## Letters From Our Soldier Boys

A.E. F. France. Dec. 22, 1918.

It has been a long time since I

have heard from you folks, and

Tahoka, Texas, Dear friends:-

I decided I would write you again. I wrote you two letters since I have been over here, but suppose that you never received them. I am well and getting along fine, but I am very anxious to get back to the States. I have been lucky all the way through the war, as I have never received a scratch, but have seen men killed and wounded all around me. I first went on the front on the 11 day of September and went into the big show on the 13th, and it was on Friday, too. This was on the St. Mihiel sector. We went through that drive, and then on the 16th, we were ruled off that front and sent to the "Argonne Forrest Front' about 80 miles from the St. Meihiel. #### UNEMPLOYED SOLDIERS CAN STAY IN SERVICE

Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 23 .- Soldiers ordered discharged and unable to secure employment will be permitted to remain in the military service until they think they can secure employment. Col. W. L. Reed, commanding officer at Camp Bowie, received a telegram from the War Department Wednesday ordering that all men ordered discharged be given a chance to remain in the military service as long as they desire. The telegram follows:

"Commanding officers will take steps to insure that every enlisted man in their command understands thoroughly that the War Department does not desire to discharge any soldier who can not secure civil employment. It will be made clear to every soldier that, instead of being discharged as he would be formerly under orders for demobilization, upon his own written request he may remain temporarily in the military service until such time as he can se cure employment. The fact that he requests to remain in the army temporarily does not in any way operate to compel him to remain in the army for a longer period of time against his will. Any man who would normally have been discharged had he not expressed his desire in writing to remain in the service may thereafter be discharged from the service at his own request whenever he thinks he may secure employment. All men, who are retained temporarily under this authority will be attached to the most convenient unit.

Colonel Reed has given orders that men retained under these instructions will not be reduced in grade.

#### ALLIED BLOCKADE CAUSED 500,000 DEATHS IN GERMANY

Berlin, Wednesday, Jan. 22 .- It is announced officially by the German Government that a further investigation of mortality "due to the blockade" from the autumn of 1916 until the end of 1918 shows that the figures were much higher than were at first supposed.

More than 500,000 deaths, it is said, were caused by malnutrition or under nutrition. Only civilians are included in the list, which says the announcement, "if it errs at all it is by giving too low figures."
