Commissioners \$100,000 Session

Monday at five o'clock was the time set by the Commissioners' Court to receive bids for the construction of the Lynn County \$60,000 courthouse. The Court was ready at the appointed time but on account of the local train being a couple of hours late it was decided to await its arrival as some of the bidders were said to be on the train, so after various delays the Court met in the clerk's office in the rear of the post office building about nine o'clock Monday night, and the five bids were then opened in an open session of the Court. The bids were opened in the order for the amounts by the different bidders as follows: A. Z. Rodgers, Tahoka, \$73,546.92; R. P. Taylor, Texarkana, \$82,489.00; Reinhart & Donavan, Oklahoma City, \$68,634.00 Taylor Building Co., Fort Worth, \$77,500.00; J. C. Joplin & Bro., Houston, \$75,984.00. The different firms bidding were represented except the Taylor Building Co. by the following: A. Z. Rodgers in person, Ralph P. Taylor of Texarkana, M. J. Reinhart of Oklahoma City, and J. C. Joplin of Houston. After the bids were opened the Court went into executive session with the clerk and County Attorney C. H. Cain and District Attorney G. E. Lockhart present to assist the Court. All the contestants had deductions in their bids for the substitution of cheaper material than that called for in the Architect's original plans and specifications. The only point decided Monday night by the Court, was that they would build according to the original plans or not at all. As this called for more money than the bonds provided, it was the unanimous opinion of the Court

that their constituents would prefer an issue of warrants to cover the balance rather than the substitution of inferior material or workmanship and keep within the bond issue of \$60,000. So as Mr. A. Z. Rodgers was the lowest bidder by \$2,436.08, was a home man and would likely use more home labor in the construction work, he was awarded the contract Tuesday morning, and an agreement signed up that the new court house is to be completed by the first day of May 1917, and

a bond of \$40,000 called for Mr. Rodgers declared to the Court that he hoped to be able to turn the job over to them by the first of November and if he has no delays in securing material he had no fear but what he would succeed in doing so. W. M. Rice of Amarillo, the architect, will superintend the entire work and see that the contractor comes right up to the scratch in every particular. Mr. Rodgers informed the News man that he expected to begin excavation work by the fifth of June. The

TWO NEW LYMBER YARDS

Mr. Galbraith of Amarillo, of the firm of Galbraith & Foxwell Lumber Co., was in Tahoka, recently and purchased eight lots in North Tahoka on the north side of Lockwood street just north of the King Livery Stable, and it is reported that a full line of lumber is now on the road and will be installed thereon as soon as it arrives. C. E. Brown put thru a deal last week whereby J. L. Johnson, president of the Cicero Smith Lumber Co., became owner of three lots in Tahoka 100x140 feet each. These lots are numbers six, seven and eight, situated on the corner of King and Doak streets in the original town site, and are diagonally across the street from the Wood Wagon Yard. We understand that the Tahoka Lumber Co. have seventeen car loads of lumber now enroute to Tahoka. The foundation work has already been begun for their sheds which will be of iron walls and roofs to conform with the City ordinances. The Tahoka Lumber Co's yard is situated on the corner of Porterfield and Doak streets, just north of the Baptist church. This with the yards of Higginbotham-Harris & Co. and A. G. McAdams Co. already established gives Tahoka three lumber yards now and two more to be installed at once making five lumber yards and it would seem that Tahoka should be able to sell lumber right alright.

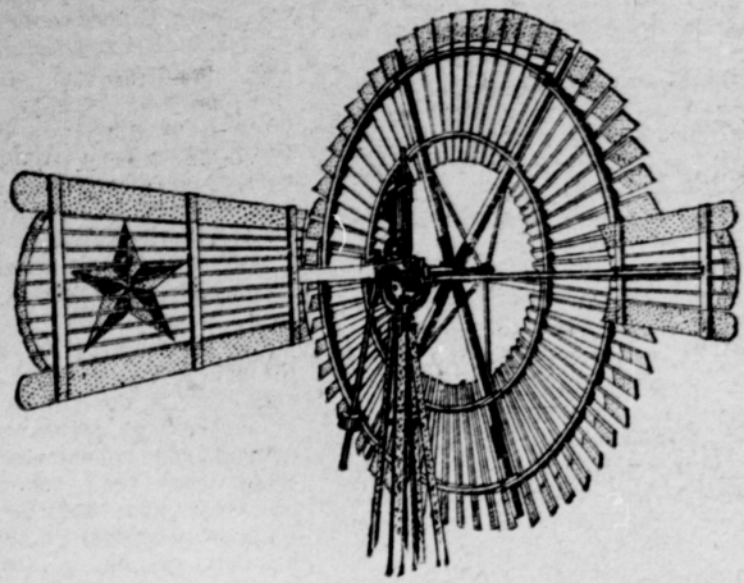

TIMELY INSTRUCTIONS TO POLITICAL CANDIDATES

June 5—Candidates for party nominations for office to be filled by a vote of the state at large shall file applications on or before this date for place on the primary election ballot. Applications may be filed by any twenty-five citizens. Deposit of such applications in the United States mail by registered letter within the time limit is deemed sufficient.

