MAYFIELD WINS BY LARGE MAJORITY IN STATE

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 8.—George E. B. Peady, independent Democratic and Republican endorsed candidate for United States Senate was defeated overwhelmingly by Earle B. Mayfield, the Democratic nominee yesterday. Mayfield obtained a big majority, his vote at 12:30 a. m. being 167,139, and that of Peady being 70,039. The figures were reported by 211 counties out of 251 and it was estimated accounted for at least half if not more of the total vote cast.

Two hundred thirty-seven thousand, one hundred and eighty-two ballots had been cast at 12:30 o'clock this morning. About 600,000 ballots were cast at the July 22, Democratic primary. The total possible vote in the state was slightly more than 1,100,000.

Governor Pat M. Neff was re-elected Governor, his majority according to incomplete returns from the 211 counties being 132,510. He had 162,209 votes while W. H. Atwell, Republican, had but 29,699.

Mr. Mayfield made the following statement regarding his election: "I desire to express to the Democrats of Texas my sincere appreciation for their loyal support. My best efforts will be concentrated to the service of my native state.

"The hour has struck when government by injunction must be destroyed or free government will perish."

The County School Fair

A few days ago we received a picture of the exhibit of the Corinth Rural school in Jones county that was taken at the West Texas Fair in Abilene this Fall. And that reminds us. That it is time for us all to be talking and working for the SCHOOL FAIR in our counties. It takes a lot of talking as well as working to put over a good school fair. And naturally the teachers and pupils have the work to do and the rest of us ought to be willing to do the boosting.

The Corinth Rural school in Jones county is doing things that ought to be advertised to all rural schools in the State of Texas for what one school has done and can do many others could do with a little encouraging. And there is no one institution in our state so full of hope and promise and possibility at this time as the rural school.

Now this may sound contradictory to many statements that are being said by most of us about the rural schools. But it is not. There is no public institution in Texas that needs building up more than the rural school. There is no institution that represents so many of our future citizens. There is no institution that has so many possibilities undeveloped within itself. And thank goodness the rural school is beginning to realize this itself and today some of the most wonderful teachers in the State are seeking the rural school as an outlet for their independent thinking and constructive programs. And whenever the rural school gets interested in itself then something is going to happen in Texas. And it is already happening in some of our schools in some of our counties and the Corinth school in Jones county is one of them.

Yes sir. When a two-room school gets up spunk enough, and self respect and pride enough in itself to get up an exhibit and take it to a great fair like that West Texas held at Abilene a few weeks ago that school has discovered itself and its possibilities, and there will be no limit to what it can do. And one of the very best ways we have ever heard of to create interest in everything a rural school can do is through the County School Fair.

The County School Fair movement originated in Virginia about ten or twelve years ago. So far as we can learn the second State to take it up was Texas. In Texas the school fair movement was initiated by Miss Laura V. Hamner, now County Superintendent of Potter County schools. Through the co-operation of the teachers in her home county, Armstrong, the school fair was most successfully put over for four years, 1915, 16, 17, and 18. Then the war and the flu caused every plan and program in the county to be abandoned until a more suitable time. During those four years the rural schools did more to improve their grounds and buildings than ever before. The school fair contests centered the thought of the pupils and parents on the school. It attracted attention to the many little things that could be done to make the school plant more attractive to all the children in the entire county. It brought the county together once a year in the name of education and the children. It gave emphasis to expert

work in adding, spelling, writing, story telling, cooking, sewing and the hundred and one things that children can do who are too young or too small to enter the athletic contests. Athletics and physical alertness are most commendable. But everybody cannot enter these contests. The school fair gives every child in the county a chance to prove what he can do best. It gives every teacher in the county a chance to demonstrate her special talent as a teacher and also to bring to the front her pupils no matter how small the school or where it is located. Most of our genius is buried there now. The country boy and the country girl are the most original and natural human products in the world. And most of our talent is lost because it is never recognized.

If you do not believe this put on a school fair in your county and offer a prize for the most original work in any school. Offer a prize for the best invention, for the best made machine, or any thing else you may think of. It is right now out there in the bushes somewhere in the little round head of some of those little school boys that never saw inside a high school. And it will tickle them almost to death, but not quite to death to have a chance to prove what their idea of things are.

Offer a prize for the best poster advertising the rural school, the farm, the poultry business or the Farm Bureau. The rural child has no art teacher but he has art itself all around him and he is full of it himself. Give a prize for the best radio set, the best automobile, the best design for a barn, the best planned farm. Oh the country is so full of interesting things for the boys and girls to do but no one every gives them a chance to create something they know something about. No one ever gives them a chance to compete in the things that make up their life; therefore they sometimes grow to think there is nothing of interest in their school or around their homes to do, when it is the most interesting place in the whole world.

