Each privy should have a deep receptiou pit well ventilated but dark enough to make it uninhabitable by flies. House flies prefer filth as a breedirg place. Kept constantly in the privy should be a good disinfectcrude carbolic acid in water, and it should be used frequently and abundantly. This is not the best way, by any means, of disposing of sewage, but it is the most practical under the circumstances. Other things should be done. Trash, papers and rubbish generally should be disposed of and not allowed to accumilate. Articles not destroyed should be piled neatly or stored and not allowed to lie roud and serve as a catch all.
