October tax collections in Lynn County, for 1968, exceeds that of October 1967. Collections to date stand at \$92,121.97, compared to \$81,355.03 for the same period in 1967.

George McCracken, County Tax Assessor-Collector reminds tax payers that a three percent discount is allowed on state and county taxes paid during the month of October. This discount will drop to 2% beginning November 1.

McCracken, also reminds voters that registration books are open and registration will continue through January 31, 1969.

Total registrations are below this period for 1967. To date, 567 persons have registered, compared to 659 for 1967.

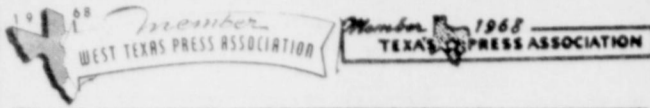

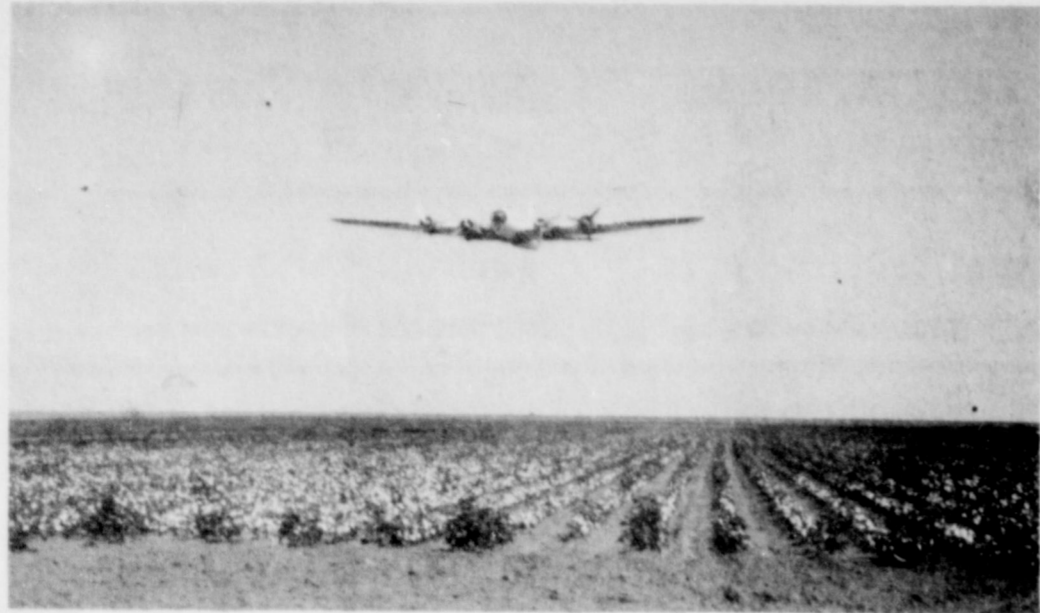

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## Data Processing Will Increase Service

The Lubbock Production Credit Association is now able to increase member service by the addition of Electronic Data Processing installed in the Association's seven field offices, October 1.

The Association's bookkeeping records were converted to an electronic computer system located at the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank at Wichita, Kansas.

According to Production Credit Association Vice-president Dwain Lusk, manager of the Tahoka field office, "the increasing complexity of agricultural lending has caused a demand for more management information which is reliable, significant, and can be obtained quickly. The installation of the computer system is an effort on our part to help answer this need, and to more adequately serve our customers."

Lusk continues, "besides maintaining bookkeeping records, this system is designed to provide services and data which were previously considered too costly and time consuming to compile."

Further explaining the system, Vice-president Lusk stated, "a unique feature is the use of a teletype machine to transfer the bookkeeping information from the association office to the com-

puter. Daily activity is coded on a paper tape through the teletype equipment at the office. This information is then transferred to the computer at the rate of one hundred words per minute."

The Lubbock Production Credit Association is an agricultural credit cooperative serving Cochran, Crosby, Gaines, Garza, Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum counties.

Vice-president Lusk reported that the Tahoka field office has loans outstanding of \$1,037,116.00 to 100 members on October 16, 1968. The office is located at 2208 Main, Tahoka.

## Election Ballots Will Have New Changes

The ballot change, according to election officials will apparently cause some confusion to voters.

Straight party ticket voters should mark their ballot with one mark, preferably an X, in the box preceding the desired party. "Split ticket" voters will place an X before the name of each candidate, in the party column desired.

Voters are urged to use caution, properly marking their ballots so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through the names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.

1. Should you cook ham before eating? Not necessarily. There are two types of ham: the fully cooked and those which need to be cooked after purchase. The fully cooked ham, indicated on the label, needs no further treatment. It has been heated during processing.

In cook before-eating hams, the temperature reached in the processing was not high enough to actually cook the meat. Any ham not labeled "fully cooked", "cooked" or "ready-to-eat" must be cooked before eating.

2. Which part of the ham offers the best value? The butt half of the ham has a smaller percentage of bone and other waste - but the price is higher than the shank half. Center slices have little waste and higher price tags.

3. What is meant by labels reading "ham", "ham, water added", and "imitation ham"? Moisture is added during the ham curing process. When hams are shrunk to original fresh weight, the label reads "ham". If the product has up to 10 percent added moisture, the label will read "ham, water added". "Imitation ham" has more than 10 percent moisture added.
