Younger residents voiced opinion that this was their first experience in viewing a real "duster" or "dirtythirty" type of dust storm. Area farmers are beginning to wonder if it was meant for Lynn County to have a cotton crop this year. Several are in the fourth and fifth planting now, but are doubtful about the results.

Crops have suffered damage from hard rains, hail, wind, and sandstorms, not only in this area but throughout West Texas and the Southern Plains.
