

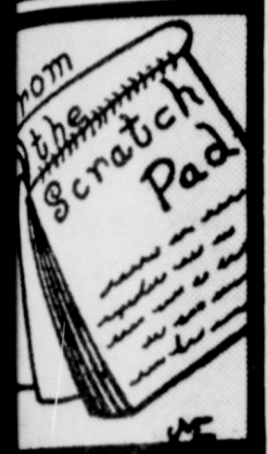

Sign Erected At County Line

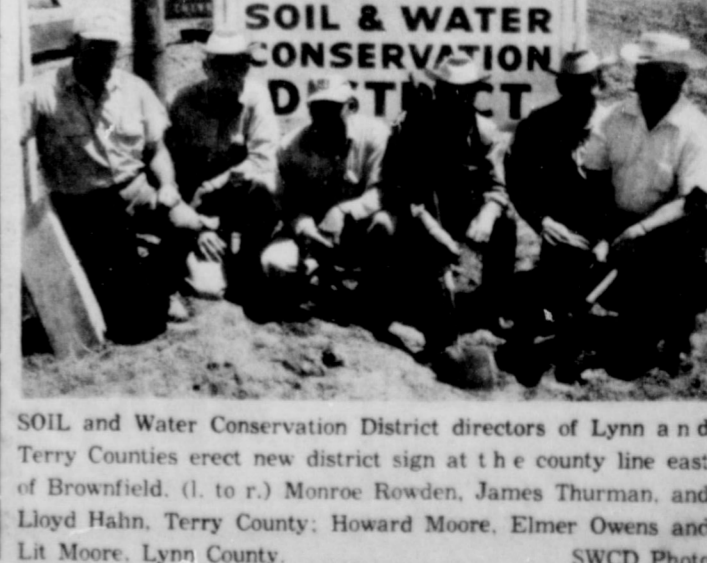
Supervisors of the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District recently met with members of the Terry County District to erect a new district information sign.

Farm Bureau Legislative Newsletter

State Minimum Wage, H.B. 156, the Texas Minimum Wage Act of 1970, was finally passed by the House of Representatives, sent to the Senate. This bill now goes back to the House of Representatives. It is expected that the House will refuse to concur and that a Conference Committee will be appointed to settle the differences between the House and Senate versions of the bill.

Taxes, S.J.R. 15, the proposed Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide by law the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands was voted on in the House of Representatives, and the vote was 95 to 43. It takes 100 votes to finally pass a proposed Constitutional Amendment.

Farm Trailers, S.B. 34, an amendment to the farm trailer law increasing permitted gross weights from 10,000 lbs. to 20,000 lbs. and increasing the speed limit from 30 miles per hour to 60 miles per hour

during the day and 55 miles per hour at night, was amended in the Senate Committee, making the permitted gross weight 15,000 and the maximum speed limit 45 miles per hour day or night. After these changes, the bill was passed by the Senate and sent to the House.

Water, S.B. 54, creating legislation to carry out the intent and purpose of S.J.R. 6, exempting non-profit corporations from payment of property taxes, was passed by the House and sent to the Governor for his signature.

Milk Products, S.B. 799, the Senate companion bill to H.B. 1414, adding milk products to the present law requiring all milk entering the State to meet Texas standards was passed by the House and sent to the Governor for his signature.

Fire Ants, H.R. 463, a House Resolution to create a study committee of the Legislature to study ways and means of eradicating the Imported Fire Ant, was introduced in the House and referred to the House Committee on Interim Activities.

Natural Fibers, HCR 118, a resolution creating a joint House-Senate Interim Study Committee on natural fibers and textile development to continue the previous study on natural fibers was passed by the House and sent to the Senate.

Commodity Check-off H.B. 764, a bill authorizing a check-off up to one percent of the market value of agriculture commodities for the

purpose of research, promotion and education, marketing, disease and insect control, was finally passed by the House and sent to the Senate where it was referred to the Committee on Agriculture and Livestock.

Texas Grain Warehouse Act H.B. 856, a bill providing for licensing, bonding, and supervision of grain warehouses and warehousemen by the Commissioner of Agriculture was finally passed by the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Livestock. This bill is scheduled for hearing before this committee at 10:00 a. m. May 26.

Law Enforcement, S.B. 74, the so-called "implied consent bill" which provides that a person arrested on suspicion of DWI shall submit to a chemical test to determine

the degree of his intoxication, was finally passed by the Senate, sent to the House where minor amendments were added, passed by the House and sent back to the Senate. Unless a filibuster arises on this bill, the Senate will concur in House amendments and pass the bill.

