Council Awards Street Contract

Bids for street improvement of the city of Tahoka were received and Contract No. 168 was awarded to the low bidder, Boswell and Crafton of Lubbock. Their low bid was \$10,890.00.

Other bid tabulations were as follows: Thomason Construction Co., Hobbs, \$12,160; W. D. Turner Const. Co., Lubbock, \$13,583 and High Plains Pavers, Inc., Plainview, \$15,615.

It is reported that half of the city streets will receive maintenance this summer and construction of the rest will begin next summer.

Other city business included notice that the City of Tahoka Equalization Board will meet July 1 at 7:30.

County Records Rural Highway Death In May

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of May, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$500.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1968 shows a total of 19 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 14 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$20,345.00.

1. Know and obey traffic laws and rules.

4. Have yourself and your car under control at all times.
5. Be alert while passing, turning, pulling out, and backing.
6. Be courteous and considerate to all other drivers and pedestrians.

Wind Damage Reported At Wilson 'Day Into Night' As Storm Brings Heavy Dust Sunday

Advancing storm systems have played havoc with normal activity this summer, causing much property and crop damage. Calm periods between the systems have been short, with severe weather being recorded in the area each week.

The latest storm blew in Sunday evening between 8:00-8:30, turning day into night, as a heavy dark dust storm preceded the thunderstorms. Rain, amounting to 1.25 of an inch soon cleared the air and some hail was reported.

Tahoka was spared of wind damage but other areas bore

the brunt of the gusty winds. The most severe damage was reported at Wilson. The Wilson Garage was heavily damaged with one end of the building being blown out. The business owner is Sam Crowson. Two highline utility poles were downed east of the Mexican Baptist parsonage.

Other damage in Wilson was the loss of a yard fence at the home of Mrs. H. G. Cook A. M. Crowson, living south of the city reported loss of the barn roof.

Local residents commented that the dust storm was the worst in several years. Younger residents voiced opinion that this was their first experience in viewing a real "duster" or "dirty-thirty" type of dust storm.

Area farmers are beginning to wonder if it was meant for Lynn County to have a cotton crop this year. Several are in the fourth and fifth planting now, but are doubtful about the results.

Crops have suffered damage from hard rains, hail, wind, and sandstorms, not only in this area but throughout West Texas and the Southern Plains.

Perry Flippin Is Assigned New Pentagon Duties In Washington

First Lieutenant Perry Welch Flippin will depart Europe shortly and return to Washington D. C. to assume new duties in the Pentagon July 1.

His appointment as deputy chief of "The Stars and Stripes" news bureau was announced by Col James W. Campbell, editor-in-chief.

Lt. Flippin is presently an editorial staff writer, a position he has held since February. Prior to this assignment, he was tank commander in an armored battalion of the 3rd Armored Division (Spearhead).

As Washington correspondent to U. S. Armed Forces newspapers in Europe and the Far East, Lt. Flippin will report from the Pentagon and Capitol Hill.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Welch Flippin, Rt. 3, Tahoka, a graduate of Tahoka High School and the University of Texas school of journalism, and former editor of an Arkansas newspaper. He is currently touring U. S. bases in Greece, North Africa and Italy before returning stateside.

"The Stars and Stripes" newspaper, with a daily circulation exceeding half a million, reaches servicemen and their families in Europe from Iceland to Turkey and the Far East from Korea to the South Pacific.

Truck Overtakes North Of Town

A truck, owned by Curry Truck Lines, carrying 41,000 pounds of raw rubber, overturned Thursday morning north of Tahoka. The accident occurred at the sharp curve two miles north on the highway construction detour.

The dangerous curve is adequately posted, but several drivers have failed to heed the dozen warning signs. Approximately 22 automobiles and nine trailer-trucks have tumbled down the embankment since the detour opened.

Scores And Schedules

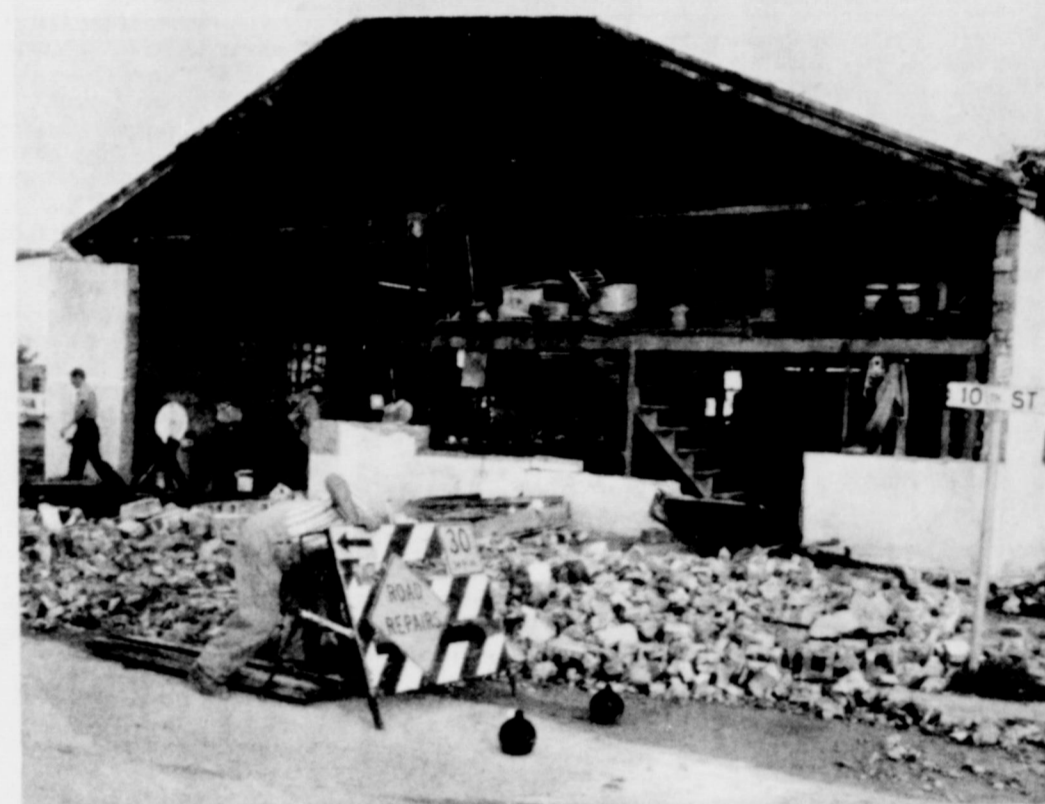
Past week scoring for the various baseball games are as follows: Tahoka Pony League downed Cooper, 9-4 on June 10.

