## Bulldogs Lose First District Game



The Tahoka Bulldogs lost their first district game last Friday night to the Post Antelopes, 35-8.

The Bulldogs received the opening kickoff and returned it to their own 19 yard line. They then moved the ball four yards in three plays and were forced to punt out. Post took the punt on the Bulldog 46 yard line and drove to the 19 yard line with Jeff Atwell intercepting an Antelope pass to save an almost sure touchdown. Atwell was taken down on the 14 yard line but the Bulldogs were able to move the ball only 5 yards before having to punt.

The punt was taken by Post this time on the Tahoka 45 yard line with the Post team getting one first down before bogging down again and being forced to punt from the Tahoka 36 yard line. The punt left the Bulldogs in a hole on their own 6 yard line. Only making one yard the Bulldogs punted out to the 40 and it was run back to the Tahoka 6. Then in two plays from scrimmage the Antelopes drove in and scored with just minutes left in the first quarter. The PAT was good making the score at the end of the first period 7-0 in favor of the Antelopes.

The Antelopes scored twice in the second quarter, the first coming on a 76 yard drive from their own 24 yard line making the PAT and the second on a Warren pass with an inter-

ception on the Bulldogs 12 yard line that carried to the one. The Antelopes scored on the next play and kicked the PAT for a 21-0 half time score in favor of Post.

In the third period the Antelope scored again on an interception on the Bulldog 30 yard line and took it in all the way for the TD. The PAT was good ending the third period 28-0 for the Antelopes.

The Bulldogs lone touchdown came in the fourth period after the Tahoka team intercepted a pass on the Post 6 yard line taking it to the two. Robert Montemayor scored the TD from the two around left end and ran over the PAT for the Dogs eight points.

The Antelopes scored again

on next to the last play of the game from the 5 yard line and kicked the PAT ending the scoring and defeating the Bulldogs 35-8.

The Bulldogs play a home game this week at Kelly field. They will take on Idalou for homecoming. The game will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Outstanding defensive players for the Bulldogs were Robert Montemayor, Johnny Martin, Ladd Roberts, David Rogers and Jeff Atwell. Outstanding offensive players were Robert Montemayor, Martin Warren, Larry Durham, Johnny Martin for blocking and Gene Walker as pass receiver.

The Bulldogs are now 3-3 for the season.

## Benny Barton, Billy Wood Are Named State Winners In 4-H Awards Programs

Station. Two Lynn County 4-H Club members have been named state winners in the 4-H Awards Program. Benny Barton and Billy Wood, both members of the O'Donnell Community Club, and friendly competitors for several years, have been named 1969 state winners in swine and agricultural programs.

Such happen very often, the state 4-H Club office announcement, when National Club Congress trip winners come from the same club. Benny Barton, 17, of O'Donnell, will be in Chicago from Oct. 20 - Dec. 4 attending the 4-H premier 4-H event. Benny's records will be submitted for national judging. A group of six will be selected in each program and will receive \$500 college scholarships. Donors for the trips and awards are the Moorman Manufacturing Co. of Quincy, International Harvester Co. of Chicago, respectively.

Benny is the son of Mrs. Benny Barton, O'Donnell; a senior junior with seven active years as a 4-H swine raiser. Benny, which he bred, exhibited, have been champions at local, district and county shows and his collection of champion banners trophies is an impressive display.

Swine feeding began with Benny and his father, and since he's been on his own. He is now a member of the Texas Pork Producers and actively participates in 4-H activities and cut-out contests. He produces the swine for his feeding operations and has found he can sell it for more than on the open market. Benny hasn't all been work for swine. He finds time to participate in football, basketball and other high school and in most community affairs. He is a member of the District 4-H Club and serves as chairman of the Public Relations Committee.

The agricultural awards program is based upon the member's ability to relate one agricultural project with another for a combination that leads to better farming and more satisfying rural living. Involved is the use of the latest farming practices based upon research and practical farming experience.