Daylight Savings Time, S.C.R. 90, a resolution requesting that each political party submit at the general primary election, May 1970, the proposition of Daylight Savings Time, was introduced in the Senate, adopted.

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Whether you strawberry pick in your patch or a supermarket, shy away from white tipped and soft fleshed berries... and handle berries with tender loving care. White tips mean underripe tart berries; over-ripe fruit which has been on the shelf or vine too long lose its brightness, aroma and much flavor. They prove wasteful in preparation.

In the supermarket, a stained container may indicate over ripe berries.

The fruit is at its best with full red color, firm flesh, good aroma and bright appearance. The current supply from nearby growing areas had only a short season.

Remember that size does not affect quality and flavor of the fruit. Generally small fruit makes more servings.

The aristocratic strawberry needs tender loving care; it bruises and decays easily. Buy strawberries last so they will not be squashed in the cart and don't leave them in a hot car.

At home, sort berries and remove soft ones to use immediately. Let underripe berries ripen at room temperature.

To store berries in the container, cover with cellophane in the refrigerator. Before using, wash them gently and quickly in cold water. Do not soak.

Remove the caps after berries are clean. Strawberries

should be used within two or three days after purchase. Try topping fresh strawberries with sour cream and 2 teaspoons of brown sugar for an unusual but delicious dessert.

Recipe of the Week
Peanut Brownies
by Linda Huffaker

4 eggs
2 cups sugar
1/4 cup oil
3/4 cup crunchy peanut butter
2 sqs. unsweetened chocolate or 4 T Cocoa
1 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup chopped nuts (pecans)

Beat eggs until lemon colored. Add sugar and beat until mixture is thick. Melt oil, peanut butter and chocolate. Add to eggs slowly and mix well. Add dry ingredients and vanilla and mix just until well blended. Fold in pecans. Bake in a greased oblong pan at 350 degrees F for 30 minutes.

Water Pollution, S.B. 147, a bill amending and updating the Texas Water Quality Act, to provide for more effective control of water quality in this state, was amended and finally passed by the House of Representatives. It now goes back to the Senate for the Senate to concur in the amendments.

Education H.B. 240, the "teacher pay raise" bill, was finally passed by the House and sent to the Senate. As this bill was passed by the House, it does not include the controversial provision for a late tax equalization rate based on full market value of property.

The House of Representatives and the Senate were still in session as this Newsletter went to press.

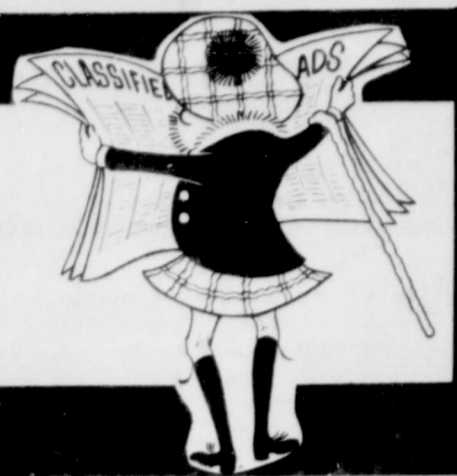

Highway Patrol Investigates Three Accidents Over Weekend

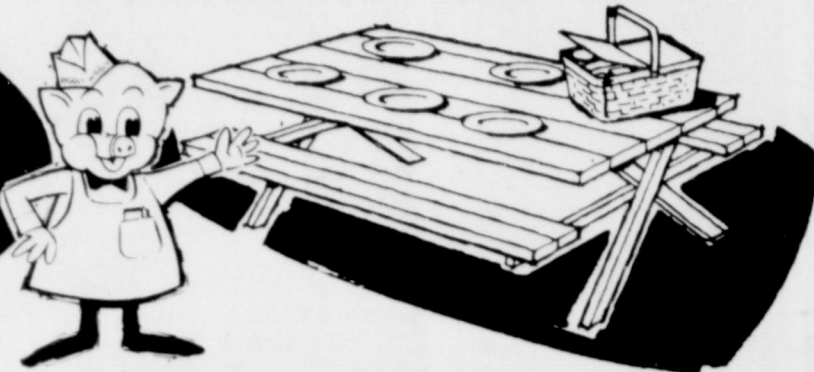

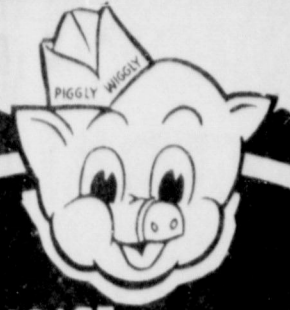
