The primary election on July 25 was a very quiet affair in Tahoka, no trouble of any kind, no drinking and no noise until the returns began to come in. About three o'clock the crowd broke up and silence reigned supreme again.

Railroad Getting Nearer.

General James, president of the Roscoe, Snyder & Pacific railway, came over to Fluvanna Tuesday, accompanied by J. M. Cunningham, and remained until Wednesday. Naturally the people of this section were glad to see him, extend to him a hearty handshake and then, at the proper time, come around to railroad building in general and the extension of the R. S. & P. on here in particular.

General James talked freely and entertainingly; it might be added that he talked most interestingly, also, as he stated straight from the shoulder that he had come to Fluvanna to look into certain details that is necessary to arrange, immediately after which the grading out of Fluvanna will begin. The General said that he had expected Capt. Duval, the chief engineer of the road, would accompany him here, but that the Captain was called to Fort Worth on business two or three days before that, and had missed connection in coming back.

When President James was asked just what is necessary to do before actual work can begin, he said that he must determine definitely upon the location for the depots, both passenger and freight; also have a survey made for the numerous switches and side tracts that will be necessary for a terminal town, and that the surveying of a "Y" would also be

necessary. A decision has now been reached, it is understood, as to where these various necessary tracks and buildings will be located, though the Herald has not been informed as to the exact location.

Before any work is done right in Fluvanna, President James informs us, Chief Engineer Duval will make a correction or two along the route from here to Snyder, but it is not thought he will be engaged in that work but a few days. This done then work commences here, and a force of men will "get busy" grading. When the location of the depots, switches and "Y" have been surveyed and marked off, the force of men will turn their attention to grading out of Fluvanna towards Snyder. It is not known how far out they will grade, but at the proper time they will take up the work again where they left it off at Snyder and grade on this way. General James is of the opinion that it will take six months to finish the grading and about three to lay the ties and steel.

This will throw the new road in here in nine months if there has been no miscalculation, and when it is remembered that the road went into Snyder ahead of contract time, there is no good reason to fear that it will be delayed on this end of the line.

"You're going to get the road," was General James last remark as he shook hands with the writer at parting, "and you may say that work has already begun on the extension from Snyder to Fluvanna, because I am up here solely on that purpose today, and the work will not from now on be dropped nor neglected."—Fluvanna Herald.

Another Successful Farmer.

Dear Editor:
 I was born and raised in Mississippi came to Texas in 1855, settled in Bell county. Moved from Bell county to Coryell county. Then to Freestone County. Moved from there to Johnson County. From there to Sterling county. And from Sterling to Lynn County. I have lived in Lynn County five years. I came to Lynn with Three Thousand Dollars in money, a wife and three children. I now own 1920 acres of fine, first-class land, adjoining Tahoka. The County seat of Lynn County, I have one hundred and twenty acres in cultivation. I have eight acres in orchard, just beginning to bear. I also put out about one hundred cuttings from cottonwood switches. I put them out around the house and in the yard. They now have two years growth, and will range from eight to ten feet high. The cutting were about twelve inches long when put out. I have neither irrigated nor watered them.

I think this will be a fine fruit country when the settlers have time to get orchards planted all over the country. I know that it is a fine farming country.

The balance of my land is in pasture. I have plenty of horses and work stock to run my farm. Plenty of cows for milk and butter and plenty of hogs to consume all waste from the cattle pens and horse lots and to make all pork and lard for family use and some to exchange for groceries.

Lynn county is the best county I have ever lived in for a man of small means. The land while rich and productive, has comparatively no waste. It can all be put in cultivation, and always makes good crops. This is a very healthful country. In my entire five years' residence in Lynn county, I have not been out to exceed \$15 doctor bill for my entire family.
