. Slover, after an illness of three weeks, succumbed to an ating, August 21, at 11 o'clock in the presence of a number of relatives and family friends.

The funeral services took place Saturday afternoon from the Presthorne preaching the last sermon, followed by a nephew, of the deceased, Rev. G. S. Slover, president of Clarendon college. The obsequies were in charge of the Masonic lodge, of which the deceased had been an honored member for many years and the remains were laid to rest ir the Dimitt cemetery, followed by an immense con-

W. A. Slover was born in Madison county, Arkansas, in 1843. When six years old his parents in the back door through which moved to Grayson county. After they were enabled to reach the living there for a few years the family moved to Parker county, thence to Clay county. They then settled in Montague county. Deceased served in the Confederate army from 1861 to 1864. At the close of his army career he returned to Montague county and served as Sheriff of that county nine years ago. On December 11, 1862, he was united in marriage to Louisa Parlee Shadle at the home of the bride's parents in Parker county. In 1901 Mr. Slover moved to Castro county, where he lived till bis death.

sulphur Bleach for Fruit Stains.

Stained table linen follows the return of the fresh fruit season as surely "as night follows day." For removing such stains there is nothing more effective than the sulphur bleach. Lay a spoonful of sulphur on a plate, and sprinkle with a few drops of alcohol. Over this place a tin funel with the point interested in. upward. Touch a lighted match to the alcohol; wet the stained linen, and hold the spot over the opening in the point of the funnel. STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING THE COMPENSATION OF THE GOVERNOR AND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution Sections 5 and 17 of said Article 4 so as to fix the compensation of the rate and independent school districts.

MENT TO CONSTITUTION.

Joint Resolution amending Section 3. Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted on school districts and providing for a majority vote of the property tax paying voters of such district to vote such tax. Section 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll fax of \$1 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax Mr. Soape is helping Uncle T.
