In a short span of years "our" sand hill will exist only in the transparent parts of flivers.

Then there is a lake half way down the road to O'Donnell which is just a bit too far away to be available. Just a good long mile east of the city limits lies a large natural lake which road improvement and water-works funds could transform into a wonderful boating, fishing and awimming lake to be used as a reserve for fire, steam, and stock water. For be it known that Tahoka still has a water problem, which increased population, industrial expassion, and higher standards of living, and the inevitable dry year will only accentuate. We also have the ridiculous situation of a princely fortune being filched from Lynn county motorists to be spent by a highway commission on million dollar "state aid" road projects in the more central and civilized(?) parts of Texas while we out here travel in the mud and dust and take, with thanks whatever slight improvements these high-browed gentlemen see fit to dole out to us. Whenever a good high wide grade is built accross a lake it makes a park site which only needs poplar and willow switches stuck down at the water line to make it a regular beauty spot in a few years. Some business men will say that one or more park projects are waste of public money, but to hold their advertising patronage fisher local newspaper must keep hammering their readers with that old bunk about the ruinous folly of trading with Wardbuck or any other old buck that prints a price list. But they completely ignore the fact that whole barrels of Lynn county money are constantly hauled off to

a very weak stream from the deep wells, so the town had to burn.

Right close to the city water works I have the finest boat in the city—I built and designed it myself—and it is a constant joy to Tahoka's kid population, many of whom never saw or rode in any other boat but mine. It seems deplorable that some of our high-power minds seem determined to make this pretty little lake into a filth dump, and the smell of the rotting cotton burrs in this water makes the ordinary pig pen seem sweet in comparison. A curve line drive way from King's barn to the lower water reservoir built six feet high built out of dirt from the west side of the lake would make one of the most beautiful parks in west Texas. Then if a centrifugal pump were installed on the east side to conserve the rain water, the east side could still be used as a dump till it was filled up level with the drive way. Simultaneously, the present cotton yard should be condemnared as an eye sore and fire hazamrad and moved elsewhere, even if it involved the building of a modern steel ware house.

Such a lake and park would be a wonderful factor in the heavity.

2,000 Students To Parade In Amarillo

Canyon, Texas, April 30, 1926 The West Texas State Teachers Col lege will stage a giant demonstra-tion in connection with the meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Comlege will stage a giant demonstration in connection with the meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Amarillo, June 21, 22 and 23. The third day of the meeting has been designated as Education Day and the officers of the commercial organization expressed a desire to have every college in the territory served by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce represented in some way.

The West Texas State Teachers College, assisted by the commercial organizations of Canyon, will stage a great parade in which more than two thousand students are expected to participate. A special train will be run from Canyon to Amarillo and W. E. Lockhart will have general charge of the demonstration there. Arrangements are being made by the Teachers College to maintain their headquarters at a convenient point in Amarillo where prospective college, and friends may meet, rest and discuss college days and problems. The location of the headquarters has not yet been definitely determined.

Exhibition of work done at the Teachers College will probably be on display at the official headquarters. This exhibit will be in cahrge of Professor Robert Donald, of the Manual training department.

Through arrangements made by Homer Wade, and Porter Whaley, all of the officers and directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be banqueted in Canyon on the evening of June 21. Following the banquet, which will be given a short entertaining program in the auditorium of the West Texas State Teachers College. All

PLAINVIEW EGGS SHIPPED TO CUBA

Two carloads of eggs left Plainview this morning for Havana, Cuba. They were loaded at Plainview by the Lubbock Egg & Poultry Company and was consigned to them at Havana, Cuba.

Each car contained 400 cases of eggs making 800 cases. Each case containing 30 dozen of eggs and that makes a total of 24,000 dozen eggs in the shipment, enough to furnish the egg part of the Cuban's breakfast for some time to come.

It is estimated that the farmer was paid an average of 18 cents per dozen for these eggs and at this soncervative figure the Hale county farmers who furnished the eggs were paid a total of \$4,320 and that is not a bad addition to the general income of the people.

Santa Fe freight officials said that this makes a total of 5 carload shipments that have gone out of Plainview since the first of the year and it is belived that these eggs alone which do not represent a drop in the bucket to the general production in this count, brought over \$10,000 to the farmers.—Plainview News.