June 5—Candidates for office in districts composed of more than one county shall file applications with district chairman or the respective county chairmen by this date. Twenty-five citizens may file.

June 17—On or before this date candidates for offices to be filled by the voters of a single county or portion thereof must file applications for place on primary ballot with county chairman. Twenty-five citizens may file.

June 19—County Executive committee meets to determine order of names on ballot, to name sub-committee to make up ballot and to transact other business.

June 26—On or before this date candidates in primary election must pay ballot fees.

July 10—Subcommittee of the county executive committee meets to make up ballot.

July 19—If presiding judges of election have not been furnished certified lists of qualified voters by this date they "shall send for and procure them."

July 22—Primary election and precinct convention day. Primary election opens at 8 a. m. and closes at 7 p. m.

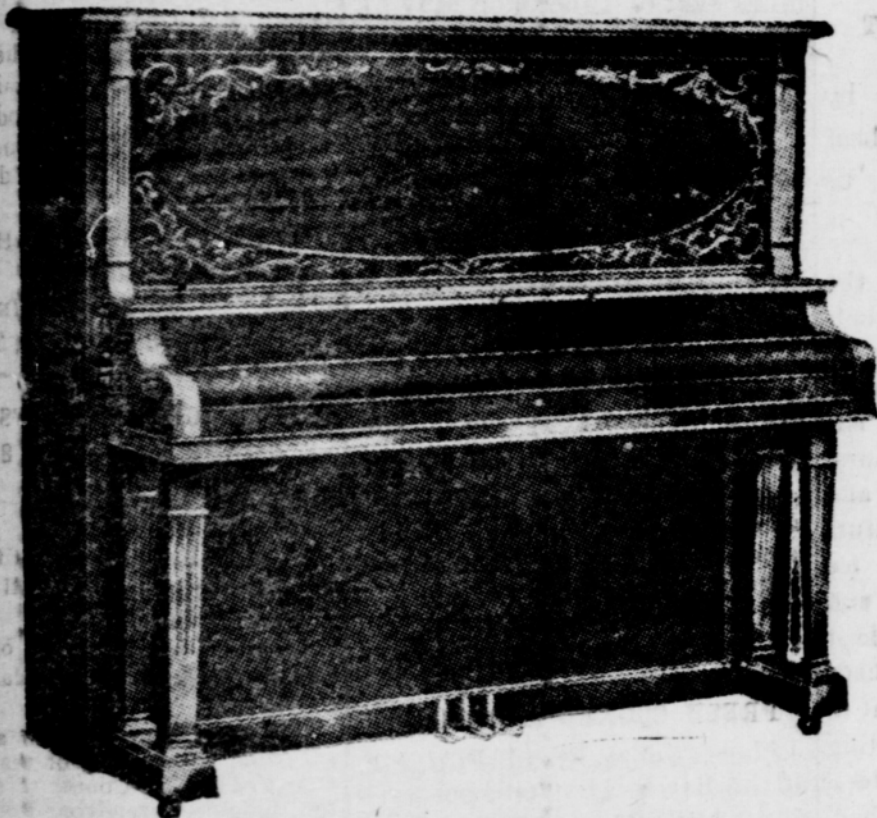

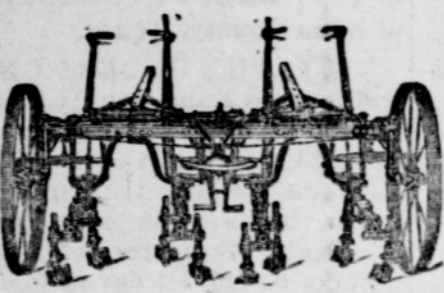

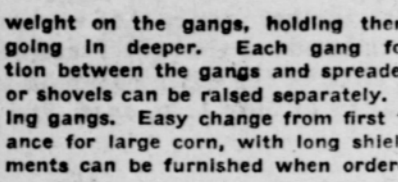
