State and County taxes for 1968 must be paid by Friday also, according to George McCracken, Assessor-Collector, as penalty and interest will be added to all taxes beginning February 1, 1969.

Lynn County passenger license plates will have prefixes and numbers CHV 25-CHV 999; CHW 10-999; CHX 10-999; CHY 10-999; and CHZ 10-CHZ 374.

Commercial vehicles will carry numbers IP 900 through IP 2399 and farm vehicles 8F 925 through 8F 2324.

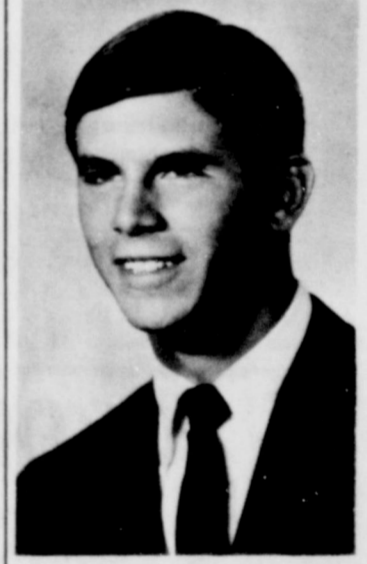
The vehicle was considered a total loss. Damage to the glass front and interior of the building had not been estimated at press time.

Cotton Meeting Set At Lubbock

The third annual meeting on the production of quality cotton sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be held at the KoKo Palace, Lubbock, at 9:30 a. m. on Wednesday, February 5. A top slate of speakers will be on hand to discuss the current cotton production situation for the South Plains.

Headlining the event will be a discussion by Dabney S. Wellford, top economist with the National Cotton Council.

Of vital interest to area cotton producers is the development of new and better adapted, high quality producing varieties. Discussing this aspect will be Dr. Levon Ray who is in charge of the cotton breeding program at the Texas A and M University Agricultural Center north of Lubbock.

Dr. H. O. Kunkel, Dean of Agriculture, Texas A and M, will be the featured speaker at the noon luncheon. He will discuss the role of Texas A and M University in the improvement of quality and lowering of production costs of Texas High Plains cotton.

Tahoka Bulldogs lost three games Tuesday night, in action here with the Idalou Wildcats. Terms seeing action were Varsity boys and girls, and Jr. Varsity boys.

Varsity boys lost a hard fought tilt, after taking the lead in the first two periods of play. The Wildcats came back the third period to gain the lead and hold it until the final whistle. Final score, 82-64.

Local girls faced a strong opponent, unable to overcome the early lead taken by the Idalou team. The Wildcats showed superior hitting power, with a double-team effort, for a final of 65-44.

Jr. Varsity boys led the

first three periods of play, only to lose out in the fourth by one point. The close final was 67-66.

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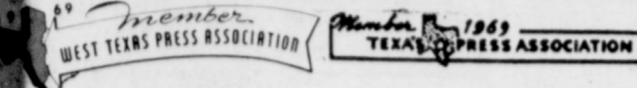

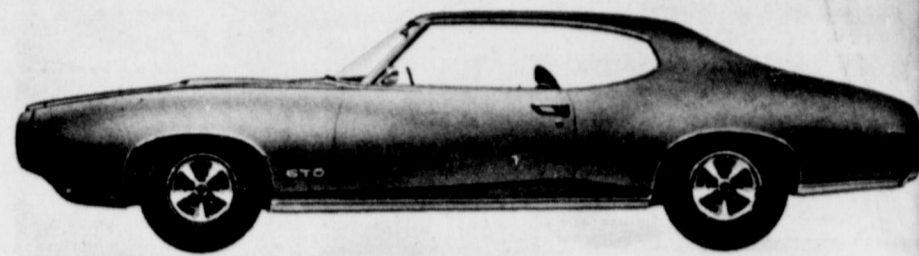

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

A kind of dilemma is facing many cotton farmers on the Texas Plains concerning the growing of longer staple varieties. There has been a rapid movement to the production of longer fibered cottons over the last two years, but prices during the past season have been disappointing to growers. At present, textile mills are more interested in shorter staple cottons because they are cheaper.

County Agricultural Agent Bill Griffin says a partial answer goes back to last year's market activity. Stocks of longer staple cottons have increased rapidly relative to short staple cottons. As a result, mills have a good supply of long staple cotton on hand. Furthermore, last year's wide price spread between short and long staple cotton was an abnormal situation and could not be expected to remain.

In most cases, however, longer staple cotton is still bringing \$15 to \$25 more per bale than short staple cotton. Another encouraging aspect is that cotton breeders are developing longer staple, stormproof varieties which have the yield ability of popular 15/16-inch cottons.

In yield trials in Dawson County the past season, researchers from the Texas A&M University Agricultural Center at Lubbock found that new stormproof cottons with an inch plus staple averaged slightly more in yield than old 15/16-inch staple varieties. Yield was 646 pounds of lint per acre for the longer staple varieties compared to 605 pounds for the short staple varieties.

Longer staple varieties in the trials included Paymaster 111, Lockett 4789, Lockett 4789A, Lankart 3840, Lambright X-15-5, Stripper-Cala S and Tamcot 788.

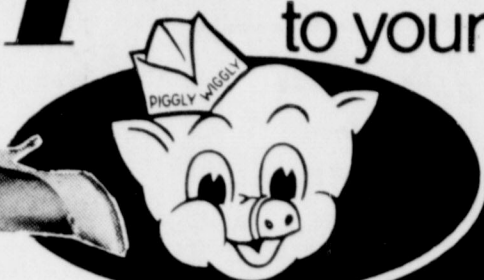