While the state award winner has gained wide recognition for his abilities as a swine breeder, feeder and exhibitor, he has also completed projects involving cotton, grain sorghum, beef cattle, sheep, entomology, gardening, electric, farm and home safety, landscaping, money management, photography and leadership. He has been an officer in his local club each year since

1963; is active in his church; school athletics and community affairs.

He plans to study animal science in college due to 4-H experiences and his interest in this career field.

County Agent Griffin said, "Billy Jack is a fine example of a working 4-H Club boy. He is always busy but never too busy to help someone else. He knows the meaning of respect, integrity and loyalty and possesses the qualities and characteristics which have made him a respected leader in his community, county and district."

### World War 1 Veterans to Hold Reunion

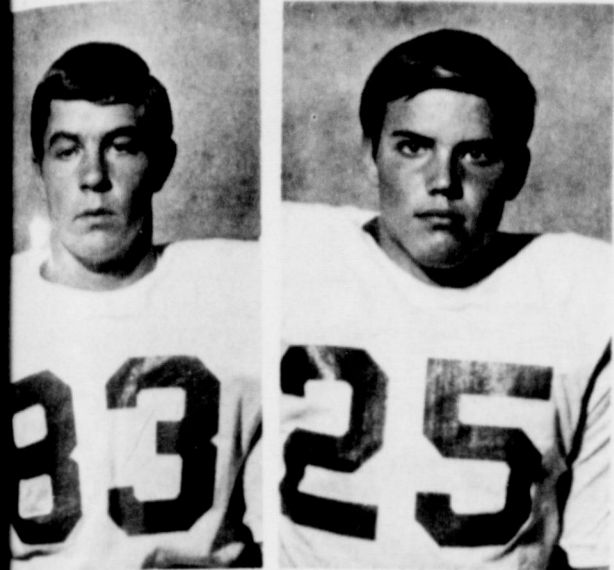

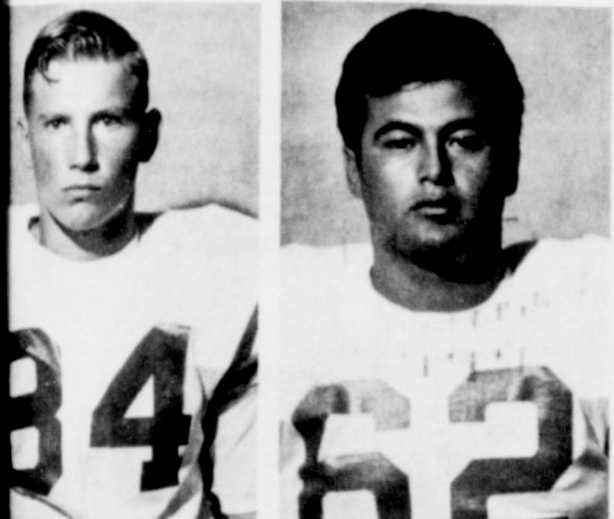

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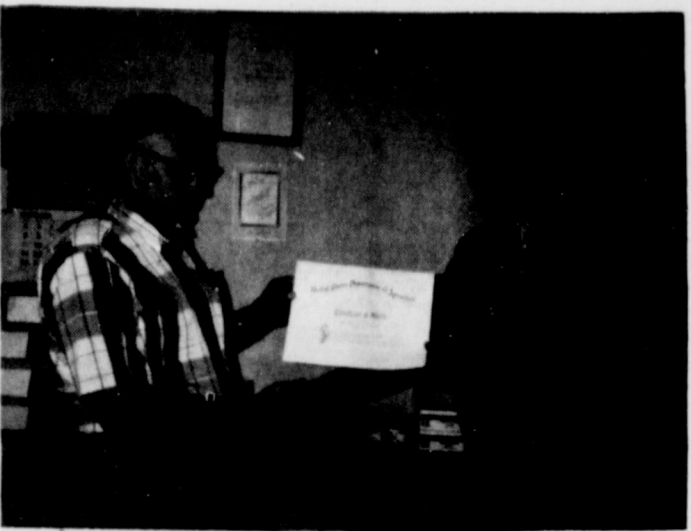

**Loamuh Harston Earns Citation**

Loamuh D. Harston, Soil Conservation Technician, with the Soil Conservation Service, Tahoka, Texas, has been awarded the Citation of Merit.