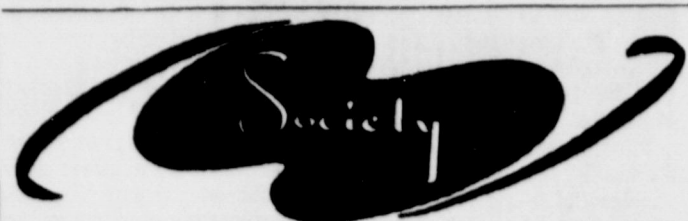

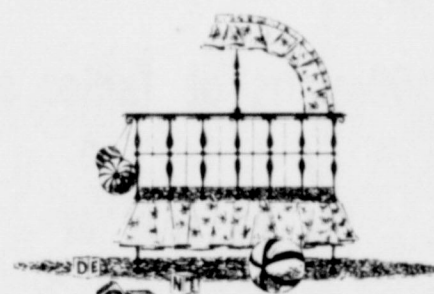

Compensation Rate Increase Is Proposed By Water District No. 1

County Tax Assessors and Collectors in a 14-county South Plains area stand to benefit appreciably if a realistic proposal by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Board of Directors is successful.

The District's Board passed a resolution doubling the amount the Water District is willing to pay the affected counties for assessing and collecting the District's maintenance taxes.

Legislative action, likely in form of a local bill, will be required for implementation of the proposal.

Since 1952, the District has paid one per cent compensation for assessing, one per cent for collecting, and in case of delinquent taxes - five per cent for collection.

Under the new proposal, two per cent would be paid for assessing and two per cent for collecting to com-

pensate for rising costs being experienced by the county agencies. Delinquent collections still would be compensated at the five per cent rate.

A proposed amendment to the existing related legislative acts has been forwarded by the High Plains District to Rep. Bill Clayton, Springlake, Chairman of the Interim Water Committee of the legislature.

The Board, acting through its manager, has asked opportunity to make a presentation before the committee at its next meeting to discuss the proposal.

Efforts also are being explored to get the amendment on the agenda for the special legislative session recently called by Gov. Connally.

Counties affected would include Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Palmer, Potter and Randall.

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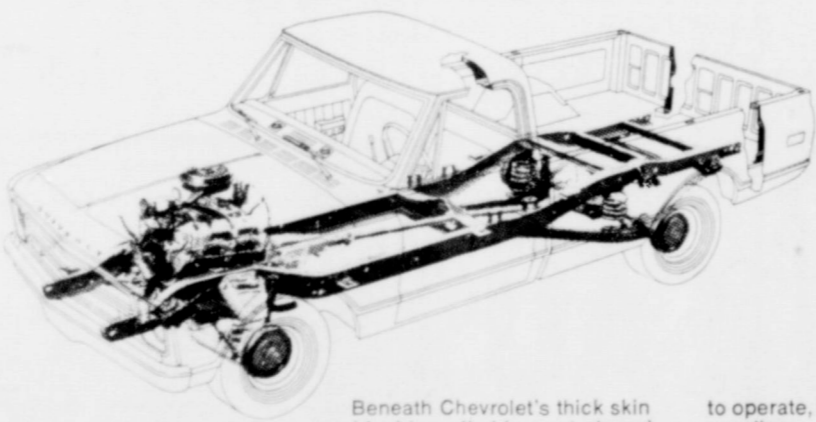

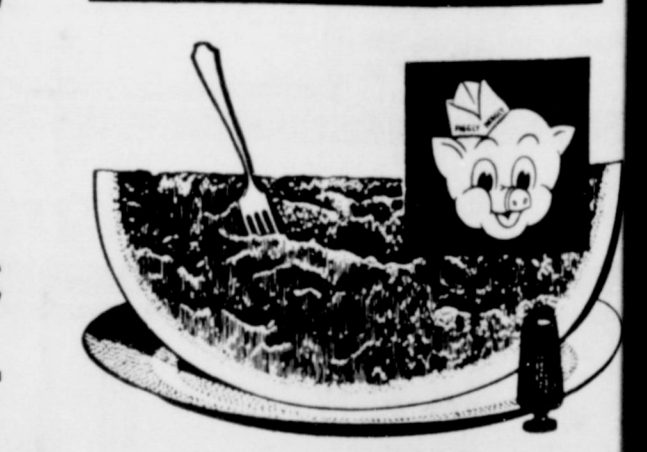