And this year the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce has adopted the school fair as one of its six projects for the new year for the entire Panhandle and Plains. And this does not mean that the rest of the State is not welcome to the plan. The school fair committee wants every county in the State to have a school fair. Miss Hamner of Amarillo, County Superintendent of Potter County, has been made chairman of this work in the Panhandle and she will gladly do all she can to promote the movement anywhere it is desired.

What is a school fair? It is a collection of things the children of the county have done and made in school and under the direction of the school during the year just the same as any other fair is a getting together of the products of the farm and the city. The school fair if rightly developed will appeal the whole boy or the whole girl and every ounce of energy and every germ of intellect and every atom of talent in them. It is a competitive outlet for the best of everything in them of an educational and industrial nature. It is to the school boy and the school girl what the State Fair is to the State.

INTERNATIONAL TRACTOR DEMONSTRATION MONDAY

The McCormack Hardware Store of Tahoka, local representatives of the International trucks and tractors, put on a demonstration at the farm of H. E. Baldrige, 1½ miles north of the city Monday of this week. The International tractor and plows are all that is claimed for them and over.

The News editor had the privilege of witnessing the work done by these implements last Monday. The tractors are 15-30 horse power and run on kerosene, burning about 23 gallons in a ten-hours run and only one quart of lubricating oil. For plowing, discing and harrowing; also all kinds of belt work, such as feed grinding, etc., they are in a class to themselves. One man can do the work of five or six with teams. The cost of these implements is small compared with the service that can be obtained. The above tractor can be purchased through the McCormack Hardware Store laid down in Tahoka at \$1335.00.

There were several hundred persons took advantage of the opportunity to see the tractors, plows and feed crushers in actual operation last Monday. Included in this number were about fifty High school boys, accompanied by Superintendent H. P. Caviness. The boys were carefully shown every detail of the work and labor saving devices of the International line, which was educational in many ways.

Messrs. Sandy McCormack and Tull Adams of the McCormack Hardware, are putting forth every effort to give the buying public service in the hardware line, and are sparing no expense in demonstrating their wares.

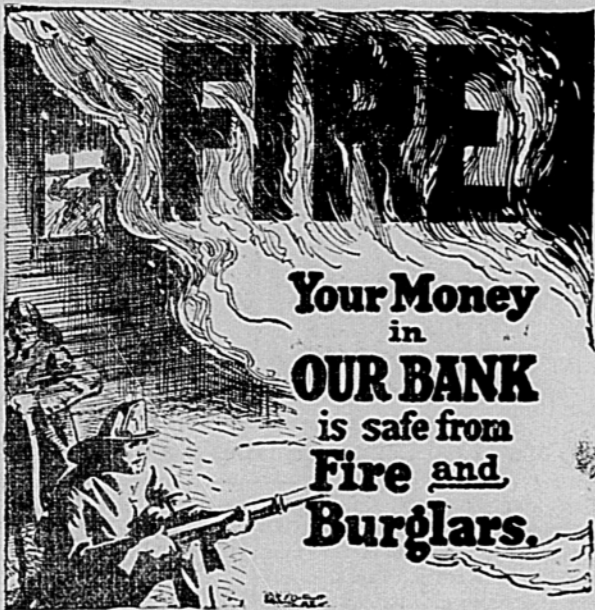

TEACHER ARESTED SUNDAY AT LUBBOCK—BURGLARY

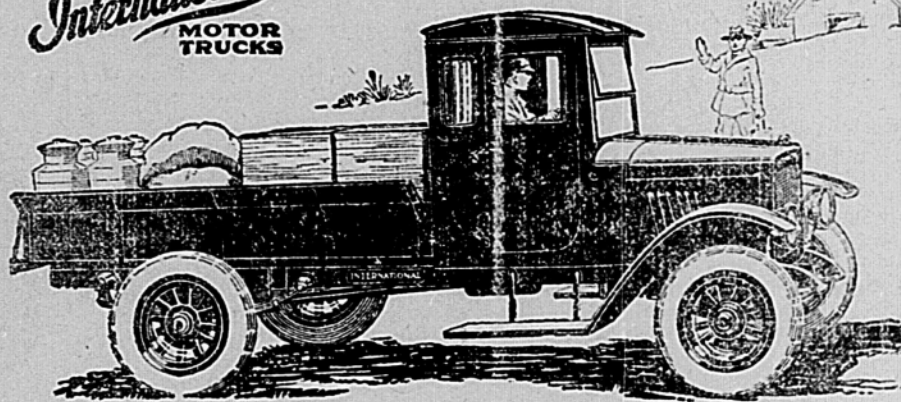

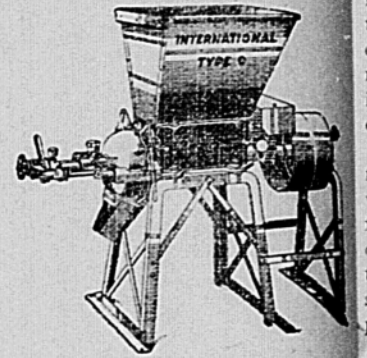