In recognition of his being an outstanding performance rating for Fiscal Year 1969. The superior manner in which he performed his duties in the application and maintenance of a high quality conservation program materially contributed to the commendable accomplishments of the Tahoka Work Unit, states A.V. Sheppard, District Conservationist with the SCS, who is also Loamuh's supervising employee.

Each year each employee of the SCS is assigned a rating for the previous years performance.

The ratings are assigned on the basis of performance of the employee against the employees standard of performance for the position.

For the employee to earn an outstanding rating, his performance must be outstanding in each item in the standard. The principle item in Harston's standard of performance are: 1. assisting landowners and operators to apply and maintain a complete soil and water conservation program on their land; 2. included, is to help with the informational program; also 3. working with other land users such as rodeo associations and gins, and with units of government such as city and county.

Sheppard also states that less than 5 per cent of the employees of the SCS ever earn an outstanding rating. Loamuh is one of the three employees that he has had the privileged of working with, who have earned this outstanding rating.

**Yule Packages for GI's Should be Mailed Soon**

Christmas packages to armed forces overseas should be mailed before Nov. 8 for surface mail, before Nov. 22 for SAM (Space Available Mail), before Nov. 29 for PAL (Parcel Air Lift) and prior to Dec. 13 for Air Mail. Postmaster Charles Townes has announced.

The postmaster listed the following suggestions for packing Christmas gifts: Pack articles in wood, metal, strong fiberboard or corrugated boxes. Wrap fiberboard boxes in heavy brown paper and tie securely with strong cord. Pack articles in the box tightly with sufficient cushioning material. Enclose a slip of paper listing name and address of both the sender and the addressee. Combustible materials, such as matches, lighter fluid, etc., may not be mailed.

If a sender is in doubt about whether an item may be mailed he should contact the post office.

Gift parcels of five pounds or less (SAM) will be airlifted from San Francisco. Parcels of not more than 30 pounds or more than 60 inches in length and girth combined (PAL) will be airmailed on a space-available basis for an additional \$1 fee. A PAL package weighing 10 pounds mailed from Tahoka to a military post office in Vietnam costs only \$2.90 compared to the regular air mail rate of \$6.59.

Addressee on packages must be legible and complete showing APO number and should be written with ball point pens or marking pencils. It is advisable not to use gummed address labels, because they come off the packages in case they get wet. It is best to address the parcel itself.

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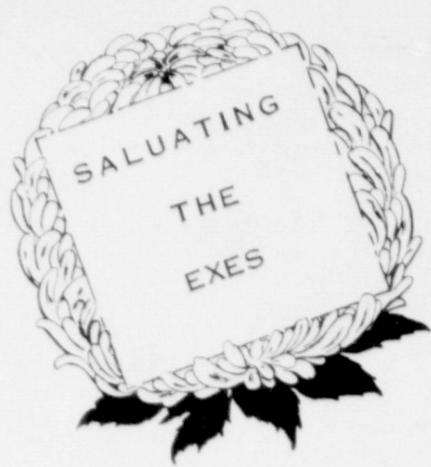

King said he was pleased to have a man of Gass' extensive background in the cattle industry and previous experience with the TSCRA.

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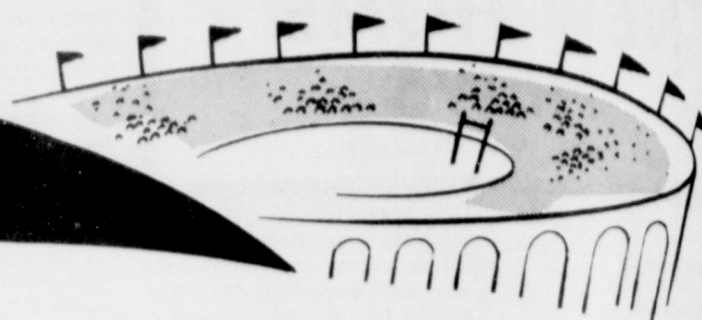
