a rest, and to get a little rest ourselves. We scrapped aroun there till the last day of Octo
ber. but Fritz came out loser every time. On the night of October 31, Halloween nigh
we went over and gave them we went over and gave them
licking that they will never for get, and incidentally, I'l! neve
forget it myself. I got covere up twice with mud from ex ploding shells. We followe
them for 11 days and it wa easy sailing after the first tw easy sailing after the first
days, as they were thoroughl days, as they were thoroughly
scared by that time. We wer
relieved for a rest on the relieved for a rest on the morn
ing of the 11th and were on ou way back to the rear when we
learned of the armistice being
signed. We are now in a
